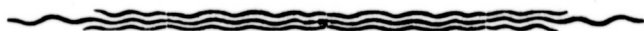

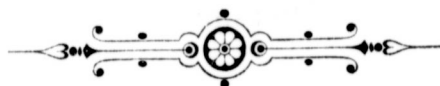

ANS.—Thomas Fox, who was born in Devonshire, England, in the year 1810. Being made deeply sensible of his guilt and danger by the Holy Spirit, he sought and obtained peace with God, through faith in the atonement of Christ. In various ways he then endeavoured to be useful and ultimately became a Local Preacher. Holding this position in the Methodist Church, in the Providence of God, he came to this country in 1835 or 1836, and was employed for many years by the Chairman of the District as a lay-agent.

In 1856 he was duly recommended as a Candidate for our ministry and appointed to the Hant's Harbour Circuit. As a Methodist Minister his attachment to our constitution was ardent and the result of conviction. He cherished esteem for the brethren. His piety was deep and he constantly aimed at living

to the glory of God. As a Preacher his great object appeared to be to save souls. He was a good pastor, a man of prayer. He was esteemed and beloved generally in the Circuits where he laboured, and it pleased the Head of the Church to bless him with considerable success. He knew what it was to partake of sorrow and bereavement, but in the midst thereof "he endured as seeing Him who is invisible." In 1876 he retired from the active work and went to reside at Topsail, still, however, occupying himself in the Master's service till the infirmities of advanced age overtook him, but still leaning upon the sacrifice of Christ he waited for the Master's call to come up higher. On Sabbath morning, March 31st, he calmly fell asleep in Jesus, in the eightieth year of his age, and the thirty-third of his ministry.

COLLEGE REPORT—June 1889.

The College Executive deeply regret that their Report of the past year's operations will not realize the hopes and expectations that were entertained at the beginning of the year.

Starting out with all departments of the College fully equipped and in charge of competent teachers, with the Home comfortably furnished and provided with all the requirements of such an Institution, it did seem as if we were at last fairly on the road to success.

The Home was opened for boarders in September, and by the end of that term the number had run up to 27. At the Executive meeting of January 16th, the Governor reported its financial success assured.

Towards the close of 1888, the continued and increasing illness of the late Treasurer, Hon. C. R. Ayre, threw a shadow of coming trouble over the Institution; and the subsequent spread of diphtheria until it became epidemic, led to the compulsory suspension of school work and the breaking up of the Home in the middle of the term. The immediate financial loss entailed by this calamity we fear will be intensified by its effect upon the attendance of the pupils at the beginning of the fall term, even should we be permitted to re-open at the usual time.

To this balance in Bank there should be added an estimated sum of say \$250 for fees not yet collected.

The total cost of College and Home including removal of Model School, furnishing Home, seating hall and outside walls, &c., is \$39,734.42; of this amount there has been paid by contributions, including Bazaar, Lectures, &c., the sum of \$22,268.60, leaving a balance on loan of \$17,465.82 at 4 per cent. and 4½ per cent.

Against this indebtedness there are contributions promised and fairly reliable to the extent of \$1,800. The total receipts of the Home were \$3,096.12, and the expenditure, including Guardian's salary, \$2,490.35. Balance to credit of building and furnishing account \$605.77. For this encouraging result we are largely indebted to the able management of the Guardian, Rev. G. P. Story, aided by his esteemed wife. By the will of the late James J. Milley, Esq., the

College has received a bequest of \$900, on which is paid interest to his mother during her life at the rate of 4½ per cent.; after her death this amount will be available for school purposes.

In addition to the generous donation of \$4,000 during his life, the late Hon. C. R. Ayre has left on record another proof of his love for the College in the magnificent bequests of \$3,000 for an organ to be placed in the hall and \$500 towards the erection of an iron fence around the buildings, the latter amount with \$340 already promised by others will enable the executive to erect this fence with little if any charge on the general fund.

"Jubilee Hall" has been comfortably seated with 655 chairs at a cost of \$1,384.22. We are indebted to our chairman, Rev. G. J. Bond, B.A., for \$332.47; of this amount as net proceeds of a series of Illustrated Lectures on the Holy Land, delivered by him in 1888 and 1889. Unfortunately, in this as in other respects, we have suffered financially from the fear of contagion abroad in the community during the past winter, which deterred many from attending the Lectures.

Although, in beginning this report, we had to strike a minor chord, yet in concluding, the executive feel equally impelled to express the conviction that this enterprise has the Divine Seal and approbation; and that by the good Providence of God the overhanging cloud will be swept away. If we continue faithful in prayer and effort, this College and Home will become not only a financial success but a power for God and Methodism in Newfoundland.

It is a sacred trust committed to us, not for St. John's, but for the whole Island. Every Methodist is directly or indirectly, or relatively, a sharer of its benefits in himself or in his posterity, and he should be made to feel his responsibility in relation to it. If we sustain it, it will elevate us as a people, and create in the Church a more intelligent piety and a broader spirit of benevolence.

We trust, that by the blessing of Almighty God and the hearty co-operation of our members and people, these Institutions will be a greater power for good in the future than they have been in the past.

Secretary-Treasurer.

SUSTENTATION FUND.

1. This Fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Newfoundland Conference of the Methodist Church.

2. The object of the Fund shall be to augment the salaries of Ministers and Probationers on dependent Circuits.

3. The basis of salary shall be married men \$800; single ordained \$450; unordained \$400; but no grants shall be made from this Fund to married Ministers whose salary, exclusive of Children's claims, amount to \$600; nor to single ordained and probationers, whose salaries amount to \$320 and \$300 respectively, until the salaries of all ministers shall have come up to these amounts.

4. The income of this Fund shall be derived:—

From subscriptions, donations, and collections taken up annually on all our Circuits and Missions. It shall be binding upon each Minister and Probationer in charge of a Circuit or Mission to make an annual collection for this Fund, at such time as may be deemed most favorable.

5. The management of the Fund shall be placed in the hands of a Committee consisting of one minister and one layman for each District; the Ministerial members to be elected at the Annual District Meeting, and the lay members appointed by the Conference. For the present year the Conference shall appoint all the members of the Committee.

The President of the Committee. In his absence the Secretary and Treasurer.

6. The Committee shall meet at the Conference, with all the members of the Conference.

7. No deficiency shall be allowed.

TEMPERANCE REPORT, 1889.

Your Committee beg to present the following Report:—

Resolved,—1. That we rejoice in the adoption and successful operation of the Permissive and Local Option Acts in various districts in this colony, resulting in a marked absence of drunkenness, and an improved condition of the people, and would urge upon the friends of Temperance perseverance in the good work of adopting and rigidly enforcing these laws until the flag of Prohibition waves over all the land.

2. That we urge the necessity of an amendment of the law for carrying into operation the Permissive Act, by the enactment of a majority vote, instead of a two-thirds vote, as at present required.

3. That we rejoice in the great success attending the work of re-adopting the "Permissive Act" in Harbor Grace District, and congratulate all those friends who assisted to win this brilliant victory.

4. That, feeling the importance of spreading Temperance literature throughout the land, we respectfully request Conference to order that a Collection be taken up at the Conference Temperance Meeting of 1890, and the proceeds applied to this object.

5. That we would urge upon all our Circuits the duty of increasing earnestness in forming Bands of Hope, the circulation of temperance literature, the holding of public meetings, and in making prayer to God for the success of our efforts.

6. That we recommend that the third Sabbath in December be observed as the day for preaching a special Temperance Sermon, and that the subject of Temperance be made a special topic for prayer at the preceding week-night prayer meeting.

7. That this Committee requests each District Chairman to see that complete temperance statistics are obtained at the annual District Meeting for every Circuit and Mission.

8. That we very strongly recommend the use of non-alcoholic Wine in the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in all our Churches.

9. The Conference having already ordered the formation of a Methodist Total Abstinence Society, with special reference to the bringing about of a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture, and sale of spirituous liquors, it is the imperative duty of every Circuit and Mission, to establish branch societies wherever practicable.

10. That these societies shall be directly under the control of the Church, supported voluntarily, and utilized for the mutual improvement of our people.

11. That, there shall be in use a single and double pledge, the one pledging a total abstinence from strong drink and tobacco, the other pledging a total abstinence from strong drink alone, members having the option of taking either pledge. The Superintendent of the Circuit shall be *ex-officio* Chairman of the Committee of management, but may, if he shall see fit, delegate his authority for this purpose to one of his colleagues.

The Committee shall be elected at an annual meeting of the members from amongst the members of the Methodist Church, or regular attendants on the Methodist Ministry, who shall become members of the Temperance organization. The Committee shall at its first meeting elect a Deputy Chairman (who shall preside in the absence of the Circuit Minister) a Treasurer and a Secretary, and shall meet as frequently as circumstances may require.

12. That, while urging a more vigorous enforcement of existing laws, the reduction of the number of liquor shops, the infliction of heavier penalties, and the shortening of the hours for sale, &c., nevertheless, we declare our solemn conviction, that, in total Prohibition alone, will be found the complete remedy for the evils of the liquor traffic; and this we hereby declare to be our watch-word and goal.

13. In accordance with the attitude of our General Conference we recommend that our people in all Municipal and Parliamentary elections, vote for those Candidates, who, in addition to other necessary qualifications, are known and professed Prohibitionists; and we heartily pledge ourselves to co-operate with all Temperance organizations, in their efforts to educate the electors on the necessity of Prohibitory Legislation.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT, June, 1889.

The Church of to-day is awaking to the fact that nowhere does the Holy Spirit find so little stubborn opposition as in the hearts of children, and find that no work yields a richer revenue of spiritual results than that bestowed on this fertile and promising field.

Sabbath Schools are the glory of our land. God honored institutions that commend themselves to the sympathies and co-operation of all Christian workers. They are nurseries of the Church from which the noblest men, her best recruits and most useful members from time to time have been supplied.

That Church is dozing, if not sleeping, that fails to read in the sign of the times the same Divine call when Jesus said, "Suffer little children and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of heaven."

Holding up a child-dimpled and blushing, as a living text, Jesus taught not that children must wait till maturity to enter His Kingdom, but rather that maturity must turn back again to the spirit and temper of childhood to enter the gateway of His fold.

Some one says, "The door into Christ's fold is about three feet high, children can walk right in, but we who are grown must stoop to enter." Love, trust and obedience are the three conditions of salvation. Loving, trusting and obeying are three prominent characteristics of childhood. What wonder, then, that the young so often and so readily become disciples of Jesus.

To the end of the conversion of our young, we want teaching that enliven the mind, that quickens the soul, that renews the life—in one word, freighted with Divine energy. Such teaching is steeped in prayer, carried on and followed with prayer, and eternity alone will reveal the untold benefits resulting from such teaching.

The returns for the year presents unabated zeal in this work.

The tabulations report progress. Our schools number one hundred and fifty-four this year, as against one hundred and forty last year.

Officers and teachers 1,151, as against 1,109 last year; scholars 9,861, as against 9,547 last year.

We observe with sorrow that the number of conversions during the year is only 309, as against 499 last year, and also a decrease in those meeting in class, which fact calls for renewed consecration on the part of the teachers, and every possible interest taken to lead the young immortals of our schools to God. We should advocate children's meetings and sermons to this end.

One grand feature of this work is the interesting amount raised for missions and school purposes.

We would urge upon our scholars and teachers our Sunday School papers, which are unrivalled in spiritual tone under the sun.

In conclusion, we are led to hope for brighter days in Sabbath School work. Consecrated zeal cannot but amply repay the toiler in this department of our Church's work, and blessedly replenish the Church with laborers to carry on the work of the Lord to future successes and ultimate victory.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

To the Members of the Methodist Church within the bounds of the Newfoundland Conference:

BELOVED BRETHREN,

"Grace to you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ."

We give thanks to God continually for His manifold and great mercies to us as a Church. The review of another year's toil brings conspicuously before us the blessings of our Heavenly Father. Not with pride or self-gratulation we contemplate our successes; but, with humble hearts, such as know their do imperfections, we magnify the name of the Lord. Let His mercies draw

us closer and closer to Him in loving attachment, in happy communion, and in sincere devotion to His work.

Our Church-membership now stands as follows:—On Trial 1,063, Full Members 9,396, Total 10,477. For the continued welfare of our beloved Church we desire that all of you her children, now so great a number, may continue to “grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.” Assuredly, the power and efficiency of the Church lie, to a very great extent, in the holy character of her individual members. Creeds, ordinances, experiences—essential though they are—can never be substituted for holy living. Mark the words of St. John, “My little children, let no man lead you astray: he that doeth righteousness is righteous.” Strive then to imitate your great Exemplar. Shrink from no sacrifice which loyalty to Christ necessitates. “For the sake of Jesus we have undertaken this cross, for the sake of Jesus let us persevere in the cross.” To this end be oft in prayer and meditation. In the different relationships of life, whether as parents or children, as masters or servants, as men of business, or as citizens let your conduct be above reproach. It is well to keep in remembrance that the duties of every-day life, small or great, performed unto the Lord, are, in their place, as truly noble as those which are pronouncedly religious. Yea, verily, the greatest is often highest.

“If on our daily course, our mind
Be set to hallow all we find,
New treasures still, of countless price,
God will provide for sacrifice.”

See the divine in all things, and make life here a preparation for nobler service beyond.

Missionary enterprises home and foreign are the glory of our Church. We are thankful for increasingly liberal contributions, but in view of the great need, we suggest, what we believe to be the best solution of the monetary problem—proportionate and systematic giving. This is the Scriptural and true method, and, if generally adopted, would decide all perplexing questions of Church finance. Under the rule of law the Jews gave a tenth to God: shall we under the reign of love give less?

“For Love delights to bring her best,
And where Love is, that offering evermore is blest.”

The past has bequeathed to our Church a precious heritage; the present finds her girding herself for greater work in the vast field she occupies;—may the future see her luminous with victory having won multitudes for her Lord! Let her membership resolve that at least her interests shall never suffer for lack of adequate support.

Our Educational work advances apace. The opening of the Children's Home, under the guardianship of the Rev. G. P. Story, completes a magnificent scheme. The College, ably equipped, with valuable apparatus, and increasing improvements in its curriculum; and the Home, with its domestic comfort and its happy Christian influences, supply a long-felt want, and offer special advantages to the youth of this Colony. Let us hope that the heavy debt that still burdens these institutions will be met by the piety and patriotism of our people. The enlightened policy of our honoured Superintendent of education, the Rev. Dr. Milligan, and his coadjutors is proving very successful. Reports from the schools in different parts of the Island show that apathy is yielding to aspiration. The spread of knowledge will be especially favourable to the cause of religion. Intelligence is characteristic of the truest piety and the most robust Methodism.

There is a wide field of educational work, promising a rich harvest, lying open before you all—the Sabbath School. In our time all recognize the wisdom of assiduously training the young. It is also our sacred obligation, for bap-

Believe not only in the possibility, but in the probability of the conversion of children, and make this your aim. We recommend the establishment of an adult Bible Class in connection with each school, and would urge the advantage of attendance. We anticipate the time when the school will, to a much larger extent, embrace the congregation.

The Temperance movement gathers strength. In the political agitation of this question we have united with other Churches, and the happy result of combination has been seen during the past year, in one well-known instance, in the achievement of complete success. There is still the same need for organized work. May victory and defeat alike act as a spur to greater effort!

Among the *less* direct ministries on which the Church sets her seal there is none more valuable than her literature. The *Wesleyan*, we warmly recommend to you, not only as the authorized organ of this section of our Church, but more for its intrinsic and acknowledged merits; also the *Methodist Magazine*, whose rich and varied pages offer strong attraction; and, further, the *Canadian Methodist Quarterly*, a new journal, the product of the ripe thought of our ministry on questions of the day: nor can we fail to speak words of hearty approval of the *Methodist Monthly Greeting* now circulating among us. Some of our best Methodist publications may be obtained from our Colporteur. Stock your shelves with good books. Such works as "Thoughts on Holiness," by the Rev. Mark Guy Pearse, are of priceless value in the home.

During the year an aged and beloved minister has fallen asleep. Thomas Fox, who for over forty years was permitted to labour for the Master, has in ripe old age been called to share the felicities of the higher communion. Here, his chief delight was in preaching the Gospel: there, it will be in beholding the ever onward movement of the Redeemer's Kingdom. The sphere is changed, but the joy is the same; it is in Christ, and Christ's will and work. Restraining our tears we praise God as it is meet; but our shout of praise soon changes to a cry of supplication, and the burden of our prayer is that we all may have grace to follow in the steps of the noble army of apostles and prophets.

The summons has been heard also by one of our most useful and esteemed laymen. The place of Charles Robert Ayre will be hard to fill. Here, in Conference, where his voice has been so often heard, we have a painful consciousness of the blank he has left. Our departed brother was first a devoted Christian, and then a devoted Methodist. His love for the services of the House of God was noteworthy. The energy which distinguished him as a merchant he displayed in the church, and his zeal was not emotion, merely, but practical, finding expression in great projects and liberal donations. His daily walk abounded in generous deeds freely bestowed,

"That best portion of a good man's life,
His little, nameless, unremember'd acts
Of kindness and of love."

We hail with joy the founding of a Methodist Orphanage which event will make the past year memorable in the annals of our Church's history in this land. The beginning has been a small one. In a hired house eight orphaned little ones have found shelter and a home, with the prospect of a practical Christian training, fitting them for life here and hereafter. The promoters have been cheered by the hearty liberality of many friends, especially by the most generous annual grant of the Women's Missionary Society. The chief difficulty, the erection of a suitable building, has now happily been removed by the munificent bequest of the late Hon. C. R. Ayre. It was the cherished desire of our now sainted brother to build an Orphanage, and God has per-

mitted him to carry it out, if not in life in death. We bespeak for this noble institution the united prayers and the practical sympathy of our people; and believe that the Lord who welcomed the little children to His tender embrace will accept the work as done unto Himself.

Dear brethren, value very sacredly your church-membership. Next to spiritual union with Christ that outward union with Him which consists in church-membership is the most solemn and holy bond. What could compensate for the loss of visible union with the Saviour, His people, and His cause? Incomparable are the honour and blessing of fellowship with the church of which Christ is the Head. Having then once accepted this privileged relation never allow the bond to be broken until death severs the tie, when the place lost in the church militant will be found in the church triumphant.

Resolve to be faithful to the divine ordinances. It is a grief to us when any of our members absent themselves from the Lord's table. No one can slight the Saviour's invitation without loss. Both Scripture and the rules of our church enjoin regular observance of this duty. The communion table is the centre where believers meet to manifest their love for the Saviour and for each other; it is the hallowed spot of blessedly near approach to "Christ who is our life;" the appropriate place to present, with our confessions of sin, the grateful offering of ourselves to God—wherefore, from love that sees and knows its privilege fulfil the Lord's request, "Do this in remembrance of Me."

As a church we are happy in the possession of an agency which admits of close and gladdening fellowship. The class-meetings ultimate design is most practical—the cultivation of a holy life. That this end may be answered let us avoid the fault of needlessly using set phrases and vague generalities, and, as beneath the eye of Him who searcheth all hearts, let us deal strictly with ourselves, earnestly studying to build a true Christian character. Be constant in your attachment to this means of grace, remembering that only by the hearty co-operation of each member is the ideal class possible.

It is with sorrow that we part with several brother Ministers who have spent years of arduous and successful service in this Conference. Leaving for other parts of the common vineyard their memory will long be cherished among us, while there will follow them the grateful prayers of these to whom they once Ministered.

Turning for a moment to the world at large which as followers of Wesley we claim as our parish, we look eagerly for any glimmer of light that may betoken the signs of the times. Probably the Christian church—using the term in its broadest significance—never before displayed greater zeal and self-sacrifice in the prosecution of her glorious mission. In our own Communion, in both hemispheres, there are unmistakable indications of a growing alertness to the wants of the modern world, manifested in increasingly vigorous efforts to conquer obstacles and make Christ known. The social and philanthropic sides of religion are beginning to receive the prominence in the church which they occupy in the New Testament. Above all we see roseate hues of a dawning day in the fact that the teachings of Christ are coming to be applied to all departments of public life and to society at large, no less than to the individual.

In conclusion, our conviction deepens that Christ is the supreme requirement of the world. Scepticism in high places may offer its speculations, but its impotence to alleviate the sorrows of mankind is the best proof of its vanity. In striking contrast, and attested by the experience of men of different generations, of every race and degree, there is in Christ a fulness for all human need—His is the power to remove each sin-stain, and to assuage every grief, and He in Himself presents to us at once the true ideal and the true motive. Emphatically, man's best friend is the Son of Man. Brethren, we invite you to assist us in spreading this glorious Gospel: in spreading it, as far as our minds and hearts have embraced it, in its many-sidedness and in its sublimity. Let contact with Christ produce in our hearts, "an enthusiasm for humanity." We review our toil, not with paralyzing fear nor with dishonouring doubt, but

That Conference ask the Quarterly Boards to appoint a College Sunday during the year, when the claims of the College shall be specially brought before our people and collections taken up to raise funds for liquidation of the debt; also, that Superintendents associate a Local Committee with them to aid in soliciting subscriptions therefor.

That a Committee be appointed to sit during the year, to consider if it is at all practicable so to arrange the examination of candidates and probationers, that the Committee may be able to report to the Districts before the opening of Conference, enabling them to present their recommendations of probationers, completed according to the letter, of the Discipline, thereby saving the time of the Conference.

Question 22.—What further measures can be adopted for the promotion of the work of God within or beyond the bounds of the Conference?

ANS.—After a long and earnest conversation on the question, it was resolved that while reports indicate that there has been much pruning of our membership and effort made to consolidate our work, we urge the necessity of laying stress upon the need of our people giving more attention to the duties and privileges of our Church, especially the social means of grace and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, for the deepening of the spiritual life and the advance of the Kingdom of Christ. And inasmuch as the strength of our Church in the future, depends largely upon the training which our young people now receive, more earnest effort and careful supervision are called for, from all our Ministers. There is also need of more diligent work in order that our people should have a better acquaintance with Bible truth, our cardinal doctrines and Methodist usages.

REPORT OF METHODIST ORPHANAGE.

The Rev. G. J. Bond reported on behalf of the Executors of the will of the late Hon. C. R. Ayre, the bequest of \$14,000 for the founding of a Methodist Orphanage. This bequest was left to the Conference.

Also 2 houses, the rents, issues, and profits of which, after the demise of the present legatee, are to be applied to the support of said Orphanage.

The present Orphanage has been managed during the year by a Committee appointed by the Constitution, for the purpose. Eight orphans have been in residence, one of whom died of diphtheria, which attacked all the children, save one. At the commencement the orphans were received into a small house in Alexander Street, but removed, on the first outbreak of diphtheria to a most eligibly situated country cottage capable of containing 30 children, which will probably be sufficiently commodious to receive all orphans until the proposed Orphanage be built.

Resolved,—That the Conference be asked to suitably acknowledge the handsome legacy of Hon. C. R. Ayre.

Also,—That the Conference kindly acknowledge the kindness of Dr. Tait, for his gratuitous medical services, to the orphans during the year.

HON. C. R. AYRE.

THE Conference desires to place on record its deep sense of the loss which the Methodism of Newfoundland has sustained by the death of the late Hon. C. R. Ayre.

Introduced in early manhood by a spiritual truth into this section of the Church of Christ, he found a home therein for nearly half a century, till the Master called him to the home above "to be a pillar in the temple of our God to go out no more."

As a Christian his Christianity ennobled him in the various walks of life. Successful in business, in which Christian principle was firmly maintained and manifested, he held his wealth as the Lord's Steward, and by gifts of striking liberality, as well as by gifts in which the left hand knew not what the right hand did, he diligently discharged the duties of the faithful steward.

As an official of the Church, what he did he did with all his might. Elected a member of the General Conference of 1882, he attended its Session in Hamilton and took a lively interest in the proceedings, especially that of Methodist Union.

On the introduction of laymen, into the Annual Conference, he was elected a member, and each succeeding year was honored by his brethren with a seat in the Annual Assembly. As a Methodist from choice and conviction he was true to his own Church and delighted in her prosperity; but in the Spirit of a true Catholicism with open hand and liberal heart he encouraged the evangelistic and philanthropic schemes of other denominations.

Our Educational work, both elementary and higher, found in him an active worker and a generous benefactor.

The fatherless were not forgotten and it was the holy ambition of his later years to erect an Orphanage where these bereaved ones might find a home, and obtain a training whereby they might be the better fitted for life's great battle.

He was not however permitted to carry out his noble purpose, but in the disposition of his property made ample provision for the accomplishment of what he would have done if his life had been prolonged. Ere long the institution will arise and many as they enjoy its privilege will bless the memory of the departed. We miss sorely his presence, his sympathy, his counsel and mourn his departure; but we thank God for the grace that was manifested in a life spared so long.

The Conference also desires to tender its respectful and Christian condolence to the widow and family of our departed friend, earnestly praying that the sharpness of the stroke may be lessened with the process of the years and that at last, in the Father's House, there may be a blessed re-union.
