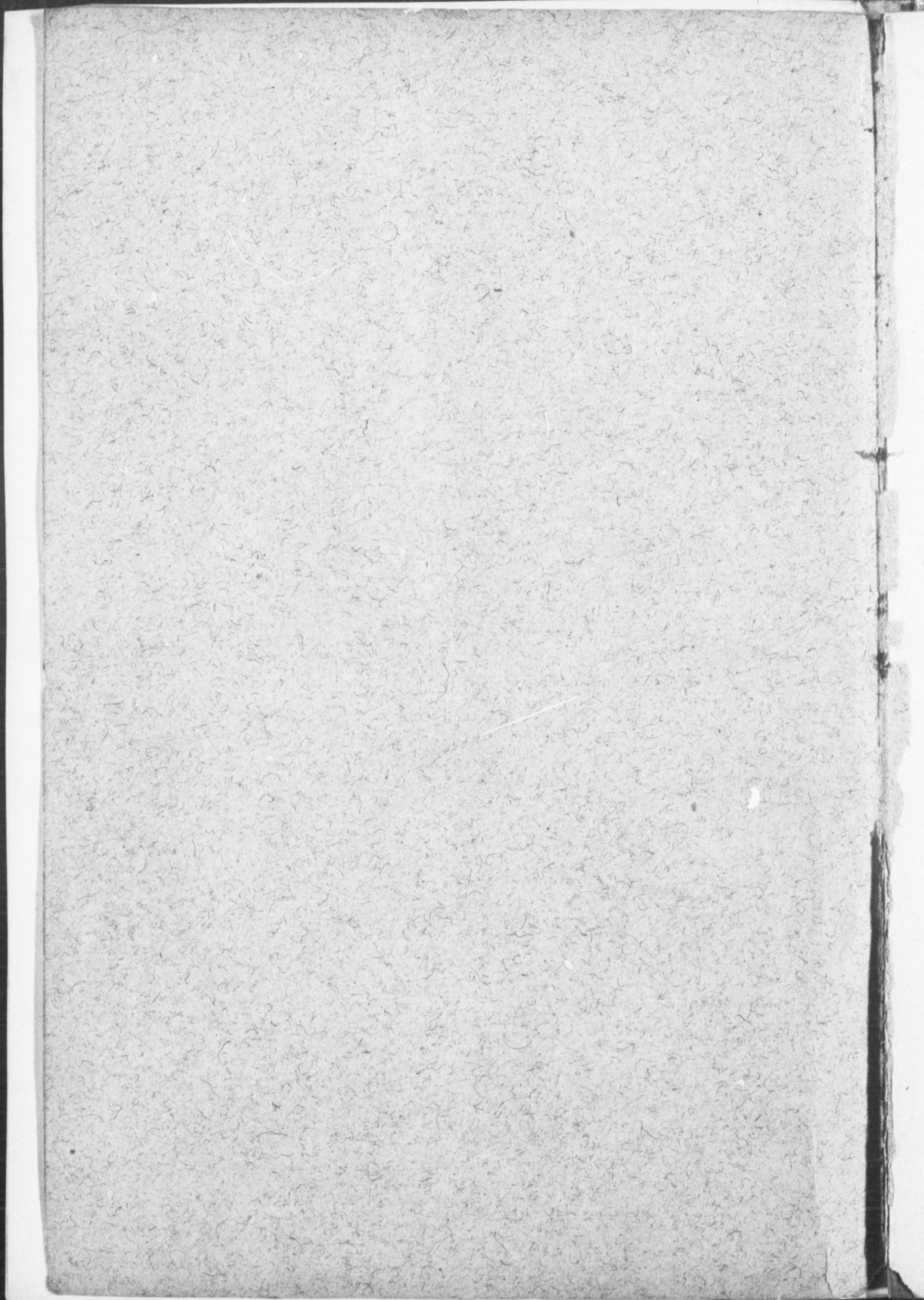

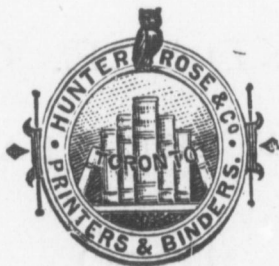
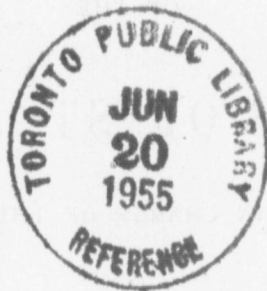

TO THE BENEFACTORS
OF THE
SACRED HEART ORPHANAGE.

We now present for the first time the report of the Sisters of St. Joseph in charge of the Sacred Heart Male Orphanage, now a separate Institution from the House of Providence.

It has been commenced under very favourable auspices. The location is excellent. It is sufficiently near Toronto to enjoy its advantages. It is very well equipped for school and gardening purposes, and the inmates are strong and healthy and give good promise of success in their future life. The boys learn the use of the sewing machine, and are able to make their own clothes, and when they become a little older they will be able to make their own shoes, and to begin the carpentering trade. All this is a great improvement over the former condition of the boys at the House of Providence.

The accounts rendered are very satisfactory, and great thanks are due to the generous benefactors of the Orphanage. A certain number of the parishes of the Diocese, in which collections were formerly made for the House of Providence, have been assigned for the support of the new Home.

It will also receive a portion of the Government and City Grants in proportion to its population. Charitable donations and legacies for the benefit of this Orphanage must be made specifi-

cally for that purpose. The Orphanage will also have the benefit of a picnic annually on 1st July.

We are happy to have been able to assign a chaplain to the Orphanage as well as to the House of Providence, whence the inmates have the inestimable advantages of Mass, sacraments, and instructions.

The dedication of the Institution to the Sacred Heart of our Lord will ensure bounteous blessings both on its inmates and on its benefactors.

SOUTH ADJALA—Cash \$121 ; one hundred and twenty-one bags of wheat and flour, three barrels of meat, a tub of butter and two bags of sundries.

NORTH ADJALA—Cash \$57 ; forty-seven bags of wheat, one barrel of meat and one bag of sundries.

CALEDON AND ALBION—Cash \$43 ; sixty-five bags of wheat and flour, three bags of meat and a bag of sundries.

FLOS AND MEDONTE—Cash \$100 ; seventy-five bags of wheat and flour, one barrel of meat, wool and sundries.

ORANGEVILLE AND BRAMPTON—Cash \$113 and five bags of flour.

SCHOMBERG—Cash \$22 ; fifteen bags of wheat and flour and a bag of meat.

STAYNER—Cash \$38.

STREETSVILLE—Cash \$52.55 ; seven bags of flour, five hams, twenty-two bags of potatoes and sundries.

BROCKTON—Thirty bags of potatoes.
