

\*\*NEW WAY TO SMUGGLE\*\*

\*\*New York, March 18—Nathan Green, inventor of a new way to smuggle diamonds, pleaded guilty in the federal court and was fined \$\$,000. Green, a large diamond importer, had his agent in Amsterdam, Holland, send him loose diamonds worth \$20,000 hidden in a specially constructed metal frame, enclosing the picture of an old lady.

The scheme might have been successful had not the frame broken and the diamonds come ratting out when the package reached the New York post office. Since Green was arrested government, sents have seized diamonds valued at \$70,000, smuggled here from Amsterdam by the same method. The judge decided not to send Green to prison when his counsel pleaded that his cilent was "verging on insanity."

CAN. DA'S BROKEN FAITH

Canada under Mr. Borden has broken faith with Australia. Sir George Reid, the Australian high commissioner in London, declares that the plan which was usgested by the admiralty in 1900 was thright one. Under that plan his country is developing a fleet unit, and Sir George believes that Australia's example must eventually be followed by the other self-governing dominions. He believes that by pursuing this policy there would be againer development of military and naval strength than could be possible under any scheme of imperial federation. He rejects the idea of a commion parliament for the Empire, and significantly adds that the people are getting a little sick of the perorations of imperialist visionaries. The New Zealand minister of defence has since been heard from. He has nitimated that New Zealand's present policy of cash distribution is not satisfactory, and must be changed. In the course of his remarks he is reported to have said:







During 1912 there were 6,613 commitments to jail in Ontario for drunkenness, an increase of 786 over 1911.

The increase amounts to mearly 12 per cent., an amount considerably above the mormal increase to be expected from a larger population.

Not only have the year's commitments jumped, but the increase is larger even than that of 1911, which overtopped 1910 by 536 commitments.

## SMELTING WORKS MAY START HERE

Big Canada Iron Corporation Anxious to Come

Hon. Mr. Grimmer Adds This To

the complete realization of hopes which had been expressed for an iron industry in this province.

Premier Flemming's report was adopted. Mr. Flemming presented a statement of the amounts received and expended on the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium. In addition to the gift of the grounds and existing buildings valued at from \$40,000 to \$60,000 Mrs. Jordan had given extra sums to the extent of \$50,000. The latter amounts included the cost of water tower, fire protection; power house with electric light and heating plant, lighting grounds and buildings, free ward, cost of moving barn and foundations for free ward, screening pavilions, land, heating cottage and beautifying grounds. She also had erected three cottages which on her death will become the property of the sanitarium.

The government is erecting two pavilions and Mrs. Jordan's daughters have contributed the cost of a third pavilion for children. The expenditure to be made by the province will amount to about \$20,000 and when the plant is complete it will represent a total cost of from \$125,000 to \$150,000. Patients will be charged \$1 a day, about half the cost of maintenance, and arrangements may be made for an emergency fund for the benefit of those who cannot afford to pay the full amount.
