Quebec, Feb. 21.—Fellow citizens and cabinet colleagues tendered Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Marine, a banquet at the Chateau Frontenac here, tonight. The speakers beside the guest of the evening, were Federal Prime Minister, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Hon. Jacques Bureau, Minister of Customs and Excise; Hon. Dr. Beland, Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, and Premier Deschamps, of Quebec, for they were affirm their resolve to take up the work of Government in Canada where Laurier left it in 1911, forgetting the differences and divisions and remembering only the heroisms and the sacrifices of the intervening period, to strive in the spirit of his example, with unity towards none and goodwill towards all to restore the days of a prosperous, contented and united Canada. In Mr. Lapointe, Quebec had had a worthy successor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. If they accepted a policy of peace and reconciliation, they were obligated as completely as in the Province of Quebec. This should silence forever the insinuation that with Quebec the motive was one of revenge. If revenue was a must, the motive of Quebec, to all must be the actuating motive in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. It was not revenue, it was the restoration of political rights that was sought at the polls. If political contests ever afforded an example of a nation, by constitutional means, diverting itself of a yoke, unconsciously as a committee of unconstituted rulers, it was the result as recorded on that day.

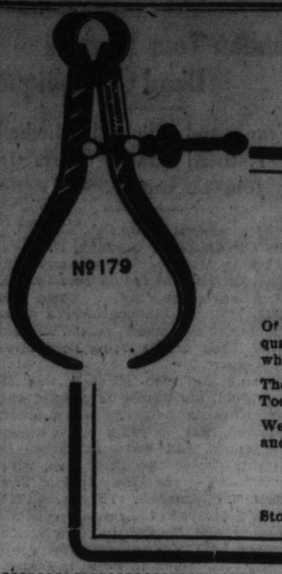

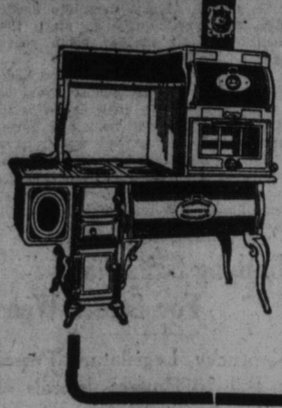
