MACHINE OIL A Husband Shoots His Wife and then PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.

> Brown Parker, of No. 425 Kingsessing dead in his honse, slain by his own hand. All the particulars known thus, far are as follows :- Yesterday Mr. and Mrs. Parker after dinner, stepped into their phase ton at the door and went out for a ride as was their custom of an afternoon They were gone until about five o'clock, when they returned home, and an hour or so after took tea. They retired for the night at an early hour, and this was the last seen of them by the servants that night. Mr. Parker occupied the front room on the first floor, while Mrs. Parker slept in a chamber in the rear, a small crib near her bed being used by their three-year old boy, the only child. The female servants, some three or four in number, occupied the rear room on the second floor inmediately back of Mrs. Parker's apartments, and the remaining attache at the house was a coachman, who slept over the stable in the rear. From what could be learned it was a considerable time after they had retired that Mr. Parker, after securing a Sharp's four-barrelled revolver, stepped into his wife's room. His wife was sleeping the sleep of the thoughtless and the innocent; the baby dreamed sweetly near by. The husband raised the fatal instrument, aimed and fired.
