When the House went into Committee of Supply, Mr. Blair entered upon an elaborate defence of his position on the mat document laid on the table on the 10th House when he said the other day that the contract was for one year only. With the object of encouraging the manufacture of steel rails in Canada, negotiations were opened with Mr. Clergue in June, when Ayer's Sarsaparilla.

When he heard read the document which he laid on the table the other day—the draft contract setting forth an agreement for five years—it was a surprise to him. He had never seen the draft. 





OBJECT IS TO SECURE BUSINESS.

Line of Steamers May Be Put on From Vancouver to Vladivostock if Report is Good.

Montreal, Que., April 23 .- (Special.)-Mr. Whyte's first official duties after being Canadian Pacific will be beneficial both to the road and to the Dominion. For a year past Mr. Shaughnessy has given a good deal of thought to the future possibilities of the vast country traversed by billities of the vast country traversed by the trans-Siberian Railway, and he has come to the conclusion that the great Asiatic Empire of the Czar offers a profitable field for Canadian manufactured goods, such as farming implements and the like. Mr. Whyte has therefore been instructed to proceed to London and thence to St. Petersburg, where he will be fully and officially accredited to the army of people with whom he will come into contact, while en route for Vladivostock, the great Russian Pacific terminus of the railway while en route for Vladivostock, the great Russian Pacific terminus of the rallway in question. The trans-Siberlan road is not completed clear thru to the Pacific, but Mr. Whyte does not apprehend any difficulty in reaching Vladivostock, returning home by the Pacific Ocean to Vancouver. If the country en route in Russian Asia looks as if a good trade could be worked up with Canada, the C.P.R. will undoubtedly put on a line of steamers between Vancouver and Vladivostock, some 4500 miles apart. No one will question Mr. Whyte's special fitness for the duties which President Shaughnessy has requested him to perform, and his report will be looked for with the greatest interest by the whole Dominion. Mr. Whyte left for Toronto this evening en route for Winnipeg.


