

#### CHRONOLOGICAL SUMMARY.

The events recorded in this Department of previous Nos. of the Nova Scotia Imanac, have been given, in the order in which they occurred, up to the end 1848. Some of the more interesting incidents of the succeeding year are red to in the Nos. for 1851 and 1854—which, with the following records, apprise the principal events of the year 1849:—

1849.—JANUARY 1.--The corner stone of Chalmers' Church, Haliu, was laid, with religious observances. Mr. Imlay was the architect, at Mr. A. Bain the builder, of that edifice.

16.—The cholera having made its appearance in Europe and Ameta, a lengthy report of a Commission, appointed by the Lieut. Governous was published in the Royal Gazette of this date, with recommentions to the different local Boards of Health to take the necessary that the removal of nuisances or offensive matters from the yards appearance in their respective localities.

Resources of the Provincial Legislature was opened by his wellency Sir John Harvey, with a speech of unusual length, in which reprincipal subjects referred to were the revolutions in Europe, the proposed Railway, an Electric Telegraph, a uniform low rate of postage, a Crown Land department, the mineral resources of the Province, ducation and agriculture.

20.—Hon. Mr. Howe laid on the table of the House of Assembly, prious plans of the Pailway survey, with the report, by Major Robins, and despatches relating to the Halifax and Quebec Railway.—A ammittee on commercial reciprocity was also appointed by the House. 22.—During a discussion in the House of Assembly several members atted that in Merigomish, and in the counties of Cumberland, Guysbough, and other sections of the Province, some of the inhabitants were a destitute condition, owing to scarcity produced by failure of the rops, &c.

25.—Despatches were laid on the table of the House, referring to the blection of the revenue, and announcing her Majesty's assent to the ll which produced a change in the Excise Department.

FEBRUARY 3.— The House of Assembly passed an Address to her lajesty, praying the Royal assent to the Departmental Bill passed in he session of 1848; the debate on the address was continued for sevel days.

7.—A meeting of merchants, fishermen and others, interested in the sport of pickled fish, was held at Masonic Hall, Halifax, for the pursee of considering a measure to be submitted to the Legislature. An

28 .- A fire in Halifax consumed a range of buildings in Upper Water Street, belonging to Hon. H. H. Cogswell, and injured other property During the night another fire broke out, which partially destroyed a unfinished house in Hurd's Lane, -The dwelling house and tw barns occupied by Mr. Conrad Wentzell, New Germany Road, Luner

burg, were also destroyed by fire.

MARCH 5 .- Died, Mr. James Smith, aged 83 years, a native Aberdeenshine, and for 60 years a respectable inhabitant of Halifax.

14 .- A dreadful fire broke out at York Point, St. John, N. B. which destroyed about 80 houses, rendering upwards of 2000 persons house less .- An extensive fire also occurred in that city, a few week previous.

23.-A series of resolutions relating to the proposed Railway, wa passed in the House of Assembly; they provide for the appointment commissioners, the right of way, the introduction of a Railway Bill, a address to the Queen, &c. On the adjournment of the House, the par sage of the resolutions was hailed by the gallery with a long continue

and enthusiastic burst of applause.

29 .-- An appalling avalanche was dislodged at York Redont, her Ferguson's Cove. A large mass of ice and snow on the slope of the hill, loosened by the thaw and rain, gave way and rushed downward upon Mr. Thomas Bazeley's house which was seated below, buryin and wrenching it from the foundation. In the house an infant in th cradle was smothered to death, an older child was very severel crushed, and Mr. Bazeley considerably injured. A girl and lad wh happened to be outside were forced by the driving mass into the sea the lad, however, escaped narrowly, having one arm broken in the scramble for his life.

31.—The Legislature was prorogued by his Excellency Sir Joh

Harvey, after a session of about 10 weeks.

APRIL 11 .- Died at Halifax, John Whidden, Esq. " After man years practice in his native County, where he deservedly acquired character for honor, probity, and integrity, he was appointed to the confidential office of Clerk of the Assembly, the duties of which situation tion he discharged with marked ability and courtesy. JUNE 5 .- Much excitement was created in Halifax, on the arrival of the R. M. steam packet, which brought accounts of an attempt to shoot er Majesty, in St. James's Park, by a laborer named John Hamilton.-In the night of this date the house opposite the Halifax Post Office,

wned by Mr. Matt, was destroyed by fire.

8.-The hundredth anniversary of the settlement of Halifax was cebrated with unusual ceremony and rejoicing. From the dawn of day mil 10 o'clock at night was a period of varied popular demonstrations, long and detailed account of which has been published in our Almanac hr 1851 .- The celebration of the 96th anniversary of the landing the first settlers was also celebrated at Lunenburg, by a procession, maddress, and other appropriate proceedings.

11 .- Hon. James McNab was appointed to the office of Receiver beeral, and the Hon. Herbert Huntingdon to that of Financial Secre-

13 .-- About this date alarming fires raged round the city. nesday (12) the city was for two hours completely enveloped in a lease mass of smoke. The heat was intense. In the vicinity of Truro many fences and several fields of rain were also destroyed by fire.

29.-Two fires occurred in Cumberland County, one at Amherst, shich destroyed a dwelling house and several barns, the other at arsboro', by which fifteen buildings were consumed. Sore Throat. -We have known several instances in which this di tressing complaint, even in its worst stages, has been immediately at speedily cured by the following remedy: - Mix a penny-worth pounded camphor with a wine glass of brandy, pour a small quantity a lump of sugar, and allow it to dissolve in the mouth every hour, T third or fourth generally enables the patient to swallow with ease. BOIL MOLASSES .- When molasses is used in cooking, it is a ve great improvement to boil and skim it before you use it. It takes o the unpleasant raw taste, and makes it almost as good as sugar. When molasses is used much for cooking, it is well to prepare one of tw

gallons in this way at a time.

To MAKE YEAST .- To two middling-sized boiled potatoes, add a pit of boiling water and two tablespoonfuls of brown sugar. One pint hot water should be applied to every half pint of the compound. He water is better in warm weather. This yeast, being made without flour, will keep longer, and is said to be much better, than any previous ously in use.

choice of his secret, and preserved it until the day of his death. After that event the receipt was found hid away in a hole in the cellar wall. Here it is; 7 lbs coarse salt, 5 lbs brown sugar, 2 oz saltpetre, 4 oz pearl ash, 4 gallons of water. Boil all together, and scum the pickle well when cold. Put it on the meat. Hams to remain in 8 weeksbeef 3 weeks. The above is for 100 lbs weight.

MAKING JELLY.-Those who would make fine jelly should always avoid boiling the juice of the fruit, when it is desirable to have the article, when made, retain the flavor of the fruit from which it was prepared. After the juice is pressed from the fruit, and the proper quantity of sugar added to it, let it be heated until the sugar is dissolved;

after this is effected, no further heat is required.

BAKED APPLES .-- A nice and wholesome sweetmeat for family use .-Pare, or not, as you choose, a quantity of sweet apples, to fill an earthen or stone jar; add a little sugar or molasses, and if the apples are not sufficiently juicy, a little water; cover with a thick paste of flour and water, and put into a brisk oven with your bread. Let them stand till morning. They will have the flavor of baked pears, and can be had fresh at all seasons, - Am. Ag.

SHRINKING FLANNELS .- Enclose new flannel in a bag; put it into boiler with cold water; heat and boil it. It will never shrink any more after the operation, and should then be made up into garments.

RENOVATING SILKS .- Old silk dresses can be made to look as good s new by the following process: - "Unpick the dress; put it into a ub and cover it with cold water; let it remain an hour; dip it up and down but do not wring it, hang it up to drain, iron it very damp, and it will look beautiful.

DRILLING GLASS .- Glass may be drilled like metal by keeping the instrument (a common iron drill) moist with a solution of camphor in

turpentine.

BLOOD AND SAP .- After the blood of the animal has been perfected in the lungs, it is conducted by minute arteries, to every part of the body, and is transmuted into flesh, &c. After the sap has been elaborated to leaves, it is conveyed in like manner to every part of the plant, and converted into wood, fruit, &c.

#### THE FARMER'S MANUAL.

ADVICE TO YOUNG FARMERS.—Judge Buel, in an address before the brekshire Agricultural Society, said, that every age demands a greater degree mental culture than the one which preceded it, and it behoves you to qualifyourselves for that which dawns upon your mental vision. The more you arn to depend upon yourselves, the more you will find developed energies and capacities, of which you are yet unconscious of possessing—the more 'ikely ou will be to prosper in life. The sapling which is sheltered by the towering one wide spreading oak, is neither so strong or so graceful, as that which pows up without shelter and acquires strength and solidity from the buffetings of the winds and storms. The plant that is nurtured in the shade is not so beautiful th

The plant that is nurtured in the shade is not so beautial—its blossoms are not so fragrant nor its fruit so rich, as the form, the lower, and the fruit of that which grows in the glare of solar light.

The culture of the mind should engage your serious attention, that you may woner profit by its counsels and its powers. Mind is the great master power, which instructs, guides, and abridges human labor—the grand source of intelectual pleasure—a faculty which distinguishes man from the brute, and which, it is more or less cultivated, marks the graduations of civilized society. Say sit is more or less cultivated, marks the graduations of civilized society. Say in that you have no leisure for this, that your time is engressed in providing for your animal wants. Franklin found time to bestow upon his mind high and metal culture, amid the cares and labors of a mechanic's life. Flemish Farming.—Before the revival of agriculture commenced in Flanders the soil was almost barren, being little better than white sand. Now its produce to the acre is said to be twice as great as that of the cultivated land of England. The grand maxim of the Flemish farmer is—'Without manure, a corn; without cattle, no manure; without root crops, no cattle.'

Heading Cabbages in Winter.—In the fall of the year when it is time to gathe enbbages, we always find more or less of them that have not formed any head They may have grown well, and have a large stock of leaves, but have no closed up in the form necessary to make a good, solid, compact cabbage.

A farmer friend of ours has practiced for many years the following method which effectually closes these loose leaves in the course of the winter, thereb furnishing a supply of the best kind early in the spring.

In the fall of the year, just before the ground closes up, he gathers all the cabbages which have not headed; he then edge a trench, eighteen inches.
