Mr. Gladstone, with a nominal majority of 30, would be in as embarrassed and hopeless a position as the head of the Cabinet could eccupy. He would not be able to maintain his position in the House of Commons for a month. If he tried to palter with his promises to the Irish, he would at once lose 80 votes, placing him in a minority of 50 if the Irish abstained from voting, and of 150 if they yoted against him.

GLADSTONE HAS CAUGHT UP. LONDON, July 12.—On the returns as hey stand, the Liberals have practically aught up with their antagonists. What-London, July 12.—On the returns as they stand, the Liberals have practically caught up with their antagonists. Whatever further gains they may make will count double on their majority. A gain of 40 seats, for example, will give them, a majority of 80. On Saturday's polling they won two seats out of nine held by their opponents, but as the contests happened all to be in Tory strongholds, this is no indication of the electoral drift. On Monday's elections in 33 divisions in England and Scotland they expect to de much better, but no news is in to show the results. The returns declared all indicate a great reduction in Tory majorities. Such Irish results as are in show the Parnellite faction to be in the same trivial minority as heretofore, save in North Galway where Col. Nolan has held the sear against a newcomer. Nolan, however, is by no means a bitter partisan. He is personally popular with Irishmen of both factions and is quite as much a Gladstonian as any of them. His election makes five Parnellites elected. There are two eastern districts in which they have a fighting chance. West Clare and Northwest Meath. The odds are slightly against them in both, but nobody really knows what the result will be Even if they carry both they will have only seven seats.

THE VOTE SO PAR. LONDON, July 12.—At 2 o'clock this afternoon the latest returns received show the election of 209 Conservatives, 179 Liberals, 32 Liberal Unionists, 34 anti-Parnellites and 5 Parnellites.

Lindon, July 12.—There was an air of contentment and repose in Liberal circles to-night. It is taken for granted that the Liberals will cohere on home rule, and the Irish sections will accept Mr. Gladstone's acheme. The bill will be expedited immediately when the assembling of the House of Commons takes place and the House of Lords will be challenged, under a menace of the extinction of hereditary peers, to throw the act out. The temper of the Liberals plainly points to a fierce agitation against the House of Lords should the Home Rule Bill, carried by the House of Commons, even by an insignificant majority, be rejected.

According to a Liberal estimate the highest conceivable majority is 98 and the lowest 45. The efficials of the Liberal Executive Committee to-night admit that it will be unexpected good luck if they appear in the House with 60 majority.

A Gladstonian whip, Arnold Morely, speaking at Mansfield to-day, said that if the Lords were foolish enough to un counter to the vote of the House of Commons they would either be mended or ended.

Important Industry Proposed.

Brantford, July 11.—A very large and important meeting of leading farmers from the various sections of the county of Brant convened last week at the residence of Joseph Stratford, Glenbyrst, adjacent to this city, to discuss matters of vital importance to the agricultural interests of this country. A volume of very interesting business was gone into, representing millions of dollars in its hearings. After four hours' session the meeting disbanded at midnight. Mr. Stratford is one of the largest stock breeders and farmers in this part of the country, and is an enthusist with both his capital and influence in everything connected with agriculture and its prosperity.

Orchard and Garden.

Orchard and Garden —The advantage of raising grapes is known to but few persons. They can be easily grown and take up but little space, besides making a fine ornament. Many persons have a stone wall about their garden or have a stone wall about their garden or grounds. Plant your grape vines upon one or both sides as you prefer. Be sure to keep them well pruned. Then they will grow and shoot down and cover this stone wall completely over. There seems to be something about stone that is peculiarly adapted to grapes. They will not mould and draw the sun.

—Even the 2,000 kinds of apples now recognized make a triffing list compared to the apples of the past; is the remarkable statement made by a student who has given the matter much thought. No one knows when the apple was originally indigenous. It is common with the garden author to write that "by the skill of the pomologist the delicious apple has developed from the wild crab." It is just as likely, from American experience, that the wild crab of the Old World, is the degenerate escape from cultivated trees. We know that the Greeks cultivated it, but as the root of the word is the same in all, even the most barbarous tongues, there is little doubt of its being cultivated long before the dawn of modern civilization. Remains of what must have been very fine spectmens of apples are found in the mud under spots when the lake dwellers of Switzerland had left their cabins to found towns and villages on land. That it traveled with the white man from his early Asiatic home is much more likely than that nature, unaided by man, spread it over the woods and wilds of Northern Europe.

The Outlook.

The Outlook.

—Memories in trade are so short that many people seem to be quite unaware that the conditions during the past year have been altogether exceptional. To all appearances they even forget that a year ago 500,000,000 bushels was considered a great crop, and no one then imagined that the yield of last fall would be 100,000,000 bushels larger. The country has already exported about 193,000,000 bushels, flour included, during ten months of the crop year, against only \$5,000,000 bushels during the same months of the previous crop year. Yet this change of over 108,000,000 bushels in the foreign demand has by no means exhausted the supply. It is calculated that about 77,000,000 bushels could still be exported, without reducing the stock to the minimum quantity carried over ten years ago. But there is little probability that more than about 25,000,000 bushels will be sent abroad so that there will be a surplus of 50,000,000 bushels or more in excess of the minimum stock to be carried over into the next crop year.—

STATIONARY POPULATIONS.

The French Chamber of Deputies has now before it a bill to provide some remedy for the steady depopulation of the country which is now going on. The preamble states that the number of births is still far below the deaths, having fallen from 25 per housand in 1883 to 24 in 1886 and 22 in .890. One way to encourage fecundity would be to follow the example set by the settlers in Canada to marry and rear families. His example was followed by Mr. Mercier when Premier of Quebec, with the result that a very large number of French-Canadians were ready to claim the reward of 100 acres of land granted to all those who have successfully reared a

Tound dozen of a family.

The trouble in France is that they do not marry early. In Canada they bring children into the world and educate them, only to find them go off to the United States as soon as they reach early man-The best way to encourage fecundity in both countries is to make the conditions of domestic life as attractive as possible. In France they sustain a "protective" tariff in order to raise the enormous sum necessary to a constant state of preparedness for war. It may be difficult to get away from this condition, until one more try is made to get back Aisace and Lorraine. But in Canada we have no such excuse for maintaining high tariff taxes. We need not prepare for war. Our neighbors in the States embrace onefourth of the Canadian people. They are our kinsmen and are as much opposed to war as we are. Hostilities with any other country we can have none. There-fore all we need to do is to cultivate the arts of peace, extend our markets by the removal of unnatural barriers and restrict-ive taxes on both sides of the line, and ive taxes on both sides of the line, and moderate prosperity and progress will be ours. How the tariff decimates the population of Canada is well illustrated by the special commissioner of Le Canadien newspaper who has been investigating the immigration question in Quebec. He writes from Trois Pistoles, a parish with a population of 2,800. The land is good and the benefit of having the Intercolonial Railway, which runs through the whole parish, would afford exceptional advantages to the farmers, if they only had a market at their disposal, they only had a market at their disposal, says the writer; but whole families leave for the New England States every spring, for the New England States every spring, having no means to live. As a rule, before leaving, they sell their farms to the village merchants with whom they run into debt. Twenty years ago there was a flourishing village at the Trois Pistoles River, with about 300 families, one-third of whom were farmers. Now there are not more than 25 families and all the rest have emigrated. For the last five years, an average of between 30 and 40 families left every year, and the majority have not returned. Taking the average to be 7 in each family, we find an emito be 7 in each family, we find an emigration of 1,050 persons from this parish alone since 1886. Some there are who tell us that for

this condition of affairs, which is dupli-cated, to a greater or less extent, in hundreds of parishes and townships in hundreds of parishes and townships in Eastern Canada, there can be no remedy: That it is the natural outflow of population from the lesser to the greater bountry. This excuse does not meet the asse. Canada is the lesser country in point of population; but in point of natural adventure it is coval if not superior to the rantages it is equal if not superior to the tier of States that lie immediately to the mouth of it. Ontario, indeed, is in almost every respect superior to the neighboring State of Michigan. Yet, with all its advan-tages it only increased 180,000 in popula-tion in the last ten years, whereas Michi-gan added to its population 453,000. The fact is that Canada's great need to-day is

S., of the London Missionary Society in Madagascar, and who is returning thither on the 24th inst., after a holiday in England, read a paper before this society on "Divination Among the Malagasy." He pointed out that they had a powerful and afficient belief in fate (which they call vintana), and connected therewith was a system of divination called sikidy, which was held to be a divinely-given method of ascertaining secret things and future events, together with the means of averting or remedying all evil. The sikidy was worked by the diviner taking at hap-hazard a number of beans or seeds from a heap, by twos, and with any left forming figures and combinations, arranged in twelve columns. Answers were supposed to be obtainable from these combinations, as each figure and combinations, as each figure and row had a certain significance. It is evident that such methods give ample scope for imposition, and Mr. Sibree said there was doubtless much trickery. Absurd notions, however, were held by the uninitiated in regard to the power of the diviner and the value of the answers. This sikidy was of Arab origin, as was evidenced by many of the divining words being Arrabic. The Malagasy hold the fatalistic belief that secritain days in each month are unlucky; hence infanticide is largely practiced in Madagasear among the heathen tribes.




