An English African Expedition.

An English African expedition is to be undertaken with a view of checkmating the designs of France and Belgium, who are aiming to obtain access to the Upper Nile. The English expedition is also aiming at the Upper Nile and will reach the objective point before an expedition from Uganda can get there. It is, therefore, likely that before Commander Montalz's expedition starts from Uganda in May the whole of Unyoro and Emin's province will have been brought into the British sphere. The expedition will start from Landy, north of the Equatorial Province, and Col. Colville, its commander, has been given the very widest scope of action.

The representatives of the miners on the Conciliation Board resent the action of President Shauds in giving the casting vote against the demands of men fixing the minimum rate of wages, regulating the selling prices and permitting them to enquire into the profits of owners. For this action Mr. Shands is denounced as an aristocrat, humbug, tool, etc. The consensus of public opinion is that the miners, having accepted a proposal to settle their grievances by arbitration, ought to abide by the decision of the arbitrators.





DROWNED IN THE BAY. off the Waterworks

Twelve o'clock came and he did not return, but the men thought he would get back to his dinner, which was waiting on the boat. When they returned to work at 1 o'clock he was still absent and a search was building had not seen him and he had never reached the workshop. A pipe-hole was procured and Henning and Lamb proceeded to drag the slip. In about three minutes the pole struck something under the side of the boat, which proved to be Davison's body. When the corpse was recovered there was found on the head a scar as of a bruise from which blood was oozing.

Since then he has revisited England, returning to Canada about a year ago, since which time he has been traveling through Canada and the States. About a month ago he came to Toronto and got a position at firing on the boat from which he met his death. Before he came to Canada he was fireman for 10 years on ocean

It is only about six weeks since Davison received news of the death of his father, and about a week ago intelligence was received of his mother's death. He was 37 years of age. The body was removed to the Morgue.
