

Wrangell is Prospectors' Base

The town of Wrangell, superbly situated off the coast of South-Eastern Alaska, is the centre of unusual interest this season, as the base from which prospectors are going in large numbers up the Stikine River into the Cassiar and Dease Lake Districts of Northern British Columbia. While the Gold Rush seems not so universal as was at first predicted—during the Winter months a stampede only comparable to the rush of '98 into the Yukon was very generally foretold—it is in all likelihood a more healthy influx of practical mining men from whose explorations in these richly mineralized districts much good may be expected.

It was the Gold Rush of '98 that made of Wrangell the town that it is to-day, though it is one of the oldest settlements in Alaska. Its foundation dates back to 1830 when Baron Wrangell was Governor of Alaska, and a trading post was established there. This was later leased by the Huston's Bay Co. It was thought that Wrangell via the Stikine River would be the most direct route into the Yukon, but the building of the White Pass and Yukon R.R. destroyed such hopes. The industries of Wrangell are fishing and lumbering. Six canneries look to Wrangell as the source of their supplies, and the saw-mill furnishes a large part of the salmon boxes used in S.E. Alaska.
