English buyers of apples do not like the growing practice of some small growers of sending forward their own produce. This may seem advisable from the grower's point of view, but the buyers here say that mixed lots, say two or three barrels each, cannot be bandled to such advantage as lines of over twenty barrels of the same variety and brand; in fact, the longer the trade remains in the hands of experienced packers and sorters the better the market men like it.

Judge Horton, of Chicago, has decided that bucket shops are as legatimate as the Band of Trade, and quashed the eleven indictments against Wm. Skakel and ten others, charged with being promictors of oremployed in bucketshops. The remaining 240 cases against people who have been indicted for the same offence will be called up and will be thrown out of court. The graid jury wholly ignered Judge Horton's decision, and issued 149 more indictments against proprieters of bucket sheps.

A large gang of men are working upon both sides of the Niagara river upon the foundations for the abutment of the new steel arch to succeed the ratiosal suspension bridge. Quite an elaborate framework and stairway has been put down from the top of the bank to the point where the work is being done on the Canadian side by those engaged there. Next Tuesday a special meeting of the stockholders of the Niagara Falls International bridge company will be held at the office near the American end of the bridge to ratify an agreement made.

It has been decided by the Postoffice Department to award a contract to Capt. William Moore, the veteran explorer, to make these trips from Juneau to Ford Cudahy and Forty-mile Creek, at \$600 at trip. Owing to the extreme difficulty of the roate, only letters will be carried. The first mail leaves Victoria on May 18th by the Topeks. Capt. Moore goes to Alaska at once to make his preparations. From Juneau the mail will be carried by steamer to the head of Lynn causal, and thence will be packed by men through the White Pass resite to Tocahie, from which wont there is water communication with Fort Cudahy by the Yukon river. Hitherto there has only been one mail a year into the Yukon country.

A correspondent of the Yarmouth Herald writes as follows, re lobater fishing in the western part of Yarmouth County: "It will take a pretty numble lobater to steer clear of being caught, when we consider the immense number of traps scattered over the ground. Would Harbon alone has about 125 engaged in the business, besides two factory ganga. Allowing 100 boats and 100 traps to each, we have 10,000, and counting Shag Harbon, West Woods Harbon, Charlesville and Pubnico we may add enough to make up 25,000, and that, with the exception of Scal and Mid Islands' grounds, is over an area of about seven or eight miles by five or six off.

At a recent meeting of the two Chambers at Stockhelm it was deended in favor of raising the present duty on smoked bacon imported into Sweden from 25 ore to 50 ore per kilogramme, and also from 10 to 20 ore per kilogramme on bacon of other kinds. This increase has been made in the interests of the small peasant projectors in the Southern provinces of Sweden, but it has met with considerable opposition owing to the large amount of bacon consumed by the inhabitants of the most Northern provinces and their preference for the quality of the bacon impacted from the United States. These new rate of duty will come into force on January let next, unless the Government should in the meanwhile decide otherwise.

facturers will be compelled to go to Europe in order to get rid of their surplus gold. On the contrary, should the electorate be so steeped in ignorance as to elect their opponents, the country will be instantly plunged into an abyss of insolvency and despair, and it is doubtful if any one except millionaires will be able to afford to live within our borders Both parties are engaged in claiming that the entire energies of their leaders are absorbed in efforts to promote the commercial well-being of the country; but it does not seem to occur to either of them that the real desire of the majority of the men who carry on our great business interests is not to be either aided or hampered by fresh legislation, but simply to be left alone. If either party would assure the business world that it would neither patronize nor interfere with them during the term of its retention of office, and would guarantee that they would be left undisturbed by tariff tinkering or paternal legislation for a few years at all events, that party would be returned to office by a startling majority. Business interests in this country have suffered in the past from too much legislation rather than too little, and if those who mould our political destines would let our business men alone for a brief breathing spell, and allow them to work out their own salvation without legislative assistance, our emergence from the period of depression would not only be more speedy, but more assured.

It is the dread of the reversal, or even the alteration, of our present fiscal policy that keeps trade unsettled. Were the business world assured that a few slight changes in the tariff were all that need be dreaded, no matter which of the two great parties assumed the cares and emoluments of office, merchants and manufacturers would not be so conservative in their transactions as they are at present. But, unfortunately, the tariff question is always a favorite topic with politicians, because their parties are less seriously divided on this than on any other question, and, because no matter whether the speaker be for or against protection, it is an easy topic on which to wax eloquent. In fact, the words "protection" or " free trade" are arguments in themselves. Business appears to have followed practically the same lines as in March, and the full which almost invariably precedes the opening of navigation appears to have been the principal factor in what few fluctuations we have to record. But this very fact shows that business has evidently reached its minimum point. and we may fairly premise that, now that our brief Canadian summer is fairly under way, a considerable increase in activity in every line of commerce may fairly be expected that will leave its impress upon both the traffic returns and the bank statements.

#### THE FIRE LLOYDS.

If the decision of Mr. Justice Truax be upheld in the higher courts it looks as if the number of fire Lloyds would be very much reduced before long; even if their competition with the old line companies be not altogether eliminated. It will be remembered that, under a law passed at the close of 1892, all the Lloyds were put under the same restrictions and regulations as to capital, reserves, and supervision as the stock companies, with the exception of those who were "lawfully engaged in insurance on October 1st, 1892," who were entitled to transact business without any supervision whatsoever. Naturally there were found men shrewd enough to take advantage of this loophole, and as a consequence some hundreds of Lloyds, having each three subscribers, and each issuing one insurance policy. were formed for the purpose of having their charters sold later on. In fact one insurance broker organized thirty of these Lloyds in one day. The result was that, while previous to 30th September, 1892, there were not a dozen fire Lloyds doing business, a week later they were numbered by the hundred. All of these claimed to be continuations of associations formed prior to October 1, 1892, and the majority objected to giving the Superintendent any information about their affairs, on the ground that being so organized they were by law exempt from his supervision. There are Lloyds having ample assets, sound subscribers and careful and competent managers, although there are others which may fairly be classed as dangerous wildcats. It is in the former class that manufacturers found a source of cheap and satisfactory insurance, and. if they are closed out under this decision, large insurers may have to deal with the non-admitted foreign companies who place blank policies in the hands of brokers here but maintain no deposit in this country, and are in a position to act very arbitrarily, if they care to, in case of a fire. There should be some method of keeping up the supply of good insurance at reasonable rates, and while it is not unlikely that a few ofthe Lloyds may reorganize as stock companies, not enough of them will do this to make up for the numerous prospective retirements. Possibly some may have their members elected subscribers at some unquestioned Lloyds and then continue business as a branch of such Lloyds, but the legality of this course is likely to be contested by the Insurance Department

#### THE CITY AND DISTRICT SAV-INGS BANK.

The forty-ninth annual report of the City and District Savings Bank shows that that flourishing institution approaches the second half century of its existence under exceptionally favorable circumstances. Hard times and depression in business have evidently been powerless to check its steady advance under the skillful management of Mr. Henri Barbeau, for the net profits of the year amount to \$88,925, and this, added to the balance of profit and loss account, brought the latter up to \$236,024, although, owing to the increase in deposits and the lessened demand for loans, the profits of the year were less than was anticipated. The bank has now a reserve fund of \$400,000, and its credit balance in profit and loss is \$156,024. Truly but few who witnessed its opening on May 26th, 1816, ever anticipated that half a century later its deposits would be thirty-seven times greater than at the end of the first year of its existence, or that its depositors would have increased sixty fold!


#### THE LONDON & LANCASHIRE.







On the Stock Exchange the persistent efforts to hammer down prices seem to bear out the rumor that there is a considerable "short" interest in the market which is trying to get out before money eases up and a "squeeze" becomes possible. At all events, the belief that such an interest exists has stiffened holders' views immensely, for none of the leading stocks displayed the least signs of weakness, and every effort to shake out any investment stock has failed utterly. Investors appear tolerably secure that no change of importance in the country's fiscal policy is likely to occur, and hence are holding firmly to their stock in the belief that the next turn of the market will be upward. Indeed seldom have unpending elections been received with so much apathy in this city, or so little interest been manifested by the general public in the fortunes of the respective candidates, as at present. What excitement there is exists only at political headquarters and the newspaper offices. The business com .munify seem scarcely aware that a contest is in progress, and it is freely predicted that the vote polled will be an unusually light one for a general relection.

#### REAL ESTATE SALES.

According to the Real Estate Record, the sales during the month of April in this city were heaviest in St. Antoine and St. Ann's wards, and at Westmount. In the two wards above named the transfers of the Clendinneng properties to the People's Bank are a prominent feature, in Westmount the sales of built pro perties pred-minated. In the mortgage loan market the supply of money is ample for all the good mortgages offering, and although there is apparently no change in rates, the occasional appearance of a four and a hall per cent loan indicates that the tendency is to lower rates of interest, when this becomes a settled fact it will when this becomes a settled fact it will have its influence in sustaining real estate values. The sales recorded in April at Maisonneuve, Mile End, Montreal Annex, Outremont, Cote des Neiges, St. Henry, Ste. Cunegonde and Notre Dame de Grace, amount to about \$120,000, of which St. Henry contributed \$54,500, Ste. Cunegonde \$18,700, and Montreal Annex about \$18,000. There were 126 real estate transfers in the city wards and Town of Westmount, recorded at the registry office during the month of April, amounting to \$521,675. month of April, amounting to \$521,675. During the corresponding month of last year 91 transfers were recorded, amounting to \$414,780. The real estate mortgage loans, recorded during the month of April in registration division of Montreal West, amount to \$150,853. Of this amount \$35,000 was placed at 41 p.c.; \$85,000 at 5 p.c.; \$5,150 at 51 per cent.; \$12,000 at 6 p.c.; \$5,000 at 7 p.c.; \$300 at 8 p.c.; \$1,200 at 10 p.c., and \$12,213 at a nominal rate. 
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
#### Montreal Cholesale Markets.
