Daily Hints For the Cook

DELMONICO PUDDING. Quart milk, tablespoon cornstarch dissolved in cold milk; yolks of five eggs well beaten. six tablespoons sugar. Boil five minutes, then pour into a pudding dish and bake one hour; beat the whites of six eggs with sugar and flavor with extract of lemon; return to the oven and brown.


YORKSHIRE MUFFINS
Stir into two cupfuls of sifted flour a pinch of salt, three well-beaten eggs and two scant cupfuls of milk—beating with an egg beater until the batter is full of bubbles. Half an hour before the roast of beef is to be served pour a little of the dripping from the meat into a hot shallow pan, containing a number of hot greased muffin rings and fill with the Yorkshire batter. Serve when nicely browned as a border to the roast.

HERE'S A NEW TOWN COMING

(St. Andrew's Beacon).

Men, money and machinery, combined with brains and enterprise, can work marvels with the face of nature. In the space of a few weeks they have worked wonders in the development of the new village at Chamcook, near St. Andrews. And the half has not been revealed.

The factory plant will occupy the extreme end of the peninsula. This structure composed of reinforced concrete, 185x 76 feet, is now more than half constructed. In another fortnight perhaps, the third storey will be built and the roof on.

On the western side of the factory building, the can-making plant is now in process of erection. This building will be 130 x67 feet, and like the other buildings, will be composed of reinforced concrete. To place its foundations it was found necessary to erect a cofferdam around the work to keep out the tide. Between the can-making building and the factory the powerhouse is placed. This building will be 50 feet square. Its foundation has been laid and the superstructure is being erected.

The office building, 56 x 38, is immediately to the northeast of the factory, and will be so arranged that all the employes in entering or leaving must pass the office window. The second storey of this building is now being worked on.

Stretching out from the office towards Chamcook Narrows, is the pier, which will be 400 feet in length. At the end of this pier there will be a depth of water of eighteen feet at low tide. The cutting shed will be placed on this wharf. A part of the wharf has been built.

On Saturday last, Mr. Jones, the architect, was on the ground laying out the site of the residential section, This will occupy the upland immediately to the south of the track. It will be in semi-circular form, with the station in the centre and a little square in front. On the east-crn side of the station, occupying the upland alongside the property of James Scallion, the women's boarding-house will be placed, while at the western slope will be the men's boarding house. These buildings will be uniform in size
