





RIVER RHONE RISING.

Geneva, Switzerland, July 17.—The River Rhone has risen a few inches since yesterday, causing increased anxiety. The floods are extending in the lowlands. Part of the village of Hellau, Canton of Schaffhausen, has been destroyed.

INEXPENSIVE SALMON FISHING.

Cornwall Journalist Describes the MONEY Sport and Tells What It Costs, C. W. Young of the Cornwall, Ont., MONEY

C. W. Young of the Cornwall, Ont., Freeholder has the following article in Forest and Stream of July 5:
How much does it cost to kill a salmon?
Well, that depends. If you are a member of the Restigouche Club your bill may run up a thousand or more, but ordinary mertals can do it for a good deal less.
I dropped off at Campbellton, N.E., on a mid-June morning, and look at up Billy Sproul of the Royal Hotel, and got a pointer or two. At 6 o'clock I took an accommodation train a few miles west of Flat Lands, hailed a fatherly old zellow, Wim. Delaney, caretaker of the Montgomery and Suction Water, and stated the case, William had a canoe, but no other man was presently available, so we two went out when a was presently available, so we two went out when. Sproul is its prophet—good sportsman, with an intimate knowledge of all the water. Decidedly a good man to write to. The agent of the I.C.R. at Flat Lands will also answer any questions addressed to him. Good board may be had at Flat Lands and at farmhouses in the neighborhood. In the early season. May and up to the middle of June, there is considerable good water that is also entirely free for salmon fishing—from the lower limits of the Restigouche Club, a mile below the Metapedia birdge, to tidewater—say seven miles in all—there is no restriction on catching trout anywhere you are likely to get them. During my three days' stay this year some thirty salmon—many over 30 pounds each—were killed in the water I have mentioned. Good stretches of water can be had below Metapedia at \$1 to \$2 per day, and still better water on the Metapedia and Restigouche up to \$10 a day. Mr. Alex. Mowat, Campbellton, N.B., has several excellent stretches very accessible, good all thru the season, at varying prices. W. A. Mott, M.L.A.. Campbellton, N. How Salmon Waters Are Reached.

Practically all the salmon fishing in Canada is reached by the Intercolondal Railway. The Restigouche, with its tributaries the Metapedia, Causapscal and Upsalquitch, are the nearest to Montreal. The I.C.R. follows the Metapedia for almost 50 miles, to where it empties into the Restigouche at Metapedia Station, 8 miles above tidewater. The Causapscal joins the Metapedia 35 miles above Metapedia Station.

The Causapscal is owned entirely by the Restigouche Club, who also control most of the Metapedia, and a good deal of the Restigouche.

The Upsalquitch has been reserved by the New Brunswick government, and is leased at \$2 per day per rod. There is a great deal of good water, and a dozen or more fishermen would not be in each other's way. Fishing in the Restigouche and Metapedia is good from May until August, the Upsalquitch is at its best in July. The salmon in each river are entirely dispinct and can be told at a glance by the guides; those in the Upsalquitch are a triffe smaller than the others.

Campbellton, N. B., at the mouth of the river, is the only considerable town in the Restigouche country, and is a good place for headquarters. The Royal, aforesaid is a good friendly place to stop, cheap withal and Billy Sproul is its prophet—good sportsman, with an intimate knowledge of all the water. Decidedly a good man to write to. 
