## OPERETTAS AT THE GRAND.

The Music of Many Composers Sung by W. T. Carleton and Company.

Carleton, and his associates. The company in all respects is an amusing and amusingly young lady who plays "Pages, etc.," and afterwards "Villagers, etc." is unusually attractive. He opens work stockings. The defects of the performance are the school-girl plots of the operas.

A Horse Driver Asks Damages. In the County Court yesterday Walter Barnes, horse-trainer, sued Edward Harper, by whom he was employed to drive a trotting horse in several races in the Ontario circuit. The plaintiff alleged that the agreement was that he was to receive all hotel and travelling expenses, and, in addition, \$25 when he won first money and \$10 when the race was lost.

Six Months For Mail Robbery. A SHARP RISE IN QUOTATIONS OF CENTRAL OAS.

Wall-Street Stocks More Active and Higher—Money Firmer in New York—Wheat Active and Lower in Chicago—Provisions Are Lower—Quoted in Latest Financial and Commercial News.

Thursday Evening, Dec. 13. There was an active trade on the Montreal Stock Exchange to-day, with a sharp advance in the.

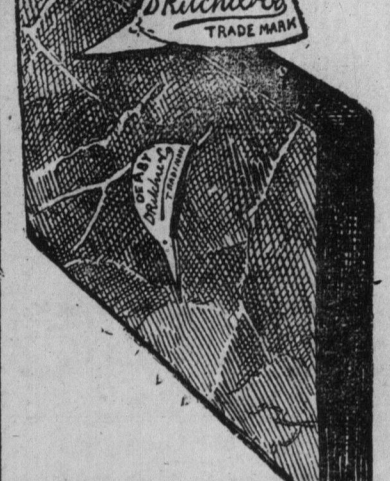
