FOR THE FIGHT IN 'FRISCO Good Desires Checked-Boy Bandit, Who Got Life Sentence, Pleads for New Methods.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Jan. 14.—"Why don't some of these Christians who go down into their pockets to Christianize the heathen dig down for the young boys released from state institutions?"
"Most of us go to the reform school intending to turn over a new leaf."
"Most of us were born on the wrong side of the street."
These are a few of the statements of Robert McCormick, boy bandit, on the eve of his departure for state's prison, to serve a life sentence for killing Henry E, Minor, at Ypsilanti.
"We are kids when sent to the reform school," continued McCormick. "While we know the difference between right and wrong, still maybe it doesn't appeal to us as it does to the boy whose parents have been able to give him the care that's the right of every child born into this world. We saw the underside of life, and sin was not to be feared by us as by other kids. Most of the kids get into the reform school over some little offence."
"Now, a boy's got to be farther down than most of the boys that strike the reform school if he doesn't want to learn. But it doesn't take us long to realize that we are considered 'criminals,' though the worst charge against us may be that we are truants.

















N. B.'S RESEURCES; THEIR CONSERVATION AND IMPROVEMENT

Eloquent and Inspiring Address Delivered Before the Canadian Club by Chancellor Jones

Professor C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, spoke last evening before the Canadian Chib upon the resources of New Brunswick, their conservation and improvement, referring particularly to the U. N. II. as the type of educational institution, the encouragement of which the granteent Professor Jones referrance upon the badly planned railway system of the province, which the arrier opening of a provincial engineeritis school would have remedied, and gave advice as to the terms on which water power should be let to corporations. He upheld the Arts course as the best of all systems of education. He said that the set-back of the province through emigration was not as serious as it was pictured. After remarking upon the presence of too great political feeling, professor Jones put it that there were men in New Brunswick who would rather see the province go undeveloped than that any other party than their own should derive any honor from its advancement.

The university was very closely asso-

The university was very closely associated in its origin with that of the province. It had been scarcely one province. It had been scarcely one the establishment of the year after the establishment of the province that means had been taken to broyled a provincial institution of higher learning. Only a few years later—in 1800—the charter of the university had been granted; at first only of the rank of a high school. It had not been until 1829 that the college had attained anything like its present status. Up to 1869 only 100 men had been graduated, but their influence upon the life of the province had been very marked. The university represented no creed, class, or race, but the people of the province as a whole.

GREAT NATURAL ABILITY. man self-sufficient, but uneducated, was not the one who could be trusted for national or provincial guidance. A man too optimistic was not a sane man. He needed the broadness of outlook furnished by university education. The people of Canada did not realize the value of education. It was a The people of Canada did not realize the value of education. It was a shocking statement that Canada spent less for education than any civilized country. He felt that this was not true of N. B., but the province must awake to the danger. The one thing needed by all the institutions was

meeded by all the institutions was money.

The ideas of the Canadian Club of St John were more national than provincial, for they were working toward the time, sure to come, when the people of the Dominion would insist that all Canadian trade come through Canadian ports. For the big days of the future just such men as the universittes are turning out were needed. In this continent Canada had a record for immigration, to per cent, of the population being added each year by immigration. There must be men to mould this alien influx. The people who are coming were coming to fill up the vacant areas and to build our public works. They were not destined to be leaders. The leaders must be provided from the old Canadian stock, and the eastern provinces must bear a large share of the builden.

TWO MEN IN JAIL If the Minister of Justice entertains any intention of exercising clemency in the case of defaulters or other violators of the law now in prison, his attention should be given first of all, not to Joseph E. Phillips, former president of the defunct but still malodorous York Loan Company, but rather to Charles McGill, late general manager of the Ontario Bank. Some time ago an effert was made to have Phillips released on parole. This was not successful, and now a second attempt is being made. This prisoner was sentenced to five years and has served almost three years of his term. He was convicted of fraud and the evidence produced at his trial went to show that the schemes in which he was involved were deliberately arranged for the personal profit of the promoter. The fact that the York Loan investments, after careful management have since turned out better than was previously expected is in no way to the credit of the man who misapplied deposits entrusted to him by thousands all over Canada. Circumstances in the case of McGill were somewhat different. He was charged with falsifying the monthly returns of the Ontario ager of the Ontario Bank. Some time ago an effort was made to have Phil-Bank, These returns had to be subnitted under oath to the finance denent at Ottawa. When Mr. Mcill took charge of this Bank it was in a bad condition. He found it on the verge of failure, and in an earnest endeavor to bring it back to a sounder position he, who had formerly conducted his affairs on lines of the strict; thonesty, was induced to speculate. In the attempt to cover this irregular conduct he falsified the monthly reports. These offences extended over a considerable period of time. Mr. McGill was not solely to biame in this affair, for the directors of the bank, had they attended to their ord.nary duties, would have discovered what was going on long before the bank went to the wall. It is contended, too, that the finance department, if it had given proper attention to the returns, could readily have detected the incorrect figures given. SIX YEARS AMONG

THE ESQUIMAUX

Inspector Fitzgerald Tells of Funny Experiences

the North Pole.

There were six of us stationed on Herschel Island, 2,300 miles north of Edmonton," said he. "We were up there to look after the whalers, and see that the natives did not get liquor. But it was easy work, for the natives are about the quietest lot of people I ever had anything to do with. The policeman's word is law there. They wouldn't think of questioning it. Let me give an instance:

"A girl and boy marrried. The girls there marry at about 13 years, and the boys at 17. Well, these two married, and the girl's father gave the couple a whale boat for a wedding present. But the girl died. Then the husband died, too, and the question was, 'Who gets the boat?'

me. I advised them to come to some agreement, but they couldn't, so I took the case in hand. I concluded that, as the girl died first, the boat went to the husband. When he died, it went to his people, so I gave it to his father, who was in harder circumstances than the girl's father. They didn't have a word of objection to raise. You speak,' was all anyone said when I gave judgment."

CALL WOMEN "HIM."

"The same holds good in their mar-iages. Some man dies, and a young ingle fellow wants the widow. So he

"'Him want you?' I ask. They call women 'him' there.
"'Yes.'
"Then take her. And that is all there

"They never act like Indians. If an Indian goes out with you and you meet hard luck, he gets sulky. But that's not the way with an Esquimaux. "'All right, by-and-bye pienty grup. All right now,' is all he'll say."

"How do they stand the cold?" aske's the reporter.

"They dress in two suits of skins. The first suit they wear with the fur tuined inward; the other has the fur on the outside. When they go in their snow huts at night they light their stove lamps. In a couple of hours the hut is so warm that thew have to poke holes in the roof to let the heat out an' fresh air in. Then, when it is all nice and warm, they strip all their clothes off. The women clean and scrape the furs, and dry them, ready for next day. When they sleep they do not wear any clothing, but wrap themselves in the furs, just as they are. Warm? I guess it is. I've slept that way many a time, and it is far warmer than when we wear night-shirts. But perhaps it isn't cold in the morning, setting dressed," and the inspector shrugged his shoulders and laughed "However, if the furs were not cleaned and dried in this way every night, they would rot in no time.

THEY HOLLER FOR SOAP.

"I used to think the Esquimaux were the dirtiest people in the world," continued the inspector, "but I have changed my mind. Why, they are always after us with the plea for 'Soap! soap! soap! Me want wash clothes! They wash everything at least once a week. An Esquimaux is far cleaner than an Indian."

"I do not think that Esquimaux can stand the cold any more than a white man, but they understand how to dress. Their faces, too, seem admirably adapted for cold weather, for they have very small noses. They come to us and say: 'What for white man have big nose? Freeze quick.' They pay very little attention to the weather, and I have seen little children playing games out of doors with the temperature 40 degrees' below zero.

GREAT ON CARVING.

Speaking of the work done by the natives, the inspector told of finely-carved walrus tusks.

"They make cribbage boards for the white men that are wonderful specimens. They cut down one side of the tusk till it is quite flat, and then bore the necessary number of holes. The rest of the tusk is beautifully carved. I have one with a splendid carving of the harbor, with ships on the bay. On one side is a carving of boats in pursuit of a whale, and on the other the scene where the whale is killed. They rub lampblack into the carving, and it never washes out, One native was shown an American dollar. He looked closely at it, and then went to his hut and carved a wonderful reproduction of the spread-eagle. It was truly marvelous."

WHITE MEN SCARCE. Abuot 800 miles east of Herschel Island is a district known as Prince Albert's Land. The people here have never seen a white man. The only exception, so far as can be learned, is that of an old woman, who saw white men when she was a girl.

"These people have copper tools, which they have learned how to temper," said Inspector, Fitzgerald. "I have seen copper knives made by them which are as hard, nearly, as steel." This is an art which would be of wonderful value down nere."

"The natives are very honest. In all my experience I never knew one to tell a lie, or steal. Perhaps they will when they learn our ways more."

At this station there are only two mails a year, one in February, and one in July. For 45 days there is no sun visible, and papers arrive but once a year. It costs \$420 a ton to get provisions from Edmonton.

"I do hope there will be no gold discovered there, for if dozens did in the rush for the Youkon, hundreds would die on the way to Herschel," concluded Mr. Fitzgerald.

Forty men are wanted for the force, and the inspector will be in the city till the 20th of the present month, to explain the situation to applicants.

"If I had my time over again, I should certainly join the force," ne declared.



chewer students after several years of operation.

Chancellor Jones suggested that the provincial grant be increased by \$5,000 or \$6,000. Contributions from graduates and other friends formed another possible source of income.

Dr. Thomas Walker, also speaking to the toast on behalf of the Senate, spoke in a reminiscent strain, telling of the earlier history of the college, when the students were much fewer in number than now. Speaking of the present day status of the university, he referred in warmest terms to the ability of the professors, and deprecated the fact that the equipment was not larger than it is. He advocated the addition of a department of agriculture to the university, which, he said, would prove one of the most popular departments with the country at large.

Superintendent Carter, the toastmaster, spoke briefly, taking as his subject the Alumni Society, which, he said, consisted of 300 members. It has an income of only \$300, which is devoted to prizes, etc. In spite of the smallness of the income the society has given fairly large sums to various worthy objects in connection with the university, and at present supports three scholarships of an annual value of \$50.00.

Premier Hazen was then called upon

Premier Hazen was then called upon to speak on "The university as the head of the educational system of the province." Tracing the history of the university, he showed that it had been established soon after the province was founded, and when the public school system was organized the present university was found to be the keystone of the system.

Referring to its close connection with dound to be the keystone of the system. Referring to its close connection with the public schools, he said that of the 800 graduates at least one-third had at one time or another engaged in teaching. At present fourteen of the High School principles and the Superintendent of Education are graduates of the

Interestry.

The speaker heartily agreed with the statement that more funds were needed for the university. He sincerely hoped that if it proved to be possible out of increased revenue, which could come only from the Crown'lands, a larger amount for the university would be placed in the estimates. It would give him a great deal of pleasure to be able to assist in doing so. (Applause.). Surveyor General Grimmer, who followed, urged the graduates to keep in closer touch with the University and give more hearty support to the cause of higher education. He fully approved what had been said in favor of



Heads of Fire and Police Departments Both Receive Increases as do Also the Policemen, the Mayor's Clerk and Others

The Common Council met yesterday attamoon at 1 p.m. and adjourned at 630 after passing the estimates of the Safety Board in an amended form, and after adjoining the recommendation of the Treasury Board with regard to additional grants. The Council adjourned intil 8.15 on the motion of Ald, Barter.

In connection with the Safety Board's report the council decided to increase the salaries of both the Chief of the Fire Department \$100 per annum. The increase in pay of 25 cents, per day was given the policemen. The action recommending an increase to police janitors was referred to by the Board of Public Safety. The section dealing with additional street lights was amended so as to provide for sixteen additional lights this year and no increase in the number for two years. The positions of the new lights was amended by the Board of Public Safety.

There was much discussion concerning the bill of Mr. Barbour, but it was laid over for further consideration.




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
