The Elders visit the families in their respective Districts, note changes of residence, and acquaint the Minister and Session of cases requiring special attention, such as sickness, &c. *For residence of Elders see preceeding page.*

DISTRICT No. I.—MR. JAMES TASKER.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Mile End.

DISTRICT No. II.—MR. C. D. PROCTOR.

From St. Lawrence street (not inclusive), East to Long Point and Longueuil, and from the River north to city limits (including Petit  Cote.)

DISTRICT No. III.—MR. ROBT. WEIR and MR. ALEX. McFEE.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV.—MR. T. A. GIBSON, and MR. JOHN TAYLOR.

From Union Avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park Avenue inclusive; from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain

DISTRICT No. V.—MR. COLIN McARTHUR.

From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive) and from St Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI.—MR. JOHN L. MORRIS, and Mr. P. S. ROSS.

From McGill College Avenue to Union Avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. VII.—MR. G. M. KINGHORN.

From University and Hanover streets (not inclusive) to Beaver Hall Square (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by McGill street.

DISTRICT No. VIII.—MR. ALEX. MACPHERSON.

From McGill College Avenue, to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. IX.—MR. JAMES A. CANTLIE.

From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to St. Genevieve street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street to the River by Duke street (including both.)

DISTRICT No. X.—MR. JAMES CROIL, and MR. ALEX. MITCHELL.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Mark street (not inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI.—MR. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester Avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XII.—REV'D DR. J. CLARKE MURRAY.

From Mark street (inclusive) to Cote St. Antoine, and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Cote des Neiges.

DISTRICT No. XIII.—MR. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by Ann street.

PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at Eleven A.M., and Seven P.M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednesday Evening at Eight o'clock.

THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P.M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.

THE MINISTER'S BIBLE-CLASS for boys meets every Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May and October.

ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month immediately after the Morning Service.

THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation appointed at the Annual Meeting.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.

THE YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION meets in the School-room every Sabbath Morning at a quarter past Ten o'clock, and on alternate Monday Evenings at Eight o'clock during the winter months.

THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.

APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEXANDER EWAN, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton at the church.

MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.

CASES OF SICKNESS should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.

The Minister is at home during the winter months every Thursday Evening when the young men of the Congregation are invited to come and see him.

Missionary and Benevolent Funds.

The following are the chief purposes for which the General Assembly invites all the Congregations of the Church to contribute annually :—

I. Home Missions. The support of religious ordinances to settlers in the new districts of the country, such as Muskaka, Algoma, Parry Sound, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia, as well as in the more remote and scattered districts of the older Provinces. The amount required for the whole church for the current year is \$45,000. In the Western Section of the Church, for which our contributions are asked, there are upwards of 200 mission fields, and 600 preaching stations; and 7,500 families receive religious instruction. The amount contributed by these mission stations themselves last year was \$22,468.

II. Augmentation of Stipends. Upon the principle that the strong should help the weak, this fund was instituted a few years ago by the General Assembly, with a view to supplementing inadequate stipends in some of the smaller congregations, the desire of the Assembly being, that none of the ministers should receive less than \$750 a year, with a manse. To accomplish this, the amount required for the current year, east and west, is \$50,000. The number of congregations in the western section requiring to be aided in this way is 169.

III. Foreign Missions. The Presbyterian Church in Canada, has a staff of 20 ordained missionaries engaged in preaching the Gospel to the heathen, besides a number of other labourers, among whom are 8 or 9 Canadian ladies. The missions under the care of the Western Section of the Church are—(1) To the Indians in the North-West; (2) The mission to Formosa China, which has been so wonderfully prosperous through the instrumentality of Dr. G. L. Mackay and his associates; and, (3) The mission to Central India in which there are now 5 ordained missionaries employed. The missions conducted by the Eastern Section, are in the New Hebrides and in Trinidad, both of which have been remarkably successful. The amount expended annually in all these missions is about \$60,000. The number of native communicants in the different fields is upwards of 2,000: the number of teachers and native helpers 150, making with the ministers and their wives, a total effective force of 187 labourers in the mission work to the heathen.

IV. French Evangelization. The number of French Roman Catholics in the Dominion, is estimated to be 1,250,000. The Board of French Evangelization expends \$35,000 annually in its efforts to bring these our fellow-countrymen under the influence of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The number of fields occupied is 33; preaching stations, 75; ordained missionaries, 22; unordained, 42; schools, 22; teachers, 27; pupils, 707. The Pointe-aux-Trembles schools are maintained with yearly increasing success and usefulness.

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V. The College Fund. Provision is made through this fund for supporting the revenues of Knox College, Toronto, Queen's College, Kingston, and the Presbyterian College, Montreal. The amount required for the current year is \$15,050. Manitoba College does not receive anything from this fund, the General Assembly, however, asks the congregations of the Church to contribute toward its support annually.

VI. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund. From this fund annuities are provided for the Widows and Orphans of ministers, who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes from \$8 to \$12 a year to the fund. The annuities to widows vary from \$140 to \$300 per annum.

VII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The number of annuitants at present is forty-six. The highest annuity paid is only \$220. Liberal contributions are urgently needed to maintain even the present very inadequate scale of payments. Expenditure last year, \$8,891.00.

The above are the principal Schemes of the General Assembly, to which all the congregations of the Church are expected to contribute annually. The mode of contributing for them in this Congregation, is by means of a schedule sent to all the members and adherents at the beginning of the year, in which they are requested to enter the amounts they desire to contribute for the different purposes named, and to transmit it to the Treasurer. Those who prefer to contribute anonymously are at liberty to do so. As this is the *only* way in which the contributions of St. Paul's Congregation are asked for these purposes, it is earnestly hoped that none will decline, but that each will give according to his or her intelligent judgment.

N.B.—In addition, and quite distinct from these, it is to be remembered that this Congregation is pledged for the support of the missionary who has gone to **Central India** upon our invitation, and who is now engaged in mission work, under the auspices of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. The amount annually required for this purpose is \$1400. Any members of the congregation who feel so disposed, have the privilege of sending a contribution for this purpose to the minister.

Pastoral Letter

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.

MY DEAR FRIENDS,

Another year is past, and there is much cause for gratitude in the retrospect. During the terrible epidemic which brought death and sadness into so many homes in this city our Congregation was mercifully spared. With a complete immunity from the disease ourselves, we were enabled to give our sympathy and our help to the sufferers.

There has been a steady and encouraging growth in every department of our congregational life. Our members have increased, and there has been more than a proportional increase of active workers. The services on Sunday have been largely and regularly attended, and I earnestly pray that these are bearing fruit in deepening Christian life and increasing Christian charity. The most discouraging feature in our review of the year's work is the smallness of the attendance at our Wednesday evening services. This is at least one of the pulses, and not the least significant, by which we must judge of the spiritual health of the Congregation.

Will you kindly take this matter into your most earnest consideration, and do what you think right by your minister, your fellow-members, your children, your companions, and your own souls. Is it not well, if not absolutely needful, for us unitedly to acknowledge Christ and ask His help in the midst of our week-day life and work and temptations?

The steady increase of our Young Men's Association cheers me greatly. I delight in our Sunday morning meetings, and wish many more would come to join us. I hope ere long to be able to report that as an Association we have taken up some practical Christian work.

I acknowledge with sincere thanks the aid and encouragement given to me by the Elders and Trustees and the varied Christian workers in the different departments of our activity.

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The ready and generous response to the appeal that was made for a special missionary of our own to Central India, is one of the most cheering experiences of my whole ministry. It marks an era not only in our congregational life, but in the history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and is hailed by the General Assembly as the first fruits of a new and growing source of supply for our Foreign Mission work.

Mr. Murray, whose services we were especially fortunate in securing, has already entered on his work in a spirit of devotion and hopefulness. I hope ere long to give you full information as to the field he labours in and his experience. His chief message to us is "Remember me, and pray for me." The sum of \$1485, including interest, was subscribed. One of the largest subscribers has left the country, and there may be other deficiencies to make up, but I have not the slightest fear that you will abandon the work which you have begun. In due time I will make a statement regarding the mission and its needs, and that of itself, I feel sure, will secure continued support.

I gratefully acknowledge the receipt of \$185. for private distribution amongst the poor, and I have had abundant opportunity of dispensing this kindly charity.

May God's richest blessing rest on every home and every heart in this congregation, and on their friends far and near. The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen.

Report of the Kirk-Session.

1885.

The Kirk-Session unite with the Trustees and other Boards and Committees of the Church, in devout acknowledgement to God for the continuance of His goodness and mercy during another year. The work of the Congregation in its various branches has been carried on vigourously, and with such tokens of success as encourage us to look for higher attainments in the future. The number of young men now connected with the congregation, and taking an intelligent and active interest in its affairs is, to the Kirk-Session, one of the most satisfactory and hopeful evidences that the work of the Lord, is prospering among us.

Important changes have taken place in the *personnel* of the Kirk-Session during the past year. Two of our number resigned—Messrs. David Morrison and James Moore, the former owing to his removal to Toronto, the latter for family reasons, connecting himself with another congregation; both these esteemed brethren carried away with them the best wishes of every member of the Kirk-Session. Another name disappears this year from the printed list of Elders, that of Mr. Neil J. McGillivray, for many years an active and influential member of the congregation, who has taken up his residence in Scotland. Nine Elders were added during the year, five of these had already served in other congregations, namely, Messrs. John L. Morris, Rev. Dr. J. Clarke Murray, George M. Kinghorn, Philip S. Ross, and William Walker. Four were ordained to the office of the eldership, Messrs. John Taylor, Colin McArthur, John Larmonth and Alexander McFee. The number of acting Elders is now seventeen. A careful re-adjustment of the districts has been made and it is hoped that the members will soon become acquainted with the Elders of their respective districts, and the Elders with the families.

In the course of the year, the balance of the late Mr. William Christie's legacy, was paid over to the Treasurer of the Kirk-Session. The bequest, amounting to \$1,000, has been invested at six per cent. per annum, and thus has been secured an annual income of \$60, which in accordance with the testator's suggestion, will be available in the form of a bursary, to assist some deserving candidate for the

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ministry. In this connection the Kirk-Session learn with much satisfaction, that Mr. Murray Watson, in whom they have taken a deep interest for some years, expects in a short time to complete his curriculum, and their prayer for him is that he may go forth from us to enter enthusiastically on the work of the ministry, with the blessing of God resting upon him.

The Kirk-Session notice with satisfaction that the special collections on the Communion Sabbaths, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas, amounting in all to \$741.09, were sufficient to meet the expenditure of the year, for the relief of the poor through the Kirk-Session, as well as for other sessional purposes. The demands on our sympathies were more numerous this year than usual, but the collections were correspondingly large.

The whole Congregation was visited during the year by the Minister accompanied by the Elder of the district, when pains were taken to obtain as full and accurate a census of the congregation as possible. The names and addresses of the heads of families and other individual members and adherents, are given in another part of this report, and will be useful for reference. It is hoped that if any mistakes are found in this register, these will be pointed out to the Elder of the district, and also, that due notice will be given to the Elders of the change of address of any of the families.

The number of communicants on the roll is 575, a net increase for the year of 20. There were present at the communion in January, 405; in June, 401; and in October, 420.

The Congregation will be glad to learn that their venerable and much esteemed ex-pastor, the Rev. Dr. Jenkins, has recovered from a severe attack of illness, and is now with his family enjoying a fair measure of health and strength, in the neighbourhood of London, England. They will also be pleased to know that Dr. Jenkins, continues to manifest in a practical manner, his interest in the continued welfare and prosperity of the Congregation, to which in the providence of God, he ministered so long and so successfully.

The Missionary contributions of the year, were considerably in excess of what they were last year, though we are still far from hav-

ing attained the full measure of our ability in this behalf. Let us not be weary in well doing. Let us endeavour to provoke one another to love and good works. Freely we have received; let us give freely, that the Word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified in this city, throughout this land, and in all lands.

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The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday, the Eleventh of January, 1886, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Mr. Alex. Mitchell was called to the chair, and Mr. E. B. Greenshields requested to act as secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Jas. Barclay. Before the business of the meeting commenced, Mr. Barclay thanked the office-bearers and members of the congregation, for the cordial support he had received from them during the year, and the chairman read a letter from Mr. Andrew Allan expressing his regret at being unable to be present at the meeting.

The minutes of the last annual meeting, held on the twelfth of January, 1885, were read and confirmed. The Secretary then read the report of the Trustees, and the Treasurer submitted his financial statement.

Whereupon it was moved by the Rev. Prof. J. C. Murray LL.D., seconded by Mr. H. Munro, and carried,—

That the report of the Trustees be approved of and adopted, and that it, with the Treasurer's statement, and the minutes of the meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.

Mr. John McDonald read the report of the committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church; when it was moved by Mr. J. Tasker, seconded by Mr. J. Hunter and resolved,—

That the report of the Committee be received, approved, and printed with the other reports for distribution, that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds contributed during the year, and that

MR. J. MURRAY SMITH, MR. R. FORSYTH,
MR. A. S. EWING, and MR. JOHN McDONALD,
be elected members of the Committee for the current year.

It was then moved by Mr. George A. Cameron, seconded by Mr. R. Forsyth, and carried,—

That the thanks of the Congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year.

The chairman next announced to the meeting that the Trustees who retired by rotation were Mr. John Rankin and Mr. R. A. Ramsay, and that Mr. Rankin had declined re-election, in a letter to Mr. Andrew Allan the chairman of the the Board of Trustees, dated 9th January, 1886, which he read.

Whereupon, it was moved by Mr. Forsyth, seconded by Mr. M. McKenzie, and carried unanimously,—

That the congregation of St. Paul's Church cannot allow the letter of Mr. John Rankin, declining to accept re-election as a member of the Board of Trustees, to be put on record, without at the same time expressing their deep feeling of gratitude to him for his valuable services on that Board for a number of years, during many of which he acted as Treasurer of the Church, performing the arduous duties of that office in a thoroughly satisfactory manner.

That the Secretary be instructed to forward to Mr. Rankin a copy of this resolution.

The following motions were thereafter moved, seconded, and carried, in the order mentioned, viz :

Moved by Mr. J. M. Kinghorn, seconded by Mr. Colin McArthur,—

That Mr. R. A. Ramsay and Hon. Donald A. Smith, be elected Trustees for the usual term.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Ramsay, seconded by Mr. John Lewis,—

That Messrs. John Fair and P. S. Ross, be thanked for their services as auditors for the past year, and that they be requested to continue in their office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. John McDonald, seconded by Mr. William V. Gordon,—

That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to the Organist, for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

Mr. P. S. Ross in a few well chosen remarks proposed a vote of thanks to the chairman for his able conduct in the chair. This was seconded by Mr. John Lewis, and cordially carried.

Mr. Mitchell in replying expressed the pleasure it had given him to preside over the meeting, and there being no further business before it, it was closed with prayer.

Report of the Trustees.

The Report which the Trustees of St. Paul's Church have now the pleasure of submitting cannot fail to be very satisfactory and gratifying to the Congregation.

Under the able and energetic ministry of the Rev. JAMES BARCLAY, M.A., the year which has just closed has been a very prosperous one, and the Church has made steady progress.

The attendance at the Sunday Services both in the morning and in the evening has been very large, and there are only six sittings unlet, except those reserved, as has always been the case, for free sittings.

During the year now closed and during the previous one, there have been several applications for pews which the Treasurer had great difficulty in satisfying. This led the Trustees to discuss the various plans proposed by which the accommodation of the church might be increased. These were carefully considered, but in view of the general commercial depression that exists and as the Treasurer has so far been able to supply all applicants with seats, the Trustees decided that it would not be advisable to make any alterations in the church in the meantime.

The ordinary plate collections for the year amount to \$2,815.53. This is somewhat less than last year, but the decrease \$206.69 is fully accounted for by the special circumstances of the Congregation during the summer months. The Trustees hope that in the year just entered on, the plate collections will be very much larger than they have hitherto been, and they would urge upon the members of the Congregation the careful consideration of this matter. They think the plan of having a special collection for the general funds of the Church, on the first Sunday of each month, is a good one, and they propose to continue it. The ordinary contributions through the plate collections are not sufficient, and the Trustees hope that the Congregation will support the monthly collections in a generous spirit.

The Trustees are pleased to report the successful working of the plan proposed in the last report, and adopted at the last general meeting, for increasing the amount derived from the pew rents, and

especially note the cheerful manner in which the increased amounts have been given.

It will be seen from the Treasurer's statement, submitted with this report, that he has received from pew rents this year \$7,330.85 as against \$5,954.50 last year, an increase of 1,376.35.

At the rates at present charged, the Trustees think that the prices of sittings in the church are very reasonable.

The earnest attention of the Congregation is especially requested to the prompt payment of the pew rents early in the year. They are due in January, and it is very important that payments should be made promptly wherever it is possible. At present the Church Officer's time is largely taken up with collecting the pew rents, to the detriment of his other duties. The Board feels confident that the attention of the Congregation needs only to be directed to this to secure its being remedied at once.

The difference between revenue and expenditure has been \$2593.83 which has been supplied from the amount drawn from the Guarantee fund, during the year, viz, : \$3000.

Last year the deficiency similarly supplied was \$4,321.72, which, however, included several items of expenditure that do not properly come under the head of annual expenses, as explained in the last annual report.

The Trustees have much pleasure in drawing attention to this very considerable reduction, and in doing so, express the hope that this year even a less amount will be required. They trust that in a short time the congregation, by liberally contributing to the ordinary revenue of the Church, will make it more than sufficient to meet the ordinary expenditure.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Mr. John Rankin and Mr. Robert A. Ramsay, both of whom are eligible for re-election.

The School was closed during the months of July, August, September and October, being two months longer than usual as a measure of precaution during the prevalence of the recent epidemic, with this exception the work of the School has been steadily and heartily carried on.

The number of teachers on the roll during the year, including librarians, was 35. The number of scholars on the roll on the 31st Dec. was 216 ; girls 108, and boys 108.

The Rev. Jas. Barclay, being very desirous of solving the problem of keeping the older boys in the school, undertook to teach a class of boys over fourteen. The effort has been most successful, the class now numbering 24, with an average attendance of about 18 ; unfortunately there is no proper accommodation for such a class and it has to be taught in the back room by gas light.

The teachers have been much encouraged by the presence of the elders, two of whom visit the school each Sunday and they are particularly indebted to Mr. Croil for frequent visits and addresses given by him upon Missionary subjects.

The roll at the close of the year, was 22 teachers and 180 scholars.

The Missionary contributions for the year amounted to \$98.02 apart from the sum of \$50, given to the Pointe-aux-Trembles School for support of a pupil there.

The annual grant from our Church was supplemented by \$100, collected from other sources, making with the missionary contributions about \$500 in receipts. The disbursements were \$440, leaving

a balance of \$60, of which amount \$40 has been carried to our Mortgage fund.

The prevalence of small-pox in the vicinity of our School caused us much anxiety, and although some of our number were attacked, yet there were no fatal cases.

The Sunday evening services are still continued, and are self-supporting. We have been fortunate this year in securing the services of Mr. Rochester of the Presbyterian College, a student of great promise, who conducts the meetings which are held from the beginning of December, to the end of March.

Our Cheerful Workers still continue their good work of supporting a pupil in the Pointe-aux-Trembles school, at an annual cost of \$50.

We regret to say that the flood last spring caused a great deal of damage and loss to many of the families connected with the School, and to the school building itself, which at one time had 12 inches of water on the main floor.

Should we be visited by many more such floods, our chapel may be permanently injured.

During the winter two enjoyable social meetings were held, a means whereby the members may become acquainted.

It is our sad duty to report the death of one of our committee, Mr. J. H. Samuel, while on duty in the defence of our city. We merely bear testimony to his sterling worth, in him our Society has lost one of its most active members.

Although the literary and musical entertainments have been of a very interesting nature, still some of the members, especially the younger, have not realized that to be a member of the Society is a privilege, otherwise they would make it a point to be present.

The election of office-bearers for the Session 1885-86 took place the 20th October, 1885, when the above-named office-bearers were elected. It was decided after some deliberation that the literary part of the meetings be as last year, upon Canadian subjects, and your Committee were successful in getting specialists to treat the subjects chosen, the importance of which the members, it is expected, will show their appreciation of by being present at each meeting.

We are pleased to report a large increase in the membership, there being now 216 names on the roll.

It is in contemplation that the Society should undertake some missionary work in the city. The Rev. Mr. Barclay feeling that the Society should be interested in work of that nature, we hope all the necessary assistance will be given in aiding him in the work.

Another year of the benevolent work of this Society has closed, and with feelings of deep gratitude we have to report that its weekly meetings have been well attended, much interest manifested, and a large amount of work done to aid not only poor families and individuals in our own congregation, but also several outside deserving objects requiring help; principally the Industrial Rooms, Hervey Institute, Cote St. Antoine Church, and Protestant Small-Pox Hospital. A committee of the Society took charge of the fortnightly supplies of delicacies for the latter institution, which were generously donated by many members of the congregation.

There were distributed 142 yards of unmade material, such as flannel, wincey, &c., besides boots and rubbers. The work sent to the Industrial Rooms bazaar, was valued at \$176.00, and that sent to the Hervey Institute bazaar, at about \$149.00. As in former years, the Society feels under much obligation to the ladies who kindly undertook the duty of collecting, also to all who responded to their calls by providing the funds for its work.

It is hoped that the interest in the work of the Society will become even more general than it has been; and with God's blessing on our labours and contributions, that still more good may be done in the future than in the past.
