Mr. High, Member of the Tenn. Farmer's Delegation, gives the following opinion of Bridgetown and vicinity.

The steamer, on her way to Annapolis, touched in Digby, a considerable town. I was impressed during the sail by the Annapolis Ferry. They have an apparatus of 13 choppers per day of from 2 1/2 to 30 lbs. weight. The factory is a joint-stock company, owned by farmers in the district. They send in their milk, and the proceeds after deducting expenses, are divided amongst the partners. They are much interested in their business, and they are likely to be engaged in the business of manufacturing in the city.

This is the way to foster and encourage industries. Give them every chance, and help them by word and deed, both published and unpublished. A shortsighted policy lost our town the benefit of a valuable shipbuilding industry a few years ago. When the Messrs. Creighton wished to purchase the ship-yard site, it would have paid the town ten-fold to have purchased it, and made these gentlemen a present of a right to build all the ships they wish at upon it, free of rent or taxation.

MARGARETVILLE.—On Wednesday, the 16th inst., a school examination was held in the school room, Margaretville, east, under the management of Mr. J. A. Balcom, assisted by Miss L. Clark. The exercises consisted of recitations in Geometry, Geography, Reading, Spelling, &c.

General News.

The Steamboat Meeting.

An adjourned meeting of the Acadia Steamship Company was held at the Court House on the afternoon of Wednesday last. R. J. Unwin, Esq., in the chair.

The meeting was large and influential, and was attended by our farmers, business and professional men from all parts of the County, who manifested a great interest in the success of the scheme, it being

advised to be an enterprise of great and permanent benefit to our farmers and stockholders, and evidently to the inhabitants generally of the Counties of Annapolis, Kings and Digby, as affording facilities for exporting and importing to and from Great Britain, of which this valley has long felt the need.

The position of the directors reported that the charter for the incorporation of the company had been applied for, and the sum of two hundred dollars to be paid therefor, forwarded to the Government.

T. S. Whitman reported that the call of \$2.50 per share had been responded to to the extent of \$207, and that the sum of \$236, including the \$200 forwarded to Government, had been disbursed.

That the Dominion Government had been petitioned to, and had granted \$15,000 towards the construction of piers and warehouses. Mr. Whitman stated that the Government had been anxious to obtain a lucrative office in the directory, but in order to disabuse shareholders of this fallacious idea, he positively refused to accept any office of emolument whatsoever.

The convening committee reported that it had held most satisfactory and encouraging meetings in Kings County. Mr. Overton, a fruit dealer from London, addressed the meeting, and expressed the opinion that the scheme would prove pre-eminently beneficial to the fruit growers, the fruit of this valley being greatly sought after in England, and that it is necessary to possess a market and good returns, is careful packing and rapid transit. He also mentioned the great advantage Nova Scotia fruit growers have over fruit growers in the United States, when the Acadia Steamship Company goes into operation.

Mr. Pugh asked the Government if it was their intention to bring in a bill to provide for the payment of the award on the Nictaux and Atlantic Railway claims this session. Hon. Prov. Secretary said in reply to the hon. member for Yarmouth that a measure for the improvement of the present condition of the road and bridge service had been mentioned in the speech of His Honor the Lieut. Governor, and of course it was the intention of the Government to bring down a measure in regard to the matter, but the hon. member would see that the Government could not say anything as to the details of the bill before bringing it down. The same remark was applicable to the question of the hon. member for Victoria.

Mr. McCurdy said that a number of petitions had been presented asking for the continuance of the grants to the different colleges. He desired to ask the Government if it was their intention to introduce an Act to renew these grants.
