#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, on reviewing the work of God amongst us during the last year, are much gratified with the evidences of success in each department of the great work of the Church. And especially is this success apparent in the conversion of souls and the building up of believers in our most holy faith.

Still, when we look at the vast fields which are white unto harvest, when we listen to the voices calling for spiritual help, and when we see many of our families and congregations who as yet have no saving knowledge of Christ, we are deeply impressed with the fact that to accomplish the holy mission before us we must give greater diligence to revival and evangelistic work; and in pursuance of this object your Committee recommend that bands of Christian workers be formed in each District, something after the methods adopted by the Rev. David Savage, and that in every place where it is possible strenuous and continuous efforts be made to secure the conversion of souls.

Your Committee are much gratified with the success achieved in our Sunday-school`work, but we strongly recommend that young people's prayer and class-meetings be formed in connection with each school, and that the Superintendents of Circuits and of schools keep ever before the minds of the teachers the great object of our Sunday-school work, the instruction of the scholars in the principles of the Gospel, and the securing of their confession of faith in Christ.

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#### METHODIST CONFERENCE.

It is also the opinion of your Committee that something should be done in all our churches to engage more heartily the attention of our congregations in the public worship of God by inducing them to respect the Lord's prayer, and by any other prudent means to secure a deeper and growing interest in public worship.

Your Committee rejoice in the encouraging reports from our Indian Missions. There is a steady increase in their efforts to support the Gospel; they manifest greater interest in education; they love the classmeeting and are regular in their attendance upon the services of the Church, and as a result their spiritual growth is both steady and real.

Macdonald, at Regina, during his visit; said committee to act with any other committee duly appointed, to lay before him fully our views on this matter.

Your Committee further desire to acknowledge the receipt of a letter from the W. C. T. U., and recommend that a suitable reply be sent, assuring them of our hearty sympathy with their work, said reply to bear the signature of the President and Secretary of Conference and also the Conference seal affixed.

In reference to the general work of temperance, your Committee beg leave to express their high appreciation of and sympathy with the work done by the many temperance organizations which are in active operation in the Province; and, not least among the agencies for the successful operation of the temperance work, we recognize the great power exercised by woman in her sphere, and are much gratified to learn the eminent success attending the work of the W. C. T. U.

Your Committee would further desire to record their high appreciation of the earnest and practical efforts of the Ministerial Association of Winnipeg in urging upon the Legislature the incorporation of stringent measures in the License Law, and would respectfully suggest that this Conference urge upon His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor the importance of very great care in the selection of officials to carry out the provisions of the law, especially in the appointment of the Commissioner and the Inspector of Licenses, upon whom especially rests the responsibility of seeing its conditions fulfilled.

#### REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to make the following encouraging report on the state of the Sabbath-schools :---

We have in active operation within the bounds of this Conference 84 schools—an increase of 8. In these schools we have 525 officers and teachers and 4,073 scholars, showing an increase of 58 in the former and 658 in the latter. 101 scholars have during the year professed faith in God, and now rejoice in the consciousness of sins forgiven.

Last year 853 scholars in our schools had signed the temperance pledge; now we have 1,363 names appended to the roll of total abstinence. The contributions show a large increase in the moneys raised by the

The following recommendations your Committee beg leave to make :— 1. The increased use of our catechisms in the schools, as there is a growing necessity for thoroughly training the children under our care in the fundamental doctrines of the Bible.

2. The advisability of all our ministers addressing the children of our schools as often as possible.

3. The establishment of Methodist Sunday-schools at all the appointments on our Circuits or Missions.

4. The carrying out of the provisions of the Discipline in forming classes of children for religious instruction, as we are glad to find some of our ministers are doing with great satisfaction and success.

5. The securing of the names of all the children in our schools to the total abstinence pledge; a book for the purpose to be kept in all our schools. As this is regarded by us as a most important work, we urge earnest attention on the part of all superintendents and school officers to this department of school work.


6. The supplying of our scholars with all our own papers, the circulation of which has so largely increased during the past year, showing their superiority over all others, whose moral and patriotic tone is not always assured.

#### REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. A memorial was laid before the Conference from the Saskatchewan District, requesting the General Conference to attach the Victoria, New Westminster, and Port Simpson Districts, in British Columbia—now attached to the Toronto Conference—to the Manitoba Conference. Your Committee recommend the memorial to be forwarded to General Conference.

2. A memorial was laid before the Conference in reference to the obtaining through the Minister of the Interior, from the Dominion Government, the right of control of certain Indian industrial schools, and also to procure title deeds to certain properties on the Indian Missions, now occupied and claimed by our Church.

Your Committee recommend that a committee be appointed to interview the Hon. Mr. Dewdney *re* industrial schools, and that another committee of General Conference delegates be appointed to interview Hon. Thos. White, Minister of the Interior, *re* title deeds, and bring the matter before the General Conference for final settlement.

3. A memorial was presented from the Pembina and Turtle Mountain District re appointment of a Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba, North-West and Pacific coast work. Your Committee recommend this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to make such an appointment.

4. Your Committee having considered the memorial presented by the Portage la Prairie District re Superannuation Fund, recommend this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to take such steps as shall economize the resources of said Fund as much as possible.

5. A memorial was presented to the Conference from the Regina District, asking the organization of a Sustentation Fund. Your Committee recognize the importance of such a fund, and recommend this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to take such steps as shall secure its establishment. 6. The Saskatchewan District presented a memorial re course of study for missionaries in the Indian work. Your Committee recommend this Conference to request the General Conference to make the change asked for.

7. A memorial from the Portage la Prairie District was presented to the Conference, requesting the organization of an Orphans' Fund. Your Committee recommend that no action be taken.

8. The Portage la Prairie District presented a memorial re baptized children. Your Committee recommend no change, as the Discipline makes all necessary provision.

9. A memorial from the Saskatchewan District was laid before the Conference, requesting action to be taken toward the circulation of a petition in the North-West Territories, to abolish the permit system and submit a prohibitory liquor law to the people for sanction. Your Committee recommend that the matter be brought before the General Conference, and the conditions of the memorial be favorably considered.

10. A memorial was brought forward from the Saskatchewan District, asking that Mission grants be made direct from the Central Board. Your Committee recommend no action.

11. A memorial was presented from the Gladstone Quarterly Board, asking for assistance from Mission Funds to aid in the liquidation of a debt resting on parsonage property. Your Committee feel that this Conference has no control in the matter, but recommend said memorial to be forwarded to the Central Board of Missions.

# CONSTITUTION OF THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTE.

1. This Association shall be known as "The Theological Institute of Manitoba Conference."

2. The object of the Institute shall be the study of theology and the cultivation of piety by means of lectures, sermons, essays, addresses, and devotional exercises; and also the collection and preservation of historie records of Methodism in this country.

3. The Institute shall consist of all members of Conference, probationers for the ministry, and members of the Methodist Church in good standing, whose names have been enrolled and their membership fees paid upon nomination and election by a majority of members present at the time of such nomination and election.

4. Any person desiring to become a life member, on election by the Institute and the payment of \$25, shall be enrolled as such; but in all cases such membership shall be cancelled by the Institute upon sufficient cause shown with regard to moral character.

5. The officers shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary. Treasurer, Preacher and Lecturer, elected annually by ballot without nomination.

There shall also be a Historian, who shall hold office for five years, and an Executive Board, consisting of eight members, elected in same manner. In the case of the Executive Board, the two having the highest number of votes shall remain in office four years; the two having the next highest number of votes shall remain in office three years; the two next highest two years, and the next one year. Each year there shall be two members elected to take the place of the members retiring, provided, nevertheless, that any member may be re-elected. In all elections every officer must have a majority of votes cast.

5. A course of reading shall be devised from year to year by the Executive Board. The reports of this Board shall be submitted for confirmation to the Institute, who shall have power to add to or vary the same if deemed advisable.

Prizes may be offered annually for essays on subjects chosen by the Board, who shall also award the prizes, such essays to be based on course of reading.

7. An annual meeting of the Institute shall be held in connection with Conference, to open the day previous to opening of Annual Conference, and at the same place, at which meeting election of officers shall take place.

8. There shall be a membership fee of fifty cents per annum, payable in advance.

9. At least ten members must be present at any annual meeting of the Institute to constitute a quorum.

10. No change shall be made in the constitution of the Institute except at an annual meeting and by a two-thirds vote of the members present, and after due notice in writing of such amendment has been given at the previous annual meeting.

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f the Institute except the members present, has been given at the Order of Business.

The following shall be the order of business: --

1. Opening exercises.

2. Reading minutes of last session.

3. Calling roll of members and enrolling new members.

4. The President's opening address.

5. Reading and discussion of essays, etc.

6. Reports of Executive Board, Historian, Committees, and Secretary-Treasurer.

7. Consideration of constitutional changes and miscellaneous business.

8. Election of officers.

9. Closing exercises.

(a) The retiring President shall give an opening address at the annual meeting on current theology or some kindred subject.

(b) All rules of order not specially provided for shall be governed by the rules of order adopted by General Conference.

(c) The Historian shall be chief editor, and on his nomination the Institute shall appoint sub-editors, whose duty it shall be to collect and forward documents and information to the Historian. The Historian shall report at each annual meeting.

#### OBITUARY.

## REV. ROBERT LOUGHEAD.

Robert Loughead was born at Palchairwas, near Glasgow, in Scotland, October, 1816. When five years of age he was brought by his parents to Canada, where the family soon began to make a home for themselves in the township of Delousia, in the county of Lanark, Ontario. Here on the farm young Robert Loughead grew up in active hard work until he was about nineteen years of age, when he learned the carpenter trade. Having become converted to God, and desiring an education, he attended for some time an educational institution in the United States.

On his return to Canada he began to be very active and very earnest in Christian work, and was soon taken into the Christian ministry on trial.

In 1843 he was employed on the Matilda Circuit under the direction of Rev. D. Birney. Very earnestly and successfully he labored for sixteen years, when his health failed and he had to take a superannuated relation. After eleven years of partial retirement he again began active work in 1871, and labored for several years, but in 1878 his health again failed. Soon afterwards, thinking his health might be benefited, he turned his attention toward our North-West; and in 1880 he came to this country, hoping to be useful to the new settlers, and at the same time to prepare a home for himself in this new land. He located in the valley of Rolling River, south of the Riding Mountain. Here he began earnest work and preached to the people in the country about as his health and opportunity would permit.

On Sabbath, the 28th of March, 1886, in the afternoon, he preached his last sermon from the words: "Thanks be unto God who always causeth us to triumph in Christ." After preaching he took tea with a friend on his way to his lonely home.

The word which he had preached with so much unction and benefit to his neighbors that afternoon comforted and cheered his own mind and enabled him to triumph in the Lord. The day after (Monday), in the evening, while engaged in ordinary labor, he was suddenly called to his reward without a struggle.

A very solemn and impressive funeral service was held in our Minnedosa Church, attended by several ministers, and a large number of neighbors, who feel greatly the loss of so faithful a friend and so earnest a preacher. Safe for eternity !

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

## MANITOBA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

#### CONGREGATIONS UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Assembled once more in our Annual Conference, we who have been called to the office and work of the ministry among you greet you in the name of the Lord, and earnestly invoke on you a continuance of that special mercy of our heavenly Father, which shall build you up in faith and knowledge, and make you to abound in all wisdom and righteousness. While praying for these blessings on your behalf, we desire on our own to make this a season of searchings of heart and of solemn renewal of the full consecration of our own selves to the Lord, feeling deeply that we cannot expect you, who are ministered unto, to reach any higher experience in holiness than we, who minister unto you, have attained.

When we assembled last year peaceful occupations were at a standstill in several parts of the country, and large bodies of our citizen soldiers were still under arms. Through the blessing of God tranquillity has returned to the land, and we are made glad by the presence among us to-day of beloved brethren who last year were detained at their homes by threatened danger, or were actively engaged in rendering needed and invaluable assistance to those who were seeking to repress armed resistance against lawful authority. The past history of our Church is full of instruction. Its lessons are too fresh and impressive to be forgotten, and too numerous be described. They are interwoven with our most sacred experiences; they touch the springs of our thoughts and feelings, and enter into our daily activities, while their influence affects our mestic, social and business relations not less than our inner and piritual life. In reviewing them we gratefully acknowledge that he good hand of our God, which has been upon our fathers, has not orsaken us.

The remembrance of our history recalls the characteristic or ssential features of real Methodism, which, we are thoroughly sat-

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held in our Minnee number of neighand so earnest a isfied, must be held fast and wrought out with vigor if we would not betray the trust providentially confided to us of laying the foundations firm and strong of a Christian civilization in this North-West land.

We therefore entreat you, dear brethren, do not forget that hitherto Methodists have been distinguished by the emphasis they have given to the essential doctrines of Christianity. In all the years of our history the truths relating to God, to moral gov. ernment, to immortality and to eternal retribution, have been sacredly maintained and asserted with great distinctness. In common with all Christian people, we have held to the inspiration and divine authority of the Scriptures, the divine origin of the Church, the vocation of the ministry, the value of the sacraments, and the indispensableness of the strictest morality, according to the New Testament standard. But beyond all these points, we have made conspicuous the sinfulness of sin, the necessity of the atonement, the universality of provisional redemption, the freedom of the will and the freeness of the grace of God which bringeth salvation. Not one of these can be discarded or distorted without marring the scheme of salvation revealed in the Gospel.

But there are other doctrines more peculiarly our own which need to be emphasized, --- doctrines which relate to salvation applied as well as provided, and which underlie the experience of the soul in its emergence out of the darkness and death of sin into the light and life of righteousness. These other doctrines have been the rallying cry of Methodism in the past, and if we would maintain our position in these days of loose thinking and loose teaching, they must be our rallying cry still. They are repentance, faith, justification, adoption, the witness of the Spirit, sanctification and Christian perfection. Out of these come all our experiences, all our joys and hopes, our inspiration and zeal, and upon them are built all our special forms and means of grace. Let us, therefore, dear brethren, as we value the purity of our Church and its power to convert the people and spread Scriptural holiness through this land, hold fast these doctrines as they appear in the Scriptures and as they have been attested by the experience of the Church in the past. With devout thankfulness we record the fact that the ministry of the Word and other divinely sanctioned means of grace have been accompanied during the past year in a most encouraging degree by the unction and power of the Holy Ghost, resulting in a net increase to our membership of 683. Thus in this critical and questioning age, when almost every system and doctrine is thrown into the crucible of investigation, God continues to put the stamp of His approval upon the pastoral and evangelistic efforts of the Methodist Church.

It gives us pleasure to observe that the peculiarities of our Church life are still cherished in the hearts of our people, that our home; neithe

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class-meetings and love-feasts still hold their place in our Church. Our conviction of the usefulness and scriptural character of these means of grace is as strong as ever. They have been largely owned of God in bringing us to our present position of usefulness, and we are of opinion that we are under increased obligation to walk by

the same rule and to mind the same things. In order to maintain the efficiency of these honoured usages and make them means of grace indeed, and helps to holiness, we would urge upon every lover of them, and especially the leaders of classes, to seek to make these services interesting, attractive and profitable to all by prayerful study of the Scriptures, and by securing as thorough a knowledge as possible of the spiritual necessities and attainments of all under their care. While we ourselves are convinced that we must give attention to thorough pastoral visitation, or betray the cause of God, we would express our conviction that we cannot keep up our societies in their true normal condition if the leaders keep not as far as possible the rule which requires them to see each member of their classes once a week. The constant and careful marking of the class-book in the presence of the class we would also kindly suggest as a needful auxiliary to complete pastoral success.

The maintenance of that inward religion which the true Methodist character of preaching is adapted to create and promote, and our society system to conserve and develop, requires that we should discountenance those frivolities of fashionable society which tend to dissipate our devotional feelings and to defeat our religious aims. While we may not always be able to give chapter and verse condemning certain forms of pursuit or enjoyment, all those of doubtful propriety and expediency should be shunned; and we would urge you especially to withold your sanction and influence from those forms of amusement, such as dancing, card-playing, and theatre-going, which have always been claimed by the world, and which have from the beginning been repudiated by the Church.

We would affectionately urge on your serious attention our important Sunday-school interests. The number of schools at present reported within the bounds of the Conference is 84, an increase of eight over last year. We are also pleased to note an increased attendance, being 4,073-an increase of 658 over last year. While we rejoice in the greater interest manifested in this vital part of our Church work, we deeply regret to find that the number of conversions reported in the schools is less than last year. Let us not forget, dear brethren, that with all the appliances we now have for making our Sunday-school work a success, the primary object must be to bring the children to Christ.

While upon this subject we would urge upon you parents, as you value the souls that are nearest to you and dearest, maintain family religion. The holiest sanctuary on earth is the Christian our people, that our home; neither church nor Sunday-school can do the work of the

home, or become an adequate substitute for the influence of piety in the household. See to it that the children be all taught of the Lord. Guard well their reading. Watch over their amusements and companionships. Point them early to the Saviour. Let yours be the first lips that tell them the story of redeeming love. Teach them to love the Church. Show them that you love it yourself. Point to it as the house of God and the gate of Heaven, as Divine in its origin and its ends. Speak of it and of its ministers always with respect and sympathy. In this way only can you induce your children to love the Church of your choice and lead them to appreciate its efforts to do them good.

And "now concerning the collection." It has been said that to give is to bear testimony. We have been a witnessing Church in all the past. Our class-meetings and our love-feasts have been our crown-which may we wear forever-now let us give our testimony as we never before have expressed it, and the result will be marvellous. First, we would remind you of promissory obligations to your own pastors. "The laborer is worthy of his hire." On most of our stations there is no great danger of extravagance in this matter at present, and in view of the necessarily decreasing appropriations from the Missionary Fund, strenuous efforts must be put forth or many a worthy minister will be sadly embarrassed in his work. We would also commend to your hearty sympathy and support the missionary enterprises of our Church. Let us take no narrower view of our duty than did our honored founder when he exclaimed "The world is my parish." Though the times be hard and money scarce, are not the silver and the gold and the cattle upon a thousand hills the Lord's, and does not He say, "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth, and there is that withholdeth more than is meet and it tendeth to poverty." We would remind you also of the fathers who by reason of age, and the brethren who as the result of failing health, have been compelled to retire from the active duties of circuit work. Let them not feel the bitterness of neglect from those on whose behalf they have spent the best energies of their life. And let the widows and orphan children of those who have fallen on the field feel that they also have a place in the loving sympathy of the Church.

The subject of ministerial education will, we trust, receive a due share of your thought. The present is a time most critical in the history of our Church in this country. Whoever gives most earnest attention to educational matters will, in all probability, attain the position of command. Our Church has always been an ardent advocate of this work. From our infancy we have heard that "Methodism was born in a university," and in our schools and colleges it has lived and thrived. Efforts are being made by us as a Church for the establishment of a college in the capital of the Province; necessary legislation has been secured, and the scheme now

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about to be launched, and so vital to all our interests, demands your hearty co-operation and support.

The great question of temperance at present claims almost universal attention. Hitherto our Church has always spoken out on this subject, and with no uncertain sound; and in view of the approach of the elections for our Local House of Representatives in Manitoba, we would urge you, in your capacity as citizens, to give all possible support to those who may pledge themselves to use every effort in securing judicious legislation necessary for prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Our General Conference holds its session in Toronto early this fall. Before it will be brought questions of supreme interest and importance to our work in this country. We would therefore ask you to remember this assembly in your supplications, that it may be enlightened and guided by the Holy Ghost.

During the year we have been reminded that our days of labor will soon be gone. One of our brethren, full of years and labor, suddenly, and by an unexpected summons, ceased at once to work and live. But though God buries His workmen He carries on His work. Two young men of great promise were on Conference Sabbath ordained to the work of the ministry among us, and others of equal merit, and of whom we hope much, have been received as probationers for the work.

And now, dear brethren, "we commend you to God and to the word of His grace." Let us hold fast our profession without wavering. Instead of declining and deteriorating from what our fathers were, let us seek to be better even than they. Let us pray, and watch, and labor, and give, until, as more than conquerors, we inherit the promises.

"And the God of all grace, who hath called us into His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered awhile, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you. To Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."
