### REV. DR. FORREST ELECTED MODERATOR.

Presbyterian General Assembly Opened at Halifax Wednesday.

MANY DELEGATES.

HALIFAX, June 1.—The opening session of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was held this evening in St. Matthew's church, where between 200 and 400 commissioners from all parts of Canada gathered. Rev. Dr. Samuel Lytle, of Hamilton, Ont., moderator, delivered the sermon, after which he formally constituted the assembly. It was then moved by Principal Patrick, of Winnipeg, that Dr. John Forrest, president of Dalhousie University, be elected moderator for the ensuing year. Lieut. Governor Fraser, of Halifax, made a bright speech in seconding the resolution. Prof. B. S. P. of Toronto, seconded. Rev. R. D. McKay, foreign mission secretary, of Toronto, in a strong speech. It was seconded by Dr. Turnbull also of Toronto, but Dr. McKay wished to withdraw his name. It was granted, and the nomination carried unanimously.

Principal Patrick and Lieut. Gov. Fraser withdrew to the vestry to see their candidate robed in the moderator's gown, and then took the platform and introduced him to the late moderator. President Forrest was visibly affected. It was not so much his victory that moved him, but the gallantry of Dr. McKay. In retiring, he paid him a most friendly tribute, and then pledged himself to be moderator by the grace of God.

## VALUABLE CHARTER HAS BEEN SECURED

BY THOMAS MALCOLM

Quebec and N. B. Railway Co. Charter Has Large Powers and Authority. A Valuable Feeder to I. N. R.

### VARIOUS PROPOSITIONS.

A despatch from St. John under date of May 26th to the Mail and Empire of Toronto, says:—"It is announced that Mr. Thomas Malcolm has secured the charter of the Quebec and New Brunswick Railway, with a view of completing a line from Quebec to St. John, which is much shorter than any present route. On completion of the International line, now 'nearing a finish, this system will also include a direct line to Gaspe via St. Leonard's, N. B."

The gentlemen named in the original act incorporated under the name of the Quebec and New Brunswick Railway Company, are: Hon. John Costigan of the City of Ottawa; Arthur M. Deschene, of St. Roch des Edouardes, Que.; Thomas Malcolm, of Edmundston, N. B.; George Carol, of River du Loup; John H. Gregory, of the City of Quebec; Hon. F. G. M. Deschene, of the City of Quebec; Hon. A. Thibault, of St. John; Hon. J. G. Marché, of Chatham, N. B.; Auguste Belin, of Edmundston; Thomas Clair, of St. Francis; and Alphonse Bertrand, of St. John. The charter was passed by the Parliament of Canada in 1909, and was empowered to build a railway from Cunnors Station on the St. Francis Branch of the New Brunswick Railway in the County of

This act was assented to on June 14th, 1909.

In 1908 the act was amended so as to give the company some alternative to any point on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway in the Valley of the River St. Francis, and giving the company also power to extend the said railway to a point on the boundary line between Quebec and Maine in the Township of the State of Maine.

colonial Railway, at or near St. Charles Junction in the Province of Quebec or point on the Quebec Central Railway, at or near St. Anselme, Quebec, or a point on the Grand Trunk Railway at or near Chandler Junction, Quebec, a distance of about 150 miles. In 1909 this act was amended, and section 2 of the amending act authorized the company, in addition to the line described in the original act, to construct and operate a railway of the gauge of four feet eight and one-half inches from a point on its railway authorized by Chapter 75 of the Statutes of 1909 at or near Connor Station in New Brunswick, to Confederation, at or near St. Charles Junction in the Province of Quebec, or a point on the Quebec Central Railway, at or near St. Anselme, Quebec, or a point on the Grand Trunk Railway, at or near Chandler Junction, Quebec, a distance of about 150 miles. The original act fixed \$20,000 per mile of railway as the bonding privilege, and the amending act fixes the bonding privilege at \$25,000 per mile.

### INTERCOLONIAL HAS LARGE SURPLUS

Revenue of Dominion Increasing By Leaps and Bounds.

A GOOD SHOWING

Canada started off the first month of the fiscal year with a gain of nearly \$11,000,000, or thirty-one per cent, in the total trade as compared with the total trade for April of last year. The imports for the month totalled \$3,682,438 (an increase of \$5,159,767 or about thirty-six per cent, as compared with the corresponding month of last year). The exports of domestic products totalled \$1,977,851, an increase of \$2,644,881, or about twenty-two per cent. The exports of agricultural products for the month totalled \$6,961,972, an increase of a little over one and a quarter millions. The exports of manufacturers totalled \$2,860,111, an increase of \$422,911.

If the present rate of interest is maintained for the rest of the year, the total trade of the dominion will considerably pass the \$900,000,000 mark for the twelve months. The customs revenue for the month was \$4,882,015 an increase of \$1,074,155.

The surplus of receipts over all operating expenses on the Intercolonial railway for the last fiscal year is announced today as \$623,000, as compared with a deficit of some \$700,000 for the preceding year, a net betterment of over a million and a quarter.

The surplus is due both to improved traffic conditions on the road and to reforms inaugurated by the minister of railways and the board of management. It is confidently expected that the surplus marks the end of a long period of annual deficits, and the government road under the present business-like management will necessitate no drain on the federal treasury.

### TWO MILLION DOLLARS FOR ROLLING STOCK

Grand Trunk Places Big Orders For Engines and Cars.

MONTREAL, June 1.—The Grand Trunk management placed orders for nearly \$2,000,000 worth of rolling stock, in addition to the ten passenger engines of the Pacific type, and 1,000 steel under frame box cars and 500 automobile cars, ordered about ten days ago.

The new order authorized by President Mack consists of half a dozen first-class coaches, twenty baggage cars, one motor car, three dining cars, three cafe parlor cars, three buffet parlor cars, fifteen Richmond consolidated freight engines, 25 Mount Leinster, 1,000 hopper bottom steel coal cars, capacity 100,000 each and 500 steel under frame box cars of 60,000 capacity.

### TO CELEBRATE 12TH AT NEWCASTLE

Restigouche Orange Lodges Planning Big Excursion to Miramichi.

PREPARING PROGRAM

At Newcastle great preparations are being made for the day and it is expected that a very large number of Orangemen will be there for the day. Cheap excursion rates will prevail from Campbellton and Intercolonial, late points.

Midsummer Series Will Have Prominent Speakers.

THE DATES SET

It is proposed to have speakers in attendance at the following places on the dates mentioned to give demonstrations and hold discussions at afternoon meetings and to address evening meetings. The subjects to be taken up are: Soil Cultivation, the Judging of Horses and the Judging of Dairy Cattle. Each meeting will be in charge of the Agricultural Society of the District and it is suggested that a picnic meeting be arranged so that those in attendance may get their supper on the ground and then be on hand for the evening meeting.



YOUNG MCRAE WILL GO TO PENITENTIARY

Restigouche Youth Who Has Escaped From Reformatory up for Trial.

MERCHANTS TO FORM ORGANIZATION

Enthusiastic Meeting Held in Sullivan's Hall on Tuesday Night.

THREE ESCAPES

ST. JOHN, June 1.—In the police court yesterday afternoon Robert H. McRae, the boy who escaped from the Boy's Industrial Home, Crowville, on May 17, and was later captured by the chief of police of Sussex at Big Salmon River, was committed for trial to appear at the next sitting of the circuit court, on the fourth Tuesday in June. Superintendent McDonald, of the Industrial Home, appeared against him and his record in the institution. Mr. McDonald testified that McRae was received for the first time in the Boy's Industrial Home on June 8, 1909. He was sent there to serve a two years' sentence by Judge McAtehey, of Restigouche, on the charge of stealing a gold watch, chain and pocket watch on September 19, 1909, he escaped from the institution and was returned by the chief of police of Moncton on September 24. He remained there until January 8, 1910, when he again escaped. This time he was captured by the police of Moncton at a place eight miles from Moncton. The third escape was made on May 17 last. Superintendent McDonald said he did not care to have McRae any longer in the Boy's Industrial Home, and the magistrate accordingly committed him for trial.

PLANS DISCUSSED

A large attended and enthusiastic meeting of Campbellton merchants was held in the Sullivan Hall, Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. Various subjects of interest to the merchants generally were discussed the most important being the formation of a Merchants' Association, which was referred to a committee of five to look into the matter and report at a later meeting. It is thought desirable to organize, various matters of interest will be taken up.
