

Usually all that is necessary is to place the person flat on her back, which wilease the action of the heart, while gravital tion aids in restoring the proper-amount of blood to the brain. Never allow a fainting person to maintain an upright or sitti position, as death has thus resulted from sudden heart failure. Sprinkling a few drops of cold water upon the face and cautiously holding spirits of hartshorn under the nose will aid, by reflex action, in restoring the functions of the heart and brain. Cold water should never be poured upon a fainting person, as everything beyond the first
