The War

The Italian* have made slight gains against the Austrians.

The Russians are still taking the offensive against the Germans in Poland and Galicia and have gained some ground. In Armenia the Russians are still progressing toward Trebizond, although they are meeting with strong opposition.

The fighting is still fierce around Verdun, and although the French are generally withstanding the German attacks the Germans are making slight gains. The British army have extended its lines so that the French may get more men.

The British captured 600 yards of trenches from the Germans around St. Eloi this week. Some British light cruisers had a brush with German torpedo boats, and several German ships were sunk. One British torpedo boat is missing. In East Africa General Smuts is progressing favorably.

THREE VITAL QUESTIONS

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

(Continued from 2nd page.) Clapp, Mr. Winsor, Mr. Hillyard, Mr. Jennings. The majority of these were for the encouragement of shipbuilding and received support on both sides of the House.

Mr. WELSH presented the report of the Committee appointed to draft the Address in Reply. On the motion for the adoption of this, several members spoke.

Mr. LLOYD congratulated the mover and seconder of the Address, and touched briefly on the appointment recently made to the Presidency of the Legislative Council and reported to have been made to the Supreme Court Bench.

He thought that the references in the Speech from the Throne to the war had sufficiently emphasized the continued seriousness of the war situation. The appeal for recruits had not been equally brought home to the people in all parts of the Colony; efforts should be made to make the people realize the needs of the situation.

He could understand the natural reluctance of parents to let their sons go to the war; but that must go. He heartily detested any employer who would put obstacles in the way of his employees going.

(Many members: Hear! Hear!) He was glad to hear that the Government hoped for a good financial condition at the end of the year. But the war would effect us seriously, and we must soon borrow again for war purposes.

The tonnage question was now a serious one all over the world. It was an outrage that shipowners, after selling at enormous profits to our ally, Russia, should have the impudence to ask the Government for subsidies to replace them.

He hoped that heavy taxation would be put where it would reach those profits. Another serious matter was the cutting of pit-props on the 3-mile limit; this should be stopped; it should also be the injustice practised by some buyers on men cutting pit-props.

He desired to know whether the Government intended to take steps to enforce prohibition; as the proposed proclamation would be useless if the petition before the Court succeeded.

MR. COAKER referred to the question of shipbuilding. We should endeavour to do away with the need for buying ships in Nova Scotia and the United States. He would consider that about 100 schooners a year were needed to keep up our fleet.

The last three years not 20 schooners had been built; the people would sooner buy second hand schooners abroad. If a good ship yard were established here, which would cost say \$30,000, and we had a protective duty on foreign built ships, we would save \$250,000 a year now spent outside. But it would not be done on the old system; machinery must be used as it is in Nova Scotia.

Let the Government guarantee 10 per cent dividend to any company that would go into shipbuilding, and we would soon have six shipyards in the country that would keep us fully supplied. The Government would be false to their trust, if they did not this year provide for the buying of a sea going tug, to prevent vessels from drifting to sea; in the meantime, with scientific research with the fisheries during his trip through Canada and the States, he was ashamed to have to tell people that we were not spending 20 cents here on scientific research.

He had found that in the Department of Fisheries at Ottawa, they knew more about our fisheries than he did himself. Our fisheries should and must be scientifically developed. He was astonished to see the volumes of research and information they had up there in relation to all fishery matters. He thought we should cut out either

the steel ships or the wooden ships from the seal fishery. Now that most of our steel ships were sold, would be the time to do it. Nothing could be said that was too strong about the action of local shipowners, who sold their ships at a total profit of \$600,000 and had the audacity to ask the Government for a subsidy to get tonnage to bring supplies here from elsewhere. Let the Minister of Finance put a tax of fifty per cent on those war profits. It would help the revenue, and serve the shipowner's right. He thought that prospects would not be so good for the rearmen next year. He thought that the Government ought to prohibit entirely the canning of lobsters. Prices were not worth while now. It would pay us to close down the fishery, so as to renew the supply. He congratulated the Government on the great improvement of the reported system in the House. He would be willing that they should spend \$1,000,000 a year to keep up this good system.

He hoped they would have the Opposition rooms improved; they were now unfit for use. Our herring fishery required strict laws strictly enforced. Our herring had a very bad name in New York because they were so badly packed. We must get up-to-date ideas and compel the people to follow them. He wished the Government would send five members of the House on their own side, and five from the Opposition through Canada to see their fishery methods up there. He considered that the cutting of pit-props in Newfoundland ought not to be allowed. Our timber would soon be very valuable to us, especially on the three mile limit. The pit-prop contractors were paying \$3.00 a cord, and making \$20.00. They were fleecing the people. He wished to know why an appointment was not made to the Judgeship of the District Court. He would have more to say on a number of matters later on.

Letter From The Front

Gibraltar, Jan 12th, 1916.

Dear Sister,—Just a few lines to let you know I am well, hoping you and mother are the same. Well, Annie, it is 21 days ago since we left England. We got in Gibraltar the 10th of January. I am on board a tugboat. We are bringing her to Malta, and then I am expecting to go back to Portsmouth again. If we do I will write to you again as soon as I get back.

I haven't any strange news worth telling you at present. While I was at Gibraltar I have seen some of our Naval boys which came across with me on the Calgarian. Two of them belong to Bay Roberts, Alex Mercer and Ted Russell, and Joe Barrett belonging to Bishop's Cove, and several other fellows.

I was very glad to meet them. I am the only Newfoundland on this ship. We are getting very hot weather over here. I suppose you are anxious to hear from me for it is so long that I wrote to you, but I know you will be glad when you get this letter. I am enjoying myself fine and enjoying good health.

I have been at Whale Island nearly all the time since I've been over here, and I am expecting to go there again after we bring our ship to Malta. I will tell you all the news the next time I write. The war is just as bad as ever, but we are expecting it to be over soon, and I am expecting to be with you all again by next Christmas. This is all the news for "this time". Don't forget to write and tell me all the news. Give my love to mother and all the friends around. I remain, your loving brother,



Halibut Steamer Missing

Mr. Russell Kearley, Secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union of the Pacific, in writing us recently, refers to the halibut steamer Onward Ho, which has been missing for two months. There are 24 fishermen on board, including three Newfoundlanders: William Snow of Coley's Point; James March of Trinity Bay, and Dan Brown of Bonavista Bay. The other members of the crew were Norwegians. It is thought the steamer is lost, as she was caught in a severe storm. A search was made by the owners and the Government for her, but no tidings of the vessel could be found. At the time of the storm the Onward Ho was loaded with fish.

William Snow is a son of the late William and Mary Snow, and left Coley's Point about 20 years ago for the Crow's Nest Pass. From there he went to B. C. He leaves a wife and 5 children, two sisters in Boston, Charlotte and Susie, a step brother, Albert, in the Navy. Mrs. Rachel Snow, of Coley's Point, is his step mother. His wife was formerly Susie Russell, a sister of the late Mrs. John Moore. The accident has cast a great gloom over all concerned in the fishing business.

Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint a Term or Session for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the time and place herein-after mentioned:

We do, therefore, by this Our Proclamation, declare to all Our loving subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that a Term or Session of Our said Supreme Court on Circuit shall be open and holden at HARBOUR GRACE, in Our said Island, on Tuesday, the Twenty-fifth day of April next, and continue thence until Friday, the Twenty-eighth day of April next, both days inclusive, and, if necessary, the preceding Judge of Our said Court shall have power to extend the time thereof for two days, or for such further period as may be necessary for the conclusion of any matter or cause then in course of trial.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Witness Our trusty and well beloved Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVINSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, at St. John's, in Our said Island, this 21st day of March, A. D. 1916, and in the Sixth year of Our reign.
