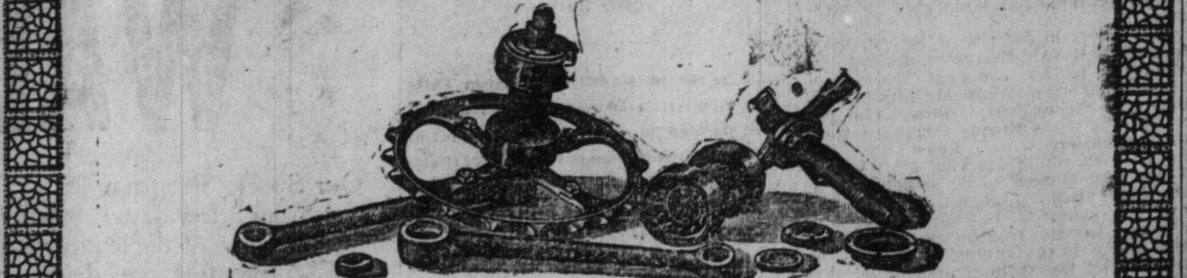

ALL GOOD CITIZENS, TOO

Every man who went into the woods if he had a right spirit in him his thoughts went Godward. It was the Great Teacher himself who was teaching in the country, among the flowers, and who said: "Consider the lilies," yet it is the bicycle riders who went to High Park on Sunday did more damage than 1000 churches could repair. But when they were there they were resting. It was rest they were getting there; a better rest than they could get within the four walls of their home, for a change was a rest. When the church hour came round they went all found coming home. There was not a better class of people in the city than the bicyclists. It was said that they themselves. [Cries of "No, no!"] He has a better opinion of them than that of any man who had so little faith in the motives of humanity. [Applause.]

It would not degrade morals. As to the argument that the cars would degrade the morals of the people, Sunday cars could change the character of the people of any city. The Sabbaritarians were arguing from the old Jewish law, with its "Thou shalt not go by in training the young people wastard of 'Thou shalt.' Sabbaritarians did not exist people, but righteous men did, and righteousness could be had without Sabbaritarians. It was meant to say, and he dictated by his body of men, and to vote according to their own conscience, utterly regardless of either priest or presbyter. [Loud Applause.]

A THOUSAND TONGUES SAID "YES" When Mr. Maclean Asked the Meeting if it Favored Sunday Cars. W. F. Maclean, M.P., asked the men present if they wanted Sunday cars, and was answered by a thousand cries of "Yes." Then the ladies were asked if they wanted Sunday cars. Without hesitation and with much enthusiasm scores of them answered, "Certainly" and "Yes" amid the applause of the big gathering. Then Mr. Maclean, addressing the whole audience, said that they wanted the cars to go to beer gardens and a loud, decisive "No" came from the crowd. He said that the people would have them. They had a legal right to them. Even the Court of Appeal of Ontario had decided that the people had a right to the cars if they wanted them. "You shall not have the cars," but the people would vindicate their rights. They wanted the right of moving about on Sunday as well as on any other day. Only the rich could afford to buy cars, but if a Sunday car service was introduced the poor man with his 25 cents could buy seven tickets, the cheapest transportation in America.

Where They Met. The people who were trying to prevent the introduction of Sunday cars would not dare to interfere with the rich or the poor and the young, the old, the infirm, the weak and the strong. It was alone in advocating them, but in substance to vote for Sunday cars if you considered the working men fully protected. Another newspaper man had given instruction that no opinion, pro or con, on this question should be published in his paper, and it was said on good authority that he himself would vote for the cars. The opponents of the cars were very active and they would probably get a last crack at the advocates of the cars from the pulpit on Sunday. Those who favored the cars must work enthusiastically and see that the full force of the law was put on the cars. Those who wanted the work that Sunday cars would bring, and 200 men would be given steady employment. This means an increase of a thousand in Toronto's population and the filling of many vacant houses.

Mr. JOHN ARMSTRONG. He speaks on Behalf of the Workingmen Who Want This Convenience. Mr. John Armstrong was the last speaker and spoke for the workingmen. He had supported Sunday cars before and would do so again. He reminded those who were fearful that the operation of the cars would be dangerous to the interests of employees that, according to the agreement, no man would be compelled to work more than 60 hours a week, as no man was now working more than 54 hours to the week. He could not understand what made the clergy so zealous about the workingmen on such occasions as the present. It looked suspicious. He believed that if the clergymen would stand up for the workingmen a little oftener than once every four years their churches would be better filled. After Dr. Sutherland. The speaker then went on to tell how Rev. Dr. Sutherland, who was not a printer, had rolled up his sleeves and gone to work to take the place of a man on strike for his rights. Mr. Henry O'Brien, another gentleman figurative in the campaign, had also appeared in a position equally antagonistic to labor's interests. It was strange that it was not immoral to ride in Sunday cars in Great Britain, while it was so here. Some people thought it immoral to ride in cars, while it was very proper to ride in hacks. The speaker had never heard a preacher complain about the printer working on Sunday evening to print a paper for them to read next at their breakfast table. Why Some Preachers Kicked. He had heard preachers kick, however, if that paper did not get to their houses early enough on Monday morning to suit them. He then went on to tell how, in his experience as a printer, he had seen ministers come down about 10:30 on Sunday night with reports of their own sermons, and how he had tapped them on the shoulder to remind them that it was Sunday. It was enough to make a communicant audit in any poor man to see his wealthier fellow-men riding around in carriages, while they were not allowed the privilege of paying 5 cents to have a ride themselves. As to the argument, he thought the law of the survival of the fittest should apply. After an appeal to his hearers to vote to give the women a chance to visit the resting places of the dead, Mr. Armstrong concluded by remarking that the best test of the need of Sunday cars would be to run them, when, if they were not needed, it would be seen that the country would not be petrified and would run into the shoals. The great and enthusiastic gathering broke up with cheers for the Queen.

PLACER GOLD IN ONTARIO.

Belief That Such Districts Do Exist Here.

THE RAINY RIVER REGION

Described in a Pamphlet Written by Mr. W. Hamilton Merritt.

Where the Gold Occurs—Facts About Mines' Wages—Says River Country Looking Well—Assay Office of the Foley Mine Barred to the Ground—A Toronto Company to Develop a New Property—Silver Mine Sold.

Remnants of placer gold being found in different parts of Ontario's northwestern gold fields have been in circulation for some time, and it may be that this form of mining may yet divide with quartz mining the interest that is being given.

RAINY RIVER REGION.

Extracts From Mr. W. Hamilton Merritt's Paper Regarding Western Gold Fields.

The world has a copy of Mr. W. Hamilton Merritt's paper on "The Occurrence of Gold-ores in the Rainy River District," just printed in pamphlet form.

The general characteristics of the Huronian rocks in the Laurentian, which is the predominant formation in the Rainy River region, are as follows:

One of the richest veins of gold-bearing rock yet discovered in Madoc township is that found on the farm of Mr. John Eagleson, south 1 1/2 of lot 13, in the 10th concession, and the vein extends across into mile road into adjoining lots. The North Hastings Review says that samples show one fine vein yielding with gold and assaying \$150 to the ton.

MORE RICH DISCOVERIES.

Camp McKinney Shows Lots of Free Milling Ore.

COPPER ON BOWEN ISLAND

A Crusade to be Started Against the British Columbia Government.

In Connection With Granting of Cash and Land Subsidies to Railway Corporations—Have Searched Been Improperly Made?—Quartz Creek to Become Famous—Matters of Interest in General Mining.

British Columbia seems to contain lots of free-milling as well as refractory gold ore. Besides there being free-milling ore in Camp McKinney and at other points, great excitement prevails over several rich discoveries near Wharrock. In some of the samples of quartz brought in free gold can be plainly seen, while other samples show yellow iron pyrites in large quantities, some mineralized to fifty per cent. The largest ledge yet discovered is that belonging to James Holley, 40 feet wide and 100 feet high, highly mineralized and carrying both gold and silver.

L. C. York and J. A. Williamson have several good claims, one of which has a ledge of white quartz, 35 feet wide, carrying gold. Everything indicates that this is a good mineral district. Assays run all the way from traces up to \$150 per ton, principally in gold, and this too from surface croppings.

Gold Mining on the Islands. Mr. W. M. Platt of Victoria-street, Toronto, reports that mining is very active on the coast and on Bowen Island, Vancouver.
