TO SWEAR BY THE CRUCIFIX. The Provisions of a Bill Introduced in the

The Provisions of a Rill Infreduced in the Quebec Legislature.

QUEBEC, April 10.—Mr. Lemieux's bill now before the House provides that in courts of justice a crucifix shall be placed in a conspicuous place opposite the witnesses' stand during examination, and such crucifix to be of the size d-termined by the Licut. Governor in Council. Before a witness is allowed to swear and give his testimony, he shall be called upon to lift his right hand in front of the crucifix, and to place his left hand on the Book of the Evangelists, and to swear before the crucifix and upon the holy evangelists to tell the truth and the whole truth in the cause in which he is to be heard as a witness. Every shoriff shall place or cause to be placed a crucifix in the manner above indicated in each and every courthouse within the limits of his district, under a penalty of \$50 for each day in which he neglects to do so.

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
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
