New Five Cent Rate-Known as TWO NUMBER METHOD

Beginning July 1st, calls can be given by either of two methods, namely: Two Number - Where a subscriber is willing to talk to any person at the telephone called.

Long Distance—Where a particular person is wanted.

Two Number Method. The subscriber calls the operator in the usual manner. The operator will answer, saying "Number." The subscriber will then give the operator the desired number, followed by his own number, as "Rothesay, 20," "this is Main 3014-21." The calling subscriber will hold the receiver to his ear until connected with the called telephone, or is advised "Line Busy" or "They Don't Answer." If the called telephone answers it constitutes a message. A particular person will not be procured. The Initial Rate for this Service will be 5 cents for three minutes and 1

cent for each additional minute. Messages Cannot be Reversed, but must be charged to the Telephone from which they originate.

Important. As the operator cannot tell the telephone number of the person calling, it is necessary that the subscriber, on either a special or party line, should give his own number as well as the number desired. A call from a subscriber in St. John at Main 3914, wishing to get Rothesay, 28, should be given as follows: - "Rothesay, 28, this is Main 3914."

Long Distance Method. If a particular person is desired the call should be placed with the Long Distance Operator in the regular way. The initial rate for this service will be 10c for three minutes and 3c for each additional minute.

THE DIFFICULTIES

IN RAISING FOXES

Hon. Mr. Dalton gives his views and tells of his early experiences.

Hon. Mr. Dalton on being asked what were the greatest difficulties which he had to contend with in the pioneer days replied:

"When I first started I kept the animals in ordinary board sheds, connected by shutes. They used to lose their litters, owing to the disturbances usually associated with a barn-yard. The first year we kept them in a wire enclosure, we had no overhang and two foxes climbed out. At first we had only one strip of wire between each pen. The foxes used to get their legs through and kill each other. We stopped this by doubling the partitions At first we kept two females in one pen. This resulted in jealousy and when the two had young in the same pen, they destroyed each other's litters. Them we had trouble with the water getting in their nests and causing death to the pups."

"Had you any diseases to contend with?"

"Nothing but what was common to beasts and liable to effect other animals as well. The fox is a hardy creature. He enjoys being out in the snow and it takes a temperature of from fifteen to twenty degrees below zero to drive him into his nest."
