


YOU WHO HAVE SERVED DURING THE GREAT WAR 1914-1919

E bid a hearty welcome to you who have come back, and to you who have served in the home field. We consider it a great honour to have you with us to-night, and to be able to express this slight tribute to the work you have accomplished during the Great War. It was our privilege to

bid you farewell one by one as you went forward on behalf of the Great Cause. It was an anxious time, and often were we on the verge of trembling. But at times our hearts were stirred by the news of the manner in which you upheld the honour of the old flag, and incidentally, St. James' Church.

And in gathering here we are not unmindful of those who have not come back—men who gave their lives on behalf of King and country, and all that we hold sacred and dear. We honour them; their names are engraven upon our hearts, and time will add lnstre to their fame.

Many of you who have come back have not escaped unscathed from the fiery ordeal through which you passed. You bear upon your bodies the scars of many a stern fight, but they are the scars of honour, won on behalf of truth and righteousness. Some of you have been awarded medals of distinction for special deeds of heroism.
