### MINUTES.

THE twenty-ninth annual session of the Free Baptist Conference of Nova Scotia, after due notice, was held at the Kemptville Free Baptist Church, beginning September 13th, 1894, at 10 A. M. The Conference was opened by singing the hymn, "Nearer, My God, to Thee," reading the 27th Psalm, and prayer by Rev. C. F. Cooper; the assistant moderator, Rev. D. T. Porter presiding.

The Conference having been declared open and ready for business, the programme committee presented their printed report. Moved and seconded to amend by changing the hour of F. B. Y. P. Union to 3.30 P. M., Friday; carried. The amended report was adopted.

WHEREAS, The financial strength of the Beaver River Church has been greatly weakened by the removal of a number of their prominent members by death and through unhappy dissensions, and whereas the faithful few that remain are unduly burdened and discouraged by the debt that remains on their church; therefore,

RESOLVED. That the conference will assume the payment of two hundred and forty dollars on the condition that the church pay the balance of the debt on said house early this autumn.

RESOLVED, That in the opinion of this conference, the time has come for the Free Baptists of Cedar Lake to assert their legal right to control their meeting house.

After votes of thanks to the people of Chegoggin for their hospitality, and to the Moderator for his services the conference adjourned.

The corresponding secretary, Rev. D. T. Porter, read the following report of the year's operations :---

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT OF THE FREE BAFTIST CHURCHES FOR NOVA SCOTIA, SEPTEMBER, 1894.

As it has been my duty for some time to note the development of our denomination from year to year, I am glad to state that I still have reason to believe that the conditions necessary to success in spiritual things have been found in our people, and that the blessing of God has been upon our labors. The vineyard that we cultivate has been made to yield fruit, it is hoped that continued labor will make it more productive.

It is desirable to have clerks of churches forward letters with their reports. Several have done this, and it is hoped that all will do so in the future, as it greatly helps the secretary in preparing a correct statement of those matters that are of greatest interest to our people.

 $\not$  I will now report as fully as possible concerning the different pastorates of which our denomination in this province is composed.

PASTORATE No. 1, including First Barrington and Port La Tour Churches with their branches Oak Park and Villagedale : The pastor, Rev. Joseph K. West in an article published recently in the Religious Intelligencer, stated that he had reason for profound gratitude to God as he looks upon the days which have passed since he began his labors in this parish, and for the evidences of divine favor that have been manifested. The regular preaching services are well attended and the prayer meetings well sustained, the young people taking an active part. In June a special conference was held in the day time to enable the aged members and those that live at a distance to come together. It was a meeting of great interest, being so helpful that it was decided to make the next June conference à special annual church re-union. Since the first of September twenty-seven have united with the First Barrington church, twenty-five of this number by baptism and two by letter. The Sabbath school of which Bro. W. B. Hopkins is superintendent, and the Y. P. S. C. E. connected with this church, are in a prosperous condition. Two members have been dismissed from this church and four have been called away

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by death. The clerk of the Port La Tour church, Bro. Thomas D. Smith, informs me that although the spiritual condition of the church is not so good as desired, yet the préaching service, prayer and conference meetings are very well attended. Théy have also reason for encouragement in the fact that seven have been baptised and àdded to the church membership. During the past year two members have died, one of whom was Deacon William Snow, a man well known in our denomination, a long and faithful worker in the church and Sabbath school. The Sabbath school of which Joseph A. Smith is superintendent has a membership ôf seventy and a library of one hundred and twenty volumes. The Sabbath school at loval Park is in an excellent condition. Deacon N. N. Adams is superintendent.

PASTORATE No. 2, including Centreville and Clark's Harbor churches and preaching stations at Newellton, South Side and Stony Island : On the Island of Cape Sable the Free Baptists have a large and important interest. The seed sown so many years ago took root and springing up became a great tree and spread its branches over the land. It is true that for several years past circumstances have not been favorable for the development of our cause, but we believe that the prospect for the future is brighter. Rev. Benjamin P. Parker is pastor of the Centreville and South Side churches, the interests at Stony Island and Newellton aré under his care. The Lord has blessed our brother in his labors. Six have been added by baptism to Centreville church and three by letter. Two have been dismissed and three have died. In connection with the churches there are three Sabbath schools, one at Centreville, one at Stony Island and one at Newellton. Mrs. Williams is superintendent of Centreville and Stony Island schools and Mrs. Harvey Newell of Newellton school. There are two Y. P. S. C. E. Societies in connection with this church. A Sabbath school with a membership of sixty is connected with South Side church, also a Young People's Society with forty-five members. Two hundred dollars have been raised for building improvements. The state of religious interest and Christian fellowship in the churches and in the Young People's Societies is reported good. A'good amount has heen raised for the support of the gospel in this pastorate. The Centréville church has lost three members and the South Side church one member by death.

To Clark's Harbor whurch five have been added by baptism and one by letter. Seven have died. Bro. Millar visited this church frequently during the winter. Bros. Freeman, Smith, and Joseph West have also supplied. Bro. Weston visited this people the first of April, but after having been there a few days unfortunately broke his leg and had to return as soon as expedient to his home. Bro. Currie supplied this church five months with good acceptance. This church has the largest membership of any in our denomination, and it is hoped that all which has been of late unfavorable to its success may be done away. This church has a large Sabbath school. The membership last year was two hundred.

PASTORATE No. 3, including Second Barrington, Bear Point, Shag Harbor, and Wood's Harbor churches: The interest at Barrington Centre is about the same as last year, except that there is an increasing interest in the prayer meetings. Several of the unconverted have manifested an interest, but having to go away from home were unable to be further benefited by pastoral or church help. Brother Thomas Nickerson is superintendent of the Sabbath school which has a membership of thirty.

The state of religious interest in the Shag Harbor church is good, especially among the young. A well equipped Sabbath school is conducted by the superintendent, Judah Crowell. There are two Young People's Societies connected with the Frée Baptist and Methodist churches. The number of members in the Christian Endeavor Society is seventy-five, the Zephyr Band has à membership of one hundred and seventeen. Thé state of religious interest in these societies is very encouraging. Money has been raised for temperance literature, and pledgé cards. One has been added to the Shag Harbor church by baptism. One member has died. In Wood's Harbor church there is very good religious interest. The membership is one hundred and twenty-seven, of which one hundred are resident members. The Sabbath school, of which Bro. Benjamin Knowles is superintendent has a membership of forty. A Society of Christian Endeavor of forty-twô members is connected with this church. It has only been organized a few months, but it is gaining in interest and numbers, and it is expected it will be a blessing to the church. This church has to record the death of one of its members. The interest at Bear Point is better than it has been for some time. A Young People's Society has been organized and is doing excéllent work. The Sabbath School has a membership of forty-five and an increasing interest. Rev. Wm. Millar is pastor of these churches.

PASTORATE No. 4, including First and Second Argyle churches: No report has been received from the First Argyle church. Only two other churches of our denomination have a larger membership. The number of scholars in the Sabbath schoel last year was seventy-five. Rev. J. L. Smith, who was pastor of these churches for several years has returned to the States and is now located in Vermont.

The total membership of Second Argyle church is two hundred

The Sabbath school numbers one hundred and fifteen scholars. Bro. Morris Forbes is superintendent. The Third Argyle church has a membership of forty-three. One member has died. There are forty-five scholars in in the Sabbath school. The library consists of seventy-five volumes. The Argyle circuit is one of our most important fields and it is hoped a pastor will scon be secured. A parsonage is peeded and it is probable that steps will be taken either to build a house or purchase a suitable property.

PASTORATE No. 5, including Riverdale, Plymouth, Little River, Brooklyn and Tusket churches: The pastor of these churches, Rev. J. W. Freeman informs me that at Riverdale there is nothing special to report. At Little River the interest is good. There has been one dismissed and one has died. The Sabbath school connected with this church has a membership of thirty-five. Special meetings were held by Bro. Freeman at Plymouth last winter, the church was revived and twelve were àdded to its membership by baptism. Two members have died during the past year. Bro. Robert A. Sims is superintendent of the Sabbath school which has a membérship of forty. There is a Young People's Society with a membership of thirty. Its religious interest is good.

Tasket church reports a good state of religious interest. The conference meetings are sustained and the state of Christian fellowship is good. There are forty scholars in the Sabbath school. Bro. J. F. Crosby is superintendent. The state of religious interest at Brooklyn is about the same às last year. The Sabbath school, of which Bro. P. T. Pitman is superintendent, is well sustained. It has forty scholars, a good average attendance, and one of the largest libraries in the denomination.

PASTORATE No. 6, including Yarmouth, Chebogue, and Session Hill churches: Yarmouth church has a resident membership of one hundred. The total membership is one hundred and twenty-one. Rev. C. F. Cooper is pastor. This church has preaching services twice each Sabbath. Four have been added by letter, one has been dismissed, and one has died dùring the past year. The state of religious intérest and Christian fellowship is good. The Young People's Society has raised fifteen dollars for foreign missions. It is encouraging to knöw that this church, situated in the largest town in this section of the province is being prospered.

Rev. A. W. Currie is pastor of the Chebogue church. The prayer and conference meetings are well sustained. During the past year one member has been dismissed and one has died. A good state of religious interest and Christian fellowship prevails. The union Sabbath school numbers one hundred scholars. Bro. James W. Killam is superintendent. There are one hundred books in the library. The Young People's Society connected with this church is doing good. It has thirty-five members.

Bro. Currie is also pastor of Session Hill church. The special conference of last June met with this church. The latter of the clerk accompanying the annual report is very encouraging. There has been steady growth in the different departments of Christian work and the presence of the Holy Spirit manifested in all the services. The pastor has striven to maintain a revival spirit and has been blessed in his efforts. A Young People's Missionary Society of thirtyone members has been organized and has raised twenty-two dollars for foreign missions. It has been a great benefit to the church. The outside of the meeting-house has been repaired and painted and the inside entirely remodelled. When the work is completed the church will have an attractive and convenient place of worship. The Sabbath school has forty-five scholars and a library of one hundred and sixty volumes. Bro. De Tully Wyman is superintendent.

PASTORATE No. 7, including Beaver River and Sandford churches and their branches, Cedar Lake and Short Beach. Rev. W. M. Knollin supplied Beaver River church from November until the end of February. He found them much discouraged. At the June session of conference aid was promised them toward paying the debt on their church. Bro. Knollin's labors were very helpful. Bro. Stanley Durkee began his labors with the church in March, and returned to Lewiston about four weeks ago to attend college. Six have been added by baptism and two by letter. Four of those baptised and one admitted by letter were of Cedar Lake, which is a branch of this church. During the past few years there has been much that has been unfavorable to the development of our cause here. It is hoped that these difficulties will in time be removed. Bros. Zephaniah and Ainshie Porter, members of this church have passed away. There are two Sabbath schools connected with this church having à total membership of one hundred and thirty. Brother Knollin preaches at Sandford once every Sabbath. There is a fair religious interest and a good state of Christian fellowshlp. There are twenty scholars in the Sabbath school, of which Bro. William Earl is superintendent.

PASTOKATE No. 8, including Kemptville and Carleton churches and their branches, Rockingham and Forest Glen. Rév. G. M. Wil. son is pastor of these churches. Kemptville church, now entertaining the general conference is one of the oldest churches of the denomination. W total me resident ded by bers hav seven. People's good. N purchasi

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churches M. Wil. ertaining enomination. We pray that it may be blessed by our gathering heré. Its total membership is one hundred and seventy-five. The number of resident members is one bundred and seventy-five. The number of ded by baptism and one by letter during the past year. Two members have died. The Sabbath school has a membership of eightyseven. Brother Maurice Prosser is superintendent. The Young People's Society has thirty members. Its state of religious interest is good. Nineteen dollars has been raised by this society to go towards purchasing a bell for the church.

Brother Wilson preaches at Carleton twice each month. Four have been added to this church by baptism. The state of Christian fellowship is not as good as desired, Brother Jamés Durkee is superintendent of the Sabbath school. Brother William Brittain is superintendent of the Forest Glen school, which last year was reported to have four teachers and twenty-five scholars.

PASTORATE No. 9, including the churches in Queens Co.: Rev. F. G. Francis is pastor of Caledonia church. This church has a membérship of eighty, and a wéll-organized Sabbath school of sixty scholars. Brother Géorge Middlemas is superintendent. The deep interest which this church has always taken in foreign missions is not declining. One hundred and twenty-five dollars has been raised during the past year for this work. Sister Wiles' going forth to India is an evidence of divine blessing upon this people for their labors in this good cause. Brother Francis also preaches at several churches near to Caledonia. We are sorry to lean that owing to ill health, Brother Francis will have to retire for a time from his ministerial labors. The prayer and conference meetings of this church have been regulariy held.

Rev. T. H. Siddall is pastor of Port Medway church. The clerk of Port Medway church reports that under the labors of Brother Siddall the cause is making favorable progress. Just previous to bis engagement he baptised and took into the church six members. BroFrancis shortly afterward baptised and took into the church one more. Two members have died. There is a good state of religious interest and Christian fellowship. There are fifty scholars in the Sabbath school. Brother S. T. Foster is superintendent. Thére is also a Young People's Society. The interior of the meeting-house has been much improved, and was opened for service on Sunday, Aug. 26th. Outside friends aided in the work. The prospect for the future is encouraging. Brother Siddall preaches at East Port Medway church twice each month. The state of religions interest is reported to be good. One member has died. There are forty-five members in the Sabbath school, of which Bro. D. Vaughan is superintendent.

Port Mouton Church. Rev. James W. Smith is pastor of the Port Mouton church. A communication from the clerk of this church to the conference states that there have been few changes outside of the ordinary routine and progress common to most of the churches. They have reason to believe that they have been cared for and blessed of God. One has been added by baptism. Four have been removed by death. The church feels their loss. The Y. P. S. C. E. and other societies have been helpful to the work of the church. A tower is now being built on the meeting housé which will improve its appearance and make it more convenient. The Sabbath school has a membership of fifty-six. Deacon Thomas Wagner, who was recently ordained, is superintendent. The Sabbath school in Port Mouton Island, where Brother Smith preaches occasionally, has four teachers and fourteen scholars.

PASTORATE No. 10, including the churches of Kings Co: Rev. Edwin Crowell is pastor. The condition of these churches has for several years been improving both spiritually and financially. Bro. Crowell preaches at Canning four times a month. The Sabbath school is in a prosperous condition. Bro. David Lockhart is superintendent. The whole number of members is seventy-five. Eight members have been dismissed from this church and two have been taken away by death. The prayer and conference meetings are well sustained. The state of religious interest and christian fellowship is good.

The church at Hall's Harbor has a total membership of one hundred and thirty-six and a resident membership of eighty eight. There has been a good religious interest in this church throughout the year. Six have been added by baptism. One member has died. There is a anion Sabbath school at East Hall's Harbor of which Deacon Z. West is superintendent. At the present time there is quite a revival in this church. Brother Crowell preaches at Black Rock twice in six weeks. The conference meetings are sustained. One has been added by baptism and one member has died. The state of religious interest and Christian fellowship is good. Bro. George Pinco is superintendent of the Sabbath school, which has thirty scholars. This school is in possession of a good library.

PASTORATE No. 11, including the chirches of Cumberland Co.: The pastor of these churches, Rev. D. T. Porter, was laid aside by illness from his duties during a greater part of the winter. Several formerly connected with this church have moved away. The debit in the Advocate church is quite burdensome, and a letter in respect to this matter has been addressed to this conference. Harmony prevails among the members. The interest is about the same as last year. The new meeting house at Port Greville was dedicated on Sunday, Angust 19th. There was a large atténdance and great interest in the meeting. This church will be free of debt in a few months. The members have labored faithfully to complète it. A Sabbath school of thirty scholars has been organized and is increasing in membership. Brother Joseph Ayr is superintendent. The membership of Apple River church is scattered, several of them live at Sand River, where the pastor preaches once a month. It is probable that a monthly conference will soon be established at Apple River, so that the members, all of whom are loyal to the church, may be brought together from time to time.

PASTORATE No. 12, Halifax church: The property at Halifax has been sold to parties for \$1700. Part of this is to be paid by instalments. There has as yet been no transfer of the property. The organ has not yet been disposed of.

PASTORATE No. 13, including the churches of Upper and Lower Pubnico: Rev. Wm. Millar of Shag Harbor is pastor of these churches, preaching twice every month in each place. The prayer and conference meetings are sustained. The condition of the churches spiritually, is very favorable. A good state of Christian fellowship is also reported. In addition to the Sabbath school at Pubnico Head there is one at Argyle Sound. Alma Harding is superintendent of the former, and Miss McNair of the latter school. The membership of the school at Pubnico Head is eighty, at Argyle Sound one hundred and twenty. At Pubnico Head there is also a Young People's Society with a very good réligious interest. A new Free Baptist meeting house is being built at Argyle Sound, the outside is completed and the insidé plastered. It will probably be dedicated next year. No debt has thus far been incurred. Two have been added to the Lower Pubnico church by baptism and one has died. The Sabbath school has eighty-five scholars and a library of one hundred volumes. Thirty-nine dollars have been raised for Sabbath school purposes.

I have received a report this year from our church at Cape Negro Island. These people deserve credit for their loyalty. The total membership is ten, two of this number are non-resident. One member has died. Twenty-three dollars have been raised for the support of the gospel. The Sabbath echool, of which Bro. James R. King is superintendent, consists of six teachers and twenty scholars. The school has a library of seventy-five volumes. It is hoped that one of our ministers may be able to visit them occasionally during the next year.

I have thus given you as full a report as the information at hand will allow. In reviewing the work of the past year we feel that we have reason for gratitude to God and encouragement for greater faithfulness is the future.

It is observed that a large proportion of the accessions to our church membership is from the ranks of the Sabbath school. This should inspire us to labor more hopefully and zealously in this department of Christian work. It is also noticed that the Young People's Societies, wherever they exist, are noble auxiliaries to the churches; is is hoped that more will be organized during the coming year.

The ranks of our ministry have been unbroken by death, and fewer of our membership have died than in some of the preceding years. For this we have reason to be thankful.

Concerning our older brethren in the ministry, Bro. Weston is not sufficiently recovered from his accident to attend this conference. He is deeply interested in our welfare and regrets his inability to be present.

Bro. West is still able to attend our gathering, and en account of his long experience renders valuable assistance in the transaction of business.

Bro, Knollin has the pastoral care of one of our churches. We are pleased to know that he is enjoying better health than formerly, and trust that he may long be spared to labor with us.

We are glad to welcome our visiting ministers, some of whom were born and reared among us.

Let us all pray that the coming year may be one of bounteous blessings and increased prosperity.

A delegate was appointed, Rev. Mr. Turner, with Bro. J. R. Blauvelt as substitute.

This report was laid on the table, and the moderator invited the corresponding delegates from other bodies to address the conference.

Rev. B. Nobles of the F. C. B. Conference said that he was now able to understand why their ministers coveted the delegation to Nova Scotia; and dwelt upon the reasons for fraternal relations in the common faith which embodied the most biblical and best features of all the creeds. It had been a good year in New Brunswick F. B. churches, for they had been blessed with six hundred additions, and the secret of it was a real spirituality among them.

Mrs. Boyer and Miss Gaunce were carrying on their sacrificing work in India. Home mission work is developing and the weaker churches receive more care than formerly. S. Schools are well appreciated, and the F. C. Baptists are in the very van of temperance reform. In asking continuance of delegation, he hoped that the time would soon come when we would not visit as delegates but in oneness of organization.

Rev. Hibbert Lockhart of the Mass. F. B. Association was glad to visit his friends and kindred in Nova Scotia again. While there were but seventeen churches in their Association, yet they were active and extending their influence, cordially greeting the Nova Scotians who supply much good material for the laity and clergy in their churches. The Boston church has sold its building and has moved to Roxbury. This year 180 were added to these churches. Approving reference was made to the Nova Scotia F. B. roll-call as showing the official strength of the churches and their interest in the cause. He regretted that Bro. Freeman failed to reach their meeting, but they should look for a delegate at their next annual meeting.

After singing, Rev. H. C. Lowden, of the Maine F. B. Association spoke of the spiritual nature of his present mission. He brought greetings from a people who loved the Nova Scotian Free Baptists. He was affected by the thought that his brother George who had had a great influence upon his life, had once preached the gospel in Kemptville.

The Maine Association was probably the largest Free Baptist yearly meeting. It has 251 churches, and has within its borders the grand denominational institutions of learning. Last year \$93,000 were raised for all purposes. Seven hundred additions were made to membership last year. There are seventy-four Young People's Societies and 12,370 Sunday school pupils. Their conference board appoints days for common observance in missionary education and collections, and they take an active part in the State scheme for interdenominational comity. These brethren all requested a continuance of the correspondence.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That we have heard with great interest the addresses of the delegates from Massachusetts, Maine and New Brunswick; and recognize the blessings of the one Lord upon us all who are of one faith, and we invoke upon them and upon the bodies they represent, the one baptism of the Holy Ghost for the furtherance of the Gospel.

Dr. McLeod had recently had a dream of closer union for the Maritime Free Baptists and urged a completer' consecration to the holy work we are engaged in.

Rev. Gideon Swim tapped the reminiscence vein with sympathetic reference to the work of his father and other revered toilers in the Nova Scotia Free Baptist churches.

Rev. J. H. Erb, concluded with a delightfully humorous address. This reporting meeting was surely one of the brainiest and heartiest we have ever had.

RESOLVED, (1) To take the report of the nominating committee from the table; (2) to adopt the section containing the list of officers of the Education Society; (3) that the report lie on the table.

The meeting closed with prayer.

Conference met at 9.30 A. M., Sept. 14th. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

The Prudential committee submitted the correspondence which had come before them.

On the report of the Prudential committee, the letter from Advocate church was read and referred to a committee of three, viz., E. Crowell, Byron Sims and Ezekiel Ring. Letters explaining non-attendance of Brothers J.L. Smith, T. H. Siddall, E. S. Parker and A. G. Jones, were read and excuses allowed.

A letter from Rev. J. L. Smith was read and his request for dismission to the Vermont yearly meeting was granted. The letters from Port Medway, Port Mouton, Session Hill, and Port Latour churches were received. It was resolved to publish in the minutes a clause contained in the report of the mediating committee in the matter of the Plymouth church complaint last year, and to give the names of the committee with suitable explanations.

NOTE .- At the session of 1893, a letter was received from the Plymouth Free Baptist church, asking help in settling a difficulty between Deacons R. A. Sims of Plymouth church and Charles Weston of Chebogue church on the ground that charges had been made by Deacon Weston affecting the character of Deacon Sims, but that the Chebogue church had not heeded their application to investigate the matter. The conference in committee of the whole, appointed Brethren Albert Cook, Nelson Corning, and Albert Gayton to meet brethren representing each of the churches named, in committee; and these were: for Plymouth church, Norman Jeffery; and for Chebogue church, Edward McConnell. Their report says : "As to the charges made, calculated to affect the character of Bro. Sims, the committee distinctly arrived at the conclusion that they were without foundation and were made when feeling was excited and wrought upon."

A report from the committee, re Bear Point church, was read and accepted. Rev. W. Millar said the F. B. church there had secured the title to three-fourths of the meeting house. As the committee on the application from Advocate church could devise no satisfactory proposal for helping them to reduce their debt, it was resolved that Mrs. J. E. Cushing and Rev. Jos. K. West circulate a paper for subscriptions to the Advocate church fund, during the session.

Rev. Mr. Turner spoke of the check given to the Union proposals by the failure of the Nova Scotia delegates to meet in joint committee in November, 1892, but was satisfied with the explanations given, and trusted that, by mutual delegations, the union would yet be attained.

RESOLVED, That the pastors of churches be requested to use their first appointments at our various churches in November, to present the claims of the Home Mission Society, and take collections for it. Adjournment.

Conference met Saturday, Sept. 15th, 10 A. M<sub> $\phi$ </sub> Minutes of former meeting read and approved. The financial report of the Home Mission Society was read and adopted. (See appendix).

RESOLVED, To go into committee of the whole at 11.15 A. M., on licentiates.

RESOLVED, That we heartily recognize the enterprise of the proprietors of the Religious Intelligencer and the Morning Star, and cordially invite them to push their publications amongst our people, making especial mention of the value of the Intelligencer for its denominational news and of the Star office for its S. S. lesson papers and books.

RESOLVED, That the S. S. Convention hold its annual session this evening, after Rev. B. P. Parker's home mission address.

The time arriving, conference went into committee of the whole, and on rising reported that that they recommended the conference to give Bro. Joseph Wilson, of Yarmouth church, a license to preach. The report was adopted.

The committee on the state of the denomination then read their report, viz.:--

A survey of our field in the light of the facts available in the reports of our officers, and at large will serve to show :

(a) That pastoral care has been enjoyed by almost all our churches during a great part of the last year, reaching perhaps the 'high water mark in our experience in this respect.

(b) In consequence of these faithful labors under God's blessing there has been a decided gain in membership even though the era of migration to the West is not yet ended.

. (c) Thê acknowledged "hard times" have made a noticeable mark upon our financial operations, so that the contributions to the benevolent societies have fallen off somewhat, and churches carrying debt have felt their burdens héavy. On the other hand obsering accounts reach us of new houses of worship without debt, and parsonages building for a living cause.

(d) Our young people have entered into the mighty movement of the Christian world for their sympathetic organization under the wing and for the good of the church; and already they cover almost one-half our ground.

(e) Loyalty, fellowship, spirituality in our pastors, and the sense of a definité mission, are as corner stones to any denomination, and we believe that we stand firmly upon them.

(f) The prospect of a closer union with those of common faith is brighter, while at present no illusive and impracticable proposals are driving the wedge of division into our ranks.

(g) Some events of the year have reminded us of the importance of keeping up the organization of our body. This demands, if we are true to our polity, that every man should be present at the annual business m carefully churches s the date of from times (h) Th that the off cided and settled as

5. That we thank the moderator and clerk, corresponding secretary and treasurer for their efficient services.

6. That there be 1,500 copies of the minutes published by the the clerk.

7. That an adjourned session of conférence be held in Canning

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beginning the morning of the second Friday in June next, and that the next yearly meeting be held in Port La Toùr, Shelburne Co.

Rev. C. F. Each church shall have one delegate for every fifty resident members, or a major fractional part thereof; but any church shall have one delegate, though its membership be not fifty.

Rev. D. T. Porter said that \$16.50 had been collected by the committee for the Advocate church and asked that \$50 be appropriated also from home mission and conference funds.

RESOLVED, That we recommend the H. M. Board to give \$35 to the Advocate church, and that this conference give \$15 also.

Rev. J. K. West spoke of the spiritual benefit received by the Barrington church in the three days meetings of last November, and it was moved and seconded that we recommend our churches to units in that line of work whenever possible. Passed,

The report on Temperance was read by Rev. Edwin Crowell, as follows:

We commend the statement in our annual sermon of Free Baptist attitude toward total abstinence and prohibition, to which we as a people are fully committed. The past year has been marked by an appeal to the people, in several provinces of Canada, including Nova Scotia, to register their wishes for or against prohibition. No communities, we believe, were more favorable to prohibitory legislation than these in which our churches were ; and this year the agitation of this question has been on as large and thorough a plan as ever before in our history. As a result the liquor interest has felt the need of eloser organization, and the larger agency of the press for its defence ; for which intimation of the coming vietory of our cause we should thank Got and take courage.

We would notice a new danger to temperancé in the increase of tourists and other visitors amongst us and the corresponding temptation to introduce hotel bars for their convenience and the seller's gain. Against this évil, too frequently connived at by non-drinking citizens. for an apparent benefit to trade, we heartily protest; and especially would we warn our people to use every effort to prevent the foreign element, now spreading along our shores in connection with railway operations, from obtaining access to intoxicants. These newcomers may be expected to reinforce a party which has already been beaten in the greater part of our constituency. We would recommend the general introduction of the temperance plédge into all Sunday schools, and that pastors and superintendents of all pastorless Sunday schools, should, before next yearly session address letters to the corresponding secretary respecting the actual and comparative state of témperance and prohibitory sentiment in their respective fields of work, for the information of this conference.

From the difficulty experienced in enforcing the Scott Act in some towns owing to local apathy or selfish interest, we urge continued efforts to obtain a better enforcement of our laws, especially by securing Provincial or Dominion officers whose conduct shall be less amenable to the local public opinion. And that the fruit of temperance, against which there is no law, may abound in all our fair land we pray the Holy Spirt to bless our endeavor. Enward CROWELL,

Two of the members who have passed away were well known in our denomination.
