# COMMONS "STALLED" BY IMPASSE OVER ELECTION LISTS; WI TORIES TO BLAME Refuses To Consider Subject Apart From Conscription.

Effort of Nova Scotia Conservatives To Break GOVT. ROUNDLY SCORED Agreement May Put Off Prorogation In- Broken Pledges of Borden Are definitely—Conference Fails and New One Is Under Way.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Ottawa, Sept. 19.—There is a deadlock over the lists for the coming election. It is limited to Nova Scotia, but threatens to defer prorogation. The Conservatives are endeavoring to go back on their undertaking that provincial lists for Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall be used in the coming election. This assurance was given in the Commons, and the Government declined to allow A. L. Davidson, the Conservative member for Annapolis, to move an amendment in the Commons breaking this agreement.

More Conferences. The amendment, therefore, was held or the Senate, where it was offered by senator Ross of Middleton. It is lear that the Government is not clear that the Government is not anxious to bring criticism upon itself by backing the amendment which calls for new voters' lists in Nova Scotia, to be made by enumerators who will be chosen by the Conservative organization. ## TYPHOON KILLS MANY HUNDREDS AT AMOY, CHINA

dden Storm Takes Heavy Toll of Life and Shipping in Port.

Amoy, Sept. 17-(Delayed) .- More an 600 natives were killed by the phoon which struck Amoy without warning at the end of last week. Eighty-five per cent of the waterstroved. 




BUT SOFT COAL IS SHY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 .- Reports to the Geological Survey indicate that while there will be sufficient anthracite coa for domestic consumption in the east there may not be enough bituminous coal to keep industrial plants going at their present capacity. Production bituminous coal during August showed a falling off of 3.000,000 tons.

Canadian interests withdrew approx imately 1,700,000 tons of bituminous coa from the U. S. during the period tha elapsed between the Government's fix elapsed between the Government's fix-ing a flat coal price and the placing of the embargo. They are reported to have obtained this large stock by bidding from 25 to 50 cents per ton higher than the price set by the American Govern-ment. Other contributing factors to the situation are the growing needs of France and Italy for coal.





HOW BEST TO USE CEREALS

Cereals rank first among vegetable foods. They contain in varying proportions all the elements necessary to support life. They contain a great deal of starch, which is needed to keep the body warm and to make it do its work. A bowl of oatmeal, eaten for breakfast, will furnish the average man with all the strength, heat and energy he will need. Cereals with cooked fruits are particularly appe-

It is best not to buy cereals in very large quanti-

ties, because if they are kept too long insects are apt to develop in them. Cereals should always be kept in glass-covered jars.

Cereals are improved by long cooking. Therefore, oatmeal, hominy and other cereals which are left over can be added next day to the fresh-cooked

All cereals should be cooked at first for ten minutes directly over the fire, and then put into a double boiler. If you haven't a double boiler, place the saucepan containing the cereal in a larger sauce-

pan that contains hot water. By using a fireless cooker you can prepare your cereal at night, cook it on the stove for about ten minutes, put it in the fireless cooker, and when you get up in the morning you will find it all cooked and ready to be eaten. In this way you save both time and fuel.

Cereals requiring more than one hour to cook should be cooked the day before they are to be eaten and reheated in the morning.

Coarse, flaky cereals should be stirred as little as possible. Fine granular cereals may be beaten.




