DEMobilIZATION A MUNICIPAL MATTER

City Should Take Lead in Getting Reports From Employers.

The mayor's suggestion in reference to the reconstruction and demobilization of the troops was taken up by the board of control at their meeting yesterday. "This is not only a federal matter but a municipal one," said the mayor. "Each municipality should look after its own. We don't want Toronto to be a dumping ground, not from a soldier, but from a labor standpoint. Now is the time to get the information. It should have been got six months ago. My proposition is to find out who the Toronto men are, who their employers are and if they intend to take the men back. "The federal government should do like the United States Government is doing, assume absolute control of the physical reclamation of the soldiers."

UNITED STATES HAS ONE THOUSAND LEPERS

It was reported by the treasurer, Miss Lila Watt, that \$1,521.02 had been received from Toronto since the beginning of the year. The Mrs. James Watt memorial fund now stands at \$1194.

VICTORIA CRECHE ANNUAL MEETING.

The 21st annual meeting of the Victoria street creche was held yesterday afternoon at the day nursery, 374 Victoria street. J. P. Watson occupied the chair. The report of the president, Lady Moss, was heard with a great deal of interest, 19,158 children being cared for during the year, an increase of 878 over last year. It is estimated that from 35 to 50 women take advantage of the creche daily, which is under the direction of the department of public health. COUNCIL OF WOMEN EXCLUDE ENEMIES

Local Council of Women Repudiate Connection With Germans and Austrians. Subjects taken up at the meeting of the Local Council of Women held at the Sherbourne House Club yesterday afternoon were for the most part a continuation of the discussion on the questions of affiliation with women of alien countries and the doing away with the office of advisory president. Both of these questions had been matter of warm debate at a previous meeting. Yesterday on behalf of the officers of the Toronto council, Mrs. Campbell Meyers read a statement and later moved a resolution to the effect that the local council repudiate connection with the women of Germany and Austria thru the international council and pledge themselves to do all possible for the formation of a new organization which will exclude women other than those of the countries of the allies.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN EXCLUDE ENEMIES

It was pointed out by Mrs. L. A. Hamilton that the resolution excluded women of neutral countries and those of the United States, but an amendment that would have made this point clearer in the eyes of the mover was lost. A resolution, also moved by Mrs. Hamilton, purporting to call on record as wishing to cut themselves off from all association with women of the enemy countries was carried. On motion of the Social Science Club, seconded by the Business Women's Club, it was decided to ask the national council to do away with the office of advisory president. All the questions brought forward elicited opinions pro and con from a number of speakers, many being of the conviction that changes that might tend to disintegrate existing conditions in any way were not opportune.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN EXCLUDE ENEMIES

The nomination of officers was held at the conclusion of the discussions, among the names brought forward for president being Mesdames A. M. Huestis, W. G. A. Lamie, Plumpre and Sidney Small. An announcement has been made that restrictions against women traveling across the Atlantic have been removed. A permit and passport from the department of state at Ottawa are still required.

ROSEDALE RAVINE TREE-CUTTING.

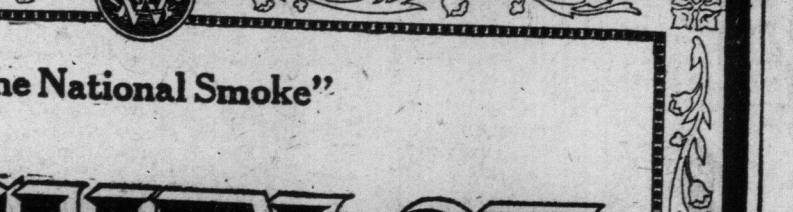

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NEW YORK STOCKS MAKE GOOD RALLY

Railroad Situation Viewed More Hopefully—Outlook for Easier Money.

New York, Nov. 26.—Disregarding such widely divergent elements as easier money and reports of additional withdrawals of war contracts, today's stock market steadily recovered from its heavy opening, recording many material advances over the previous session's general depression.

Signs of an early relaxation of money were afforded by the further appearance of time funds from interior banks, with offers of six and seven per cent, with loans at six per cent. Call loans were freely offered at five per cent, on mixed collateral.

Traders seemed to view the railroad situation as precipitated by Secretary McAdoo's coming retirement, with less misgivings and more confidence in the high-class transportation industry.

Most of the steels and equipments registered substantial upward progress with some of further price cuttings. Oils purchased by the United States, particularly the higher, Swiss and Spanish bills also had been held.

The other adverse feature was the bond market, where quotations showed generally a further decline against one-year issues, the four 4 1/2% making an old new low record at 97.08.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

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VICTORY BOND TRADING

It is officially announced by G. H. Wood, chairman, that the Victory Loan special committee will resume trading in all maturing bonds, and will commence trading in both maturities of the 1918 Victory bonds on Monday next, Dec. 2.

WASAPIKA SELLERS AT RECORD PRICE

Kirkland Lake, Davidson, Beaver and Timiskaming Score Fresh Advances.

Trading on the Standard Exchange yesterday reached the greatest volume in some days, exceeding 221,000 shares, the usual heavy volume distributed through both the gold and silver groups.

CORN PRICES CLIMB ON SHORT COVERING

Fear of New Restrictions on Trading Causes Bulge at Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Anxiety of shorts for new restrictions on trading were contemplated brought about sharp bulges today in the corn market. Prices closed strong, 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 cent higher, with December 31.25 1/2 and January 31.25 to 31.25 1/2. Dated grain to 1 1/2, and provisions finished unchanged to 5 1/2 up.

Uneasiness on the part of shorts in corn resulted chiefly from semi-official investigation of the question whether short selling of corn might not advantageously be banned, as already the case with cotton. Scrutiny on this line was construed in some quarters as a threat of drastic measures against speculative shorts. A series of furies to cover resulted, and also sharp reactions intervened.

Provisions averaged higher, owing to the upturn in the corn market. Besides, shipments of lard materially exceeded the amount a year ago.

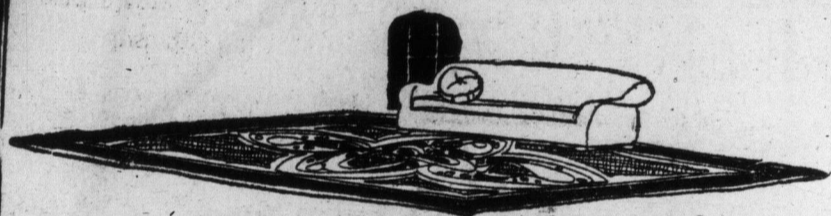
