ITALIANS DESTROYED POSITIONS ON ISONZO

Large Section of Austrian Defences Wrecked Near Piava.

ROME, March 13.—A large section of the Austrian defence in the region of Piava, on the Isonzo front, was destroyed by the Italians yesterday. First they heavily bombarded the positions, damaging them greatly, and next they sent machine gun and bombing detachments, and saw that the destruction was complete.

UNITED STATES AND GARRANZA IN AGREEMENT

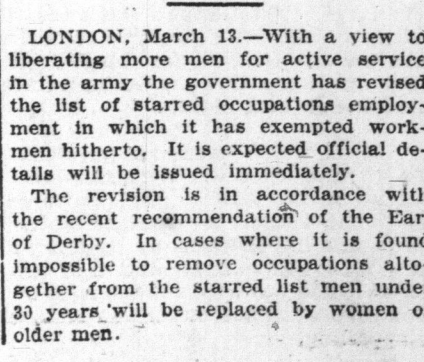
