BARTON CITIZENS WAIT FOR WATER

Agreement Granting Them Supply Referred Back by City Council.

MEMORIAL TO SOLDIERS To Be Installed in City Hall by the Canadian Club.

By a Staff Reporter. HAMILTON, Wednesday, Sept. 15.—Despite the fact that many members of the city council favored passing the agreement granting the application of Barton Township for water and sewerage accommodation, the council last night referred the matter back for further consideration. When the agreement was presented to the council it was by the works committee that it was passed. Controller Cooper objected to its being considered, claiming that there were many clauses in it which were not favorable to the interests of the city. He thought that the question had not been given enough consideration by the members of the special committee which had it in hand, and said that a change should be made in practically every clause of the agreement so that the interests of the city will be better protected. He asked that the whole matter be referred back to be dealt with by a joint committee of the works committee and board of control, and that both city solicitor Waddell and city engineer MacCallum be consulted before a final agreement is drawn up.

Memorial to Soldiers. The Canadian Club to install an inscriptive memorial tablet in the city hall, to be dedicated to the names of Hamilton men killed in the present war or in any other heroic manner. The tablet will be placed in the hall and will erect the tablet and maintain it for all time.

That the city clerk be authorized to place the fire insurance on city property on the basis of 40 per cent. in tariff and 40 per cent. in non-renewal, and to be licensed to do business in Canada, and to be authorized to accept the insurance acts of the Dominion of Canada and Province of Ontario and at an approximate cost of \$5000.

The club, and which bears date Sept. 10, 1915. The cablegram reads as follows: "Total money eight thousand, seven hundred and twenty-three pounds received from Canada for tobacco fund from October to end August. One hundred and fifty-two thousand parcels despatched in same period, each parcel value twenty-five cents. Total contents seven million, six hundred thousand cigarettes and thirty-eight thousand pounds tobacco. Balance Canadian cash in hand, eleven hundred and twenty-three pounds. Please appreciate that two months and more must necessarily elapse before subscribers can receive post cards from the front. Delays arise thru customs formations, military authorities and war exigencies generally. Everything possible being done expedite deliveries but abnormal times abnormal delays. Post cards should be delivered Canada free."

"From this it will be seen that the total sum subscribed, \$2123 sterling represents 174,460 packets, at the rate twenty packets to the pound sterling, presenting twenty-five cents. Of these, 152,000 packets have been forwarded to the front, leaving a balance of 22,460. The balance of 22,460, if multiplied by twenty covers the exact number, 22,460, and it will thus be seen that the complete balance sheet is presented so far as moneys remitted to London are concerned.

"Of course there are other moneys in transit and which are being paid into the bank each day, and it should be borne in mind, as pointed out by the cablegram, that a portion of something like two months must elapse before the packets subscribed for can reach the front and an acknowledgment be received by the donors in Canada; and further, it is impossible to ensure that every recipient of the packets will take the trouble to fill up the postcard addressed to the donor which is enclosed in each packet sent.

"In the issue of The Toronto Sunday World of Sept. 12, 1915, answers were demanded to various questions. "It was pointed out that on or about June 12 last Mr. Private cabled to a tobacco firm in London asking for quotations for 100,000 packets. The World became possessed of a cablegram from Mr. Private to Messrs. Mans, Lamb, and Co., London, asking for quotations for the supply of tobacco to the Overseas Club, but there is no doubt that such a cable was sent, and when it is understood that great pressure was being brought to bear on Mr. Private to secure the cablegram, it is not surprising that Canadian troops, it should be appreciated that in getting into direct contact with the suppliers in England he would be placed in a position to express the wishes of the Canadian public.

"It is stated that in The Evening Telegram of July 20, 1915, an advertisement announced the sending of full four ounce packages of tobacco, and a reference is made to a package weighing 3 1-5 ounces, but at this time arrangements had not been concluded for the supply of tobacco to the Overseas Club, and it was when a supply of the best Canadian tobacco was arranged in the winter of 1914, that the advertisement was altered to make it read:

"Your donations provides 50 cigars, a packet of Canadian manufactured smoking tobacco, matches, and a return postcard addressed to the donor of the package."

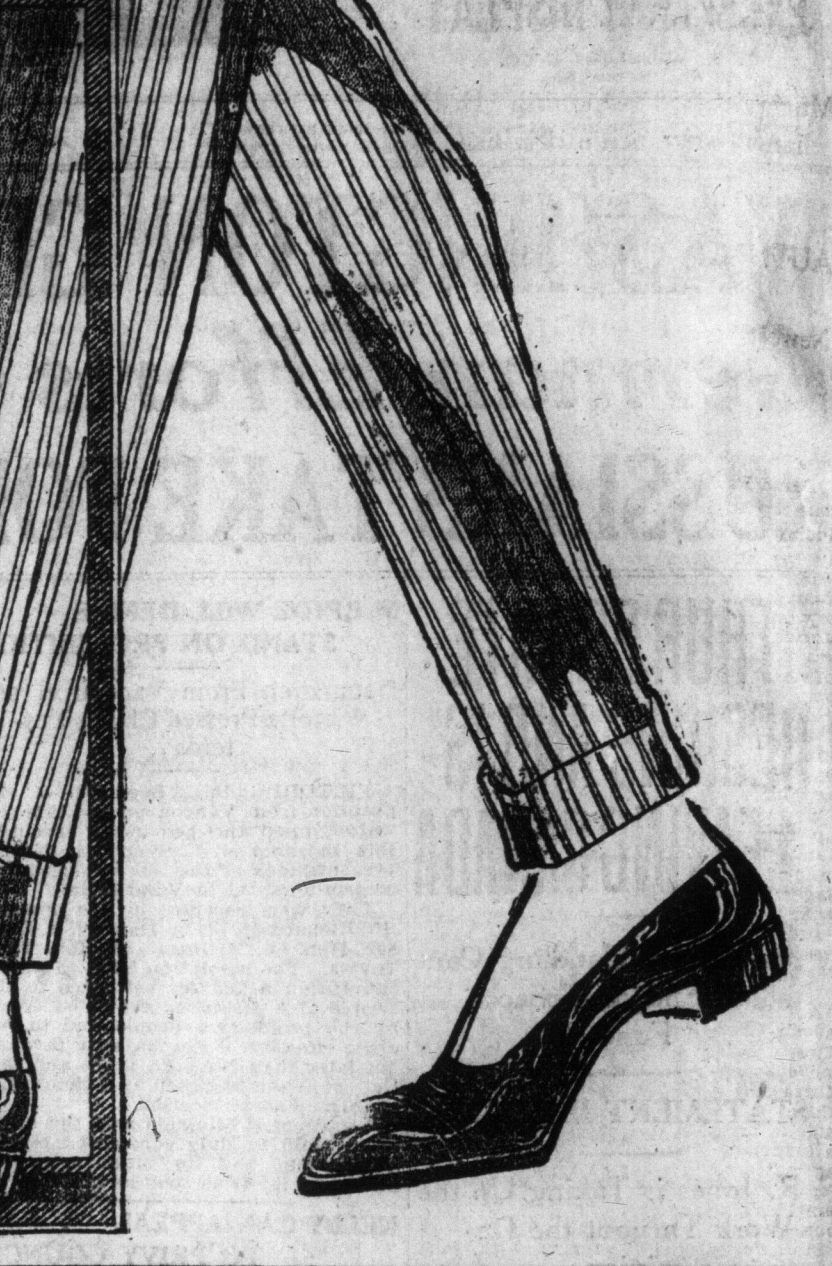

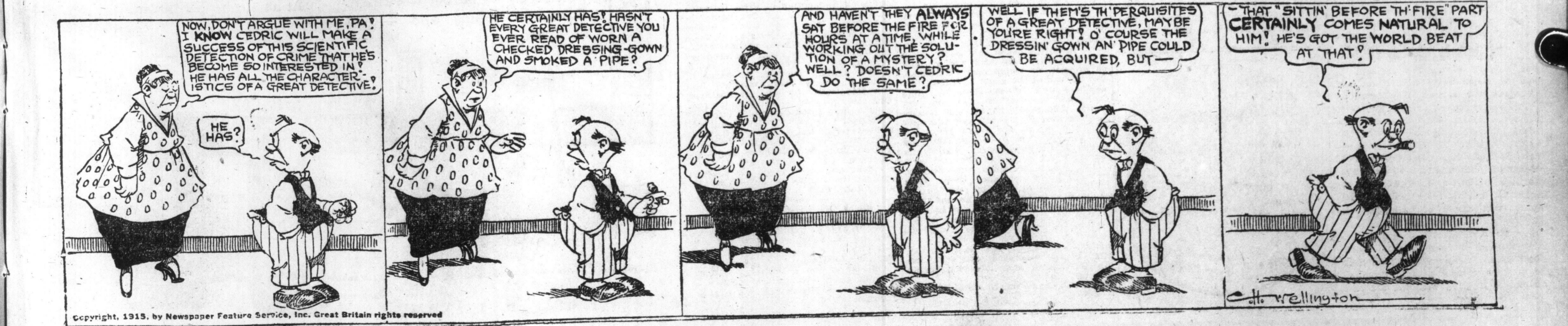
