Allies Now Mile **Beyond Combles**

Former German Headquarters - Quiet on British Front on Sunday - Heavy Casualties Among Officers

London, July 17-The Anglo-French advance has brought the allied troops, where they make a junction, to a point about a mile in front of Combles, which, prior to July 1 when the offensive began, was the German headquarters on this sector.

Quiet prevailed on the British front on Sunday. The detachment which had been thrust forward to the third German line of Foureaux Wood to protect the infantry operations, has now been withdrawn to the main position.

The casualty lists, as announced, total 227 officers dead and 457 These Are Troops That Reached wounded or missing; 597 men dead, and 1,832 wounded. The British are keenly watching for the next move on the front, where comparative quiet still prevails.

BERLIN ADMITS RETIREMENT

British Second Blow Most Significent Feature of The Allies' Work So Far In War

Amazement in Berlin Has Turned to Dismay - Germans Had Made Mighty Efforts to Stay Advance After First Line Captured

Rotterdam, July 17—(Toronto Mail and Empire cable, by Leonard Spray)
—The British armies' new blow has caused the deepest anxiety in German hearts with the forward movement, perhaps only in its first stages. It is fully realized that this success is not only of importance itself, but has infinitely greater significance than had the assault on the first line.

Whilst German headquarters were prepared for the necessity of giving way at some points when the British offensive was first launched, they believed that the second line would be able to withstand all pressure.

The positions just captured were defended with great strength. After the taking of the first line by the tremendous British attack, efforts were made to reinforce the second line with troops and guns brought from other fronts, and large drafts of even fresh formation from depots behind the front and also in Germany.

The Germans reckoned on a repetition of the Neuve Chapelle-Loos-Chamagne campaign when, by concentrating troops at the points threatened they

prevented any further advance.



French and Belgian The adventurous career of a young German was disclosed as a result of his appearance in the dock at Marlborough Street police court, London, recently. His name, as it appeared on the charge sheet, is Rene Ghiot Max Kohler. He was born in Germany of German parents twenty-six years ago. He has joined at one time or other the German, the French, and the Belgian armies, and deserted from all three. Max Kohler—that is his real name—is a well-educated man, and speaks English, French and German fluently, and has such a command of the three languages that he rarely betrays himself in conversation.

All that happened in court was that Inspector Jacobs, the aliens officer at Vine street, formally asked the magistrate, Mr. Mead, to discharge Kohler, in order that he might be handed over to the military authorities to be transferred to the French authorities.

At a previous hearing Inspector Jacobs said that on May 6 he arasted Kohler at a house in Church street, Soho, where he was residing with his English wife. He said his name was itene Ghiot, and that he was born at Ixelles, near Brussels, but on being charged with contravening a deportation order and with being an alien enemy, he confessed that he was a German, and that he was born at Saulgua, Wurtemberg.

Deserted the German Army.

Deserted the German Army. The Daily Express has gathered details of Kohler's amazing life story. There is no doubt of his pure German origin. All his family are Germans, and two of his sisters are married to German officers. At the age of twenty he was called up for service in the German army, but after a few weeks' service he deserted from the army and made his way to England and then to America. From America he went to France, and for some time lived in Paris. A few months before war broke out he married a French girl in Paris, and she is still living. Then, on the declaration of war, he joined the Freach army, and was among the first troops to be sent to the front.

On the very first day he was in action—August 22, 1914—he was reported to be missing, and later it was found that he had deserted and had been taken by the Germans at Charlero). He told them he was a German, and persuaded them to allow him to make his way through Belgium to Holland. Later he posed as a Belgian refugee, and as such boarded a steamer, came to Tilbury, and was duly admitted as a Belgian. He visited several towns in England and Scotland, and finally settled down in Newcastle, where he obtained employment in a well-known munitions works. Six months later he married a daughter of a foreman at the munitions works.

Last Merch he was arrested by the Prench army, and handed over to a French military escort in the steamer Sussex on March 24 last. While crossing the Channel the Sussex was torpedoed by a German submarine, and about 100 lives were lost. Kohler managed, in the excitement, to escape from his military escort, and jumped into the sea. He was rescued with other survivors by a British destroyer and taken into Folkestone. As he spoke English fluently and with no trace of a foreign accent, he was able to get back to London a free and unsuspected man. He again went to Newcastle and explained his return to the English girl whom he had married by stating that the authorities had made a mistake in arresting him, and had sent him back home. Meanwhile, both the police and military officials had learned that Kohler was not one of the victims of the Sussex, and he was adroitly traced from one place to another. For a few days during his short period of freedom he was engaged as a pantryman in a well-known West End club, and he also had the audacity to go to the Belgian Consulate in London, and join the Belgian army, for which he was duly passed as physicaly fit.







Sir.—Your editorial of last week referring to the Monday meeting of the school board was misleading in some particulars, in that you did not seen to understand the position taken by active members of the board. Will you kindly allow me some of your valuable space in order to place school matters in St. John correctly before the public? The Schools Act allows a maximum assessment of \$150,000 with any further amount required for interest on debentures and for repairing and furnishing school buildings. The amount asked for this year by the school board was \$180,462.44, which included \$24,467.56 for coupon interest and only \$6,000 for repairs.

Every child knows that expenses are very much higher than in former years and are increasing, so that money does not go so far in repairs as it did. Having no way of increasing our allow ance for repairs except by increasing the amount asked for from the city and the commissioners being unfriendly to such a request, much has had to be left undone. It is true that the school board was to the legislature seven years ago and got an addition of \$20,000 added to the limit to which they might assess, but after careful consideration we put this whole amount of increasing underpaid profession.
