THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT  
—OF THE—  
TORONTO RELIEF SOCIETY,  

---

1887-88.

THE Managers of this Society, with the experience and lessons of another year, beg leave to present the following as their Thirteenth Report, and take this first public opportunity of returning their sincere thanks to a generous public, for the larger and more spontaneous assistance rendered them, not only in a pecuniary, but in a sympathizing sense, of the arduous and unremunerative duties performed.

This Society is yearly becoming better known, and is gaining in an unobtrusive, but not the less sure way, a firm footing in the City, as one of the most useful organizations within its limits, and, as such, is obtaining for itself the respect and confidence of the people. In the season just ended, the Society has relieved the very large number of 807 different families, embracing an average of 4035 persons, the largest known since its formation, and among these are many distressing cases of families who in the past have not known what it was to seek relief, and who in consequence have been reluctant to come forward and accept assistance at the hands of the Society. Such cases are largely attributable to the disastrous strikes forced upon the men last year, who belonged to the several Unions. Sickness, too, and improvidence—that greatest factor among a large section of our population—to say nothing of the rapid extension of the City's limits, have all contributed their quota to mark the season of 1887-88 as the heaviest yet known to the Society. It will not be wondered at in the face of these facts, that the Society, in spite of the aid received from the City, and larger collections than usual from the public, is for the first time in debt, and with the earnest desire of being yet able to meet its liabilities, has caused a petition to be presented to the Council of the City, praying for increased aid, and there is every hope that its prayer will be granted. In view of the fact that a large number of those persons relieved are immigrants, who come to our shores under the assisted passage system, and upon too highly colored representations of agents of the Government at home, this Society may fairly lay claim to be considered in the category of charities doing immense good to the public, the strongest argument in its favor being, that it is strictly undenominational, relieving any and all who knock at its door, irrespective of creed or color. So great has been the demand upon the time of the officers of the Society, that in

addition to the regular monthly meetings, weekly executive meetings have been held at the residence of the Treasurer, in order to keep pace with the work, and relieve pressing cases of need.

The Second, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Divisions will be found to have been the scenes of the heaviest work, and the statistics of the whole ten Divisions show that the English and Irish families predominate.

Even though the season is practically at an end, and work plenty for those who are able and willing, yet the Society has many cases of chronic illness upon its books, which are visited and cared for so long as is necessary, and therefore moneys and provisions are still needed to carry on the good work.

Attention is drawn to the report of the INDUSTRIAL ROOM, where a number of women have been constantly employed in the manufacture of under-clothing, in order to educate them in the way of helping themselves.

Appended are extracts from the reports of the several Divisions, which indicate in a measure the amount of labor performed by the several ladies of the Society, all of whom, from the President down, give their services gratuitously.

First Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Schoff.—38 families assisted, 7 widows, 1 cripple, 2 consumptives, 9 cases of protracted illness. In a majority of the other cases helped, the causes of their poverty appeared to be improvidence, and want of employment. Forty-six orders for fuel granted, 22 pairs of boots distributed, 5 pairs of slippers, 1 stove partially paid for. Each case has been thoroughly investigated, and judiciously relieved. Four families have been on the books for more than a year.

Second Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Steele.—128 families assisted. The chief causes of distress are illness and want of work. 45 orders for fuel given, and in extreme cases, orders for bread and meat. About 100 visits have been made by the ladies of this Division during the winter. We have to gratefully thank those who contributed clothing or other necessities to our Depository. Six families received help in former years.

Third Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Brunt.—38 families relieved, 10 of these were widows with large families, all of whom have been regularly visited, and found without one exception to be respectable, sober people. Owing to sickness, and accidents to the bread-winners, many large families were left entirely unprovided for. 21 orders for fuel given. Thanks are due to the generous ladies who sent clothing to our Depository.

Fourth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Clapp.—Over 68 families relieved. 21 orders for fuel given. The great distress in this Division has been caused by the strikes last summer, men leaving their wives and families unprovided for during the winter. Employment has been found for quite a large number of men and women, a great many soup

tickets given, and night lodgings have been provided for 25 or 30 people. A great deal of sickness has caused distress. While trying to help cases of real distress, every effort is made to keep the expenses of the Depository as low as possible. Thanks are due to those friends who kindly sent clothing, boots and shoes to the Depository. Three families have been helped in previous years.

Fifth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Morrison.—110 families have received assistance. The principal causes of destitution were want of employment, illness and old age. The families this season have been deserving poor, no very striking case of fraud has come before our notice. The ladies of the Fifth Division are much indebted to Mr. H. Dixon's Bible Class, for groceries, blankets, etc., given at Christmas. Sixteen families received aid in former years.

Sixth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Miller.—115 families helped, some requiring constant, others only temporary relief. The chief causes of distress were want of work, illness and improvidence. Many women received work from the Industrial Room. Thanks are due to those generous friends who sent donations of clothing, food, etc., to the Depository.

Seventh Division. Superintendent, Mrs. J. Cawthra.—146 families helped, 5 of these were found unworthy. 186 orders for fuel given, 321 for groceries, 26 for boots. The distress has been unusually great this winter, owing chiefly to want of work and illness. Over 290 visits have been made by our ladies, and the collections sent in, much more liberal than in former years. Many donations of clothing and boots are thankfully acknowledged. Fourteen families received aid in former years.

Eighth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Mackie.—80 families helped, many were late arrivals from England last year, and have been steadily relieved each fortnight. Although many families availed themselves of the coal club, it has been found necessary to give a large number of orders for fuel. Blankets have been given, but the Division has not been called upon to give clothing, as the Dorcas Society of St. Matthias Church received from many generous friends a large amount of clothing for the poor, which was carefully distributed. Five families helped in former years.

Ninth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Lennox.—50 families helped. During the month of January, 36 orders for fuel. Medicine was bought in 2 cases, in others the doctors have kindly given services and medicine free. Illness has been the chief cause of distress, and there are still cases of severe illness to be attended to. Several donations of clothing are thankfully acknowledged.

Tenth Division. Superintendent, Mrs. Richardson.—34 families have been supplied with groceries every fortnight, fuel and clothing, also meat when necessary. The chief cause of destitution has been want of work, only in two cases any sign of intemperance found. Only 6 families on the list were assisted in previous years. Work could

often be obtained for the women, but, in some cases, they were not employed a second time, owing to the indifferent manner in which the work was performed.

Several medical men have most kindly and generously given their time and medicine free, for which we wish to tender them our hearty thanks.

Though the work has been heavier, and the responsibility greater this season, and often the ladies are weary in their labor of love, their hearts are refreshed and their energies quickened, by the assurance given, that "Inasmuch as ye did it to one of the least of these, my brethren, ye did it unto me," and the cup of cold water given in the name of Christ will have its great reward.

## INDUSTRIAL ROOM REPORT, 1888.

THE Industrial Room was re-opened last January, in the Institute, corner Richmond and Sheppard Streets, and work was given out every Thursday until April.

For those to whom this branch of the work is new it may be stated that the Industrial Room was started five years ago, the object being to supply the needy, who are not employed elsewhere, with work at a fair remuneration, and to apply the labor test as far as possible in all cases.

Garments of all kinds are cut by the ladies at their own homes, who, if possible, superintend the giving out of the work, and inspecting it when returned. This last winter 144 women have obtained work, about 60 weekly. Two of our ladies are in the waiting room with the women every Thursday ready to give words of encouragement and advice, and at lunch time each applicant receives either a bowl of soup and bread, or a cup of tea.

Often the women have a long distance to come to the Rooms, and of course in many cases are obliged to wait some time for their turn, but the gratitude expressed by many, even by those living in the suburbs, fully compensated the Committee for their arduous task, and the many discouragements which this work involves. It is with great pleasure we notice the steady improvement of the work, both as regards sewing and cleanliness, and in consequence there was very little unsaleable work. This last winter we received a large order from the Infants Home. This was a great assistance and we were glad to give them the work at cost price. The committee hope that other institutions will follow their example.

Two women with baskets filled with saleable work were kept employed. They went about in the poorer districts, and were allowed 20 per cent. on all that they sold. This was found to answer very well, and another year we hope to have more of these basket-women.

Before the Annual Sale there was \$1,000 worth of stock on hand, about one-half of which was sold. Special thanks are tendered by the Committee to those who have assisted in the work during the winter, to those who gave so liberally to the refreshment table at the Sale, and to Miss M. Joseph, who did the work of the Secretary during her absence.

CONSTITUTION  
—OF THE—  
RELIEF SOCIETY OF TORONTO.

---

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be called the "RELIEF SOCIETY OF TORONTO," and it shall be in connection with the "Women's Christian Association."

ART. II.—The object of this Society shall be to obtain and dispense assistance for the really needy; it shall investigate all cases of distress reported to it; it shall endeavor, by consultation and co-operation with other societies, to prevent imposture; it shall seek to discourage a pauper spirit by helping people to help themselves, and it shall aim at the moral and spiritual improvement of those assisted.

ART. III.—For the furtherance of the above object, the City shall be apportioned into Divisions; each of which shall be under the care of a Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent (if desired), a Secretary, as many presiding ladies as may be necessary, and a Representative to the Industrial Room. These shall be called the Committee of the Division. Each Division shall be divided into Districts, each of which shall be under the care of a presiding lady. All members of this Committee shall have a vote at the meetings of the Board of Managers. Other visitors may be employed if necessary but they shall not have a vote.

ART. IV.—This Society shall endeavor to maintain an Industrial Room to provide work for women applying for assistance. This enterprise shall be governed by a Committee composed of a Convenor appointed at the annual meeting, and a representative from each Division who shall be appointed by the Committee of the Division.

ART. V.—All persons contributing to the funds of this Society shall be considered as members, and all ladies contributing, either themselves or through friends, shall be eligible for election on the Board of Management.

ART. VI.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Managers, composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and an Assistant-Treasurer, if necessary (who shall be members of the "Women's Christian Association"), the Superintendents and Secretaries of Divisions, the Presiding Ladies of Districts, and the Convenor, Secretary and Treasurer of the Industrial Room Committee. Of these managers, the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions, and the Convenor of the Industrial Room Committee shall be elected by ballot, at a public meeting to be called annually for the transaction of business in the beginning of May. The Secretaries of Divisions, the Presiding Ladies of Districts, with the representatives of the Industrial Room Committee, shall be appointed subsequently by the Superintendent of Divisions, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

ART. VII.—There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the General Officers, the Superintendents of Divisions, and the Convenor of the Industrial Room Committee. This Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board of Management. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

ART. VIII.—The annual meeting of this Society shall be held in connection with that of the "Women's Christian Association," when the Annual Report shall be presented.

ART. IX.—A special meeting of the Society may be called, by advertisement in the daily papers, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the Executive Committee, notice of the object of such meeting to be given. A special meeting of Managers may be called by the President, at the request of three of the Superintendents of Divisions, each member of the Board of Management to be notified of the object of such meeting.

ART. X.—This Constitution may be amended at any regular business meeting of the Board of Managers, by a two-thirds vote of those present; a month's notice of such changes having been given in writing; all such alterations must be ratified at the ensuing annual business meeting in May.

## BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I.—The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings on the first Monday of the month, at 2.30 p.m., or at such time and place as it shall appoint. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Weekly meetings shall be held in the Divisions, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon.

ART. II.—The President shall have general supervision of the work, and be *ex-officio* a member of all Committees. She shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Board of Managers, and shall perform such other duties as are incident to the office.

ART. III.—In the absence of the President and Vice-President, the Superintendent of a Division shall be appointed to preside, and shall perform all the duties of the office.

ART. IV.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep in some chartered bank all the moneys collected, and shall disburse them as the Board of Managers shall direct. She shall report the state of the treasury at each regular meeting. Her annual report shall be examined by auditors appointed by the Board of Managers.

ART. V.—The Secretary shall give notice of stated and special meetings, keep the minutes of the same, read them at the meetings of the Board of Managers and of the Executive Committee, and prepare the annual report. She shall hand over all the papers to her successor.

ART. VI.—It shall be the duty of each Superintendent:

1st. To divide her Division into Districts, and to obtain one Presiding Lady for each District.

2nd. To secure a room, if practicable, for a depository, to supply it with goods, and to see that a responsible person is appointed to attend there when necessary.

3rd. To see that Presiding Ladies are furnished with suitable collecting books, each of which must be headed with the boundaries of District and signed by the Superintendent and collectors. These must have the name of the Relief Society of Toronto printed on the cover.

4th. To draw from the Treasurer the money necessary for cash payments in her Division, giving a receipt for the same, and presenting before the next monthly meeting an account of that expenditure.

5th. To check all bills ordered by her, and to see that the same, as well as the account of the money drawn for cash payments, are presented to the Treasurer previous to the monthly meeting of the Board of Managers, and within one month of their being incurred.

6th. To arrange with the Treasurer on some day immediately preceding each monthly meeting the accounts of her Division, that the Treasurer's statement may be duly prepared.

7th. To receive reports of their Districts from her Presiding Ladies, and make a synopsis of these, with list of impostors, for the monthly meeting of the Board of Managers.

8th. To state the number of reports and cards she needs for her Division and see that all the subscribers in the same are supplied with a copy early in the Winter. She shall consult with her Presiding Ladies as to the best mode of doing this, and see that it is carried out.

ART. VII.—It shall be the duty of each Secretary of a Division :

1st. To attend at Depository weekly, see that the books of registration there are properly kept, and take notes of any orders sent in by Presiding Ladies since last meeting.

2nd. To render to Superintendent a monthly account of goods received and distributed, with remarks as to character of recipients, etc.

3rd. To send out notices of special meetings in the Division, keep the minutes of these as well as all regular meetings, and send out a monthly list of impostors to the Secretaries of other Divisions.

ART. VIII.—It shall be the duty of each Presiding Lady :

1st. To arrange a sufficient number of Visitors and Collectors in her District, and to see that the work is promptly and systematically done. To receive all moneys collected in the District, and hand them to the Superintendent, along with lists of subscriptions and donations, prepared for the printer; all amounts under twenty-five cents being added together under the heading of "Small Sums," and contributions from friends being added together under "Friends."

2nd. To send all applicants for relief to the Visitor of Section in which applicant resides, and see that each case is thoroughly investigated.

3rd. To find work, when possible, for applicants for relief.

4th. To report all cases at the weekly meeting of the Presiding Ladies of the Division, but in cases of emergency to give relief without waiting for a meeting.

6th. In case of absence or sickness during a season, to provide a substitute.

ART. IX.—It shall be the duty of each Visitor :

1st. To visit and collect in the Section assigned to her by the Presiding Lady, asking money, clothes, etc.; to arrange to have donations of clothing, etc., called for and taken to the Depository, in case the donors cannot send them, and to render to the Presiding Lady the money collected, with lists and subscriptions and donations.

2nd. To investigate every case of distress, and report immediately to Presiding Lady of District.

3rd. To keep a list of all persons found out of employment, and try and find employment for them while visiting or collecting in the District.

ART. X.—All money collected in the several Divisions shall be paid to the Treasurer, by the Superintendent, and no individual shall be at liberty to expend sums that have not been passed through the Treasurer's hands. Appropriations shall be made by the Board of Management to each Division, in proportion to the number reported as requiring relief, and any expenditure in excess of this appropriation must be sanctioned by the Board of Management. The bills of each Division shall be kept separate.

ART. XI.—Care shall be taken to find out whether applicants for relief are receiving aid from any other source, and no one receiving aid from this Society shall be permitted to beg from door to door. Where practicable, every recipient of relief shall be required to undertake some work for the Industrial Room.

ART. XII.—As it shall be the object of this Society to dispense charity on the same basis throughout the city, delicacies shall not be given from the funds col-

lected, except in cases of sickness, which must be specially reported; also, the Society shall, as far as possible, avoid undertaking the maintenance of pensioners, seeking rather to obtain permanent assistance for those needing it among the charitable institutions of the city.

ART. XIII.—These By-laws may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of the Society, a notice in writing being given a month before and ratified at the ensuing annual business meeting, held in the month of May.

ART. XIV.—A copy of the foregoing Constitution and By-laws shall be printed with the Annual Report, and shall be in the hands of every worker of this Society.

## By-Laws of the Industrial Room.

I.—The Committee, after its appointment each season, shall appoint from among its members a Secretary and a Treasurer. It shall appoint the time of its own meetings, and three members shall form a quorum.

II.—All moneys raised by Industrial Room, and all donations shall be the special property of the Industrial Room and disbursed according to direction of Industrial Room Committee. The Industrial Room shall be responsible for its own indebtedness.

III.—The Rooms shall be as nearly as possible in the central part of the city.

IV.—Work shall be supplied only to those who are really destitute, and each applicant for work must bring a voucher as to need, from some member of the Board in the Division to which she belongs. The Industrial Room may have its own Visiting Committee, and may give occasional work to women whose names may not be on the books of the Relief Society, on recommendation of the said Visiting Committee.

V.—A scale of prices for work shall be fixed by the Committee of the Industrial Room.

VI.—As each Depository Committee will insist, when practicable, on some work being done by all applicants for assistance, the Industrial Committee shall not refuse work to inferior workers.

VII.—The Committee shall be at liberty to make any further By-laws for its own guidance, so long as they do not interfere with the above or with the Constitution or By-laws of the parent Society.

VIII.—The By-laws may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Committee by a two-thirds vote of those present, notice having been given in writing one month previously.
