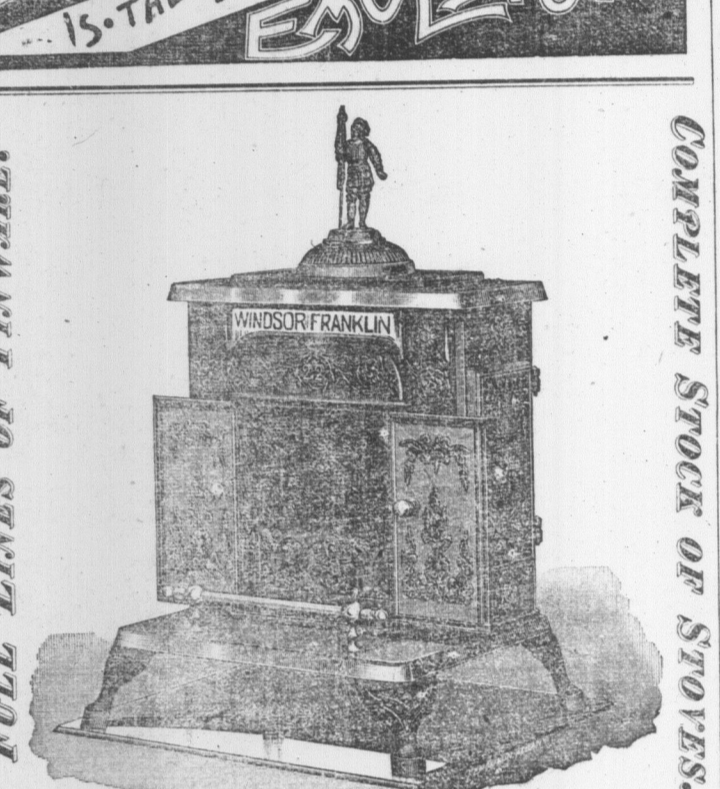

**Electricity in Surgery.**  
BY DR. A. P. FURBER, CHIEF OF THE  
FACULTY OF MEDICINE.  
Electricity is finding a wide field of  
application in surgery, says the Washington Star.  
By its aid the interior of the human body is  
actually illuminated so that the physician  
can see the internal mechanism of the  
patient and find out what is the matter.  
For instance, suppose that the digestive  
organs of a child go wrong. Perhaps the  
difficulty may be due to some object  
swallowed, like a penny. It is an easy thing  
to settle the question by lighting up the  
stomach with electricity.

The instrument devised for this purpose  
is as simple as it is ingenious. It looks like  
an ordinary rubber tube, to the end of which  
a glass plate is attached. This light  
is built in, and is passed down the throat  
of the patient, just like an ordinary  
stomach tube.

A loop of copper wire extends through  
the center of the tube. It is two  
meters long, and is attached to the  
battery. It is the work of a minute to pass  
the rubber tube down the throat of the  
patient, and to see the internal mechanism  
of the stomach. The electric current is  
turned on, and a light appears in the  
stomach, as bright as the sun. It is an  
easy thing to settle the question by  
lighting up the stomach with electricity.

If any foreign body had found lodgment  
in the organ it will appear by an opaque  
spot. In this way it is often possible to  
find out what is the matter with the  
stomach. The digestive fluids act so powerfully  
upon the rubber tube, so that the  
stomach is quickly dissolved by them. This  
is a very dangerous operation, and should  
only be performed by a physician.

Accordingly, the action commonly held  
by the general public, that a frog or a lizard  
can grow in a person's stomach is a very  
great error. No need any extract a  
dead rat or a snake from their stomachs  
develop in their hands.  
In the case of the chicken on each side  
is a small cavity known to medical science as  
the "antrum of Hyonius." Sometimes, being  
projecting through a finger which may have  
a tooth or a thing, this cavity becomes  
filled with pus.  
But if such a thing has happened, the  
physician puts into the mouth of the patient  
a small electric lamp, which has an  
attached glass plate, so that the light  
may be passed down the throat of the  
patient, and a light appears in the  
stomach, as bright as the sun. It is an  
easy thing to settle the question by  
lighting up the stomach with electricity.
