





ONTARIO HAY CROP IS BADLY DAMAGED

Unprecedented Heat After Long Drought Has Done Much Harm -Fruits Suffer, Too

(Financial Post of Canada)

The past few days have witnessed the serious damage of Ontario's hay crop and an almost complete destruction of her small fruits. The unprecedented heat of the early part of the week, following the prolonged drought of the past six has done incalculable damage. That part of the province lying, roughly, between Lake Simcoe and Lakes Erie and Ontario, and extending from Toronto to Detroit has, except in isolated portions, suffered severely. The hay is short and thin and the straw of the grain is short. The strawberry crop was cut short early this week, and the balance of the small fruits are not likely to survive the terrible scorching they have received. It will be most fortunate if the larger fruits are not severely damaged. In this way ends a most promising spring.

The Hay Crop

For the country at large the loss of the hay crop is a most serious matter. Last year Ontario produced \$68,815,000 worth of hay, an amount equal to about three-quarters of the wealth produced by wheat in the three prairie provinces. So even a partial failure of the hay crop is a heavy direct financial loss. More than this, however, it makes it a most expensive matter to fatten animals for food, and its effect on raising the cost of living is not by any means confined to the horse-owning classes. The price of meats, milk, butter, cheese, etc., are likely to advance. To this must be added the effect of the hay shortage in the States. For instance, during the past month, it is reported that 141 cars of hay have been shipped from here to Philadelphia alone, where it was sold to net \$22 to \$23 a ton. The shortage of the grain straw will but add to the demand for hay, with the result that many farmers and others will be hard hit this winter.

On the other hand, the parts of Ontario east of Toronto and most of Quebec and the many parts of the west where the hay crop is good, will profit greatly by the damage, which will to some extent at least offset the loss in the affected district. Quebec has for some years been unable to utilize or dispose of its whole hay crop, and as last year, for example, it produced 5,502,000 tons, worth, at last year's figures, some \$51,114,000 it should be a considerable gainer. The Hay Crop

The heavy rains of the last fortnight have practically insured a bountiful harvest in the west. Moisture has been abundant and general. Of hail there has not been much—as yet—although a few days ago a severe storm swept over the district surrounding Red Deer, Alberta, and did much damage to the fall wheat. The much damage to the law wheat. Inspring wheat is as yet insufficiently matured to be permanently damaged. Frost too, has been experienced in isolated parts of the north.






