WINS RACE FOR

WOMAN'S LIFE

Details of a race with death participated in by a slow sailing schooner and a high-powered flying boat with a woman's life one hundred miles away on an island staked against time and saved by the plane are given out by C. F. Redden, president of the Aeromarine Airways, Inc., Times Building, New York.

The news came to Mr. Redden by wire from Miami, Florida, one of the air bases of the Aeromarine Company.

"The schooner "Lilly" put into Nassau after four and a half days," said Mr. Redden "in traveling at her best speed from Norman Castle, on the island of Little Abasco in the Bahamas. It brought the word that Mrs. Lottle Russell, wife of Roy Russell, manager of the Bahama Islands Importing and Exporting Corporation, was in a critical condition and unable to live unless immediate aid was rushed to her. There were no phisicians on the island and the skipper asked that one be rushed there on the fastest boat available. Even then, her condition was so desperate that he considered the odds greatly against the sick woman. He gravely doubted if aid could reach her in time. Every minute might mean life or death.

"While the captain of the schooner was seeking a swift boat to make the return trip and others were summoning a physician and a nurse, Dr. Graham and Miss Nellie Burns, he chanced upon Duke Schiller, pilot of the Aeromarine flying boat "Florida," who had just entered the harbor from Miami. Schiller at once tendered the use of the plane and volunteered to put off immediately. When the physician and nurse arrived they were bundled into the big plane and began a race to save a woman believed to be dying.

"The hundred miles they covered in one hour and a half—as against the four days and a half for the schooner—and were at the bedside of Mrs. Russell within two hours. Expert medical attention brought her from the shadow and she gradually improved.





Three new senior branches sent reports, viz.: Medford, Coldbrook and Fredericton (Church); also three new girls' branches, Mace's Bay, Shediac and St. George's (St. John). Reports were veceived on March 23 from eighty-five senior branches and twenty-four girls' branches—109 branches in all. Since my books closed, I have heard from five branches; this means 114 have sent reports out of 115 branches.

We now have 220 life members, nineteen having been added this year; consequently, \$475 will be voted from this fund at this meeting.


MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES





A record for safety of operation was established by U. S. railways in 1921, according to an analysis of accidents recently compiled by the Interstate Commerce Commission. The report shows 1921 to have been the best single year in the thirty-four years that accident figures have been tabulated. The lest previous year was 1920. The computation is based on the number of employes on all the carriers and the amount of traffic handled.







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the half-dozen, the dozen, the gross, and also the division of the year and of the day.

The reason is that in the old days there were two quite distinct systems of calculating. The Jews and Arabs used their ten fingers as an aid to addition, and from them we get the decimal system. But other early peoples had a system of counting founded not on the number of their fingers, but on the movements of the sun.

They adopted as their unit the time which the sun takes to travel his own length, that is one minute. They found that sun required 720 minutes to pass from sunrise to sunset at those times of the year when day and night were equal, and these they divided into twelve hours of sixty minutes each. Twelve thus became their group for calculating purposes, and sixty (five times twelve) was their top number, corresponding to our hundred.

They were at first only moderately good astronomers, so they worked out the year at 860 days, which gave twelve months of thirty days each. Each month had two spells of twelve working days, and six days of rest. Later they adopted the six-day week, with a seventh rest day as part of it.

We can see a curious survival of the twelve system in our own language. Most others have no proper words for numbers beyond ten—they must say "one-and-ten," "two-and-ten," and so on up to twenty (two tens); but we have distinct words in "eleven" and "twelve."


