Many Liberal and Unionist Speakers in the English Campaign Have Difficulty in Getting a Hearing Because of Riotous Partisans.

London, Jan. 6.-Lord Desborough was unable to obtain a hearing at To secure a hearing for Arnold Lupton, the Liberal candidate, at Sleaford, Captain Weigell, Unionist, had to preside. Similarly the Liberal vicar of Cottenham presided for Captain Morrison Bell, the Unionist. The Right Hon. A. Lyttleton was vigorously heckled even in exclusive Hanover Square. Many other meetings of both parties showed the heat engendered among the electors.

Lord Milner, at Wolverhampton prophesied that tariff reform will grow. The time will come when it will cease to be a party watchword. The Radicals themselves will rather shamefacedly adopt it. Meanwhile the Radicals had introduced a budget with twenty new items, with taxes upon the people in order to escape the terrible disaster of having to impose a new burden upon foreign imports. There had been an acute revival of the dear food fiction, but he had never wavered.

Winston Churchill, speaking at Dundee to business men, laid down five principles. He held that no substantial revenue could be obtained by taxing the foreigner, that 10 per cent duty on imported manufactured articles would not produce enough to meet the country's needs, that foreign investments were not injurious, that dumping was unfair competition, and that it cannot be stopped, by tariff retaliation, which is ineffective and unneces-

Mr. John Burns at Walsall said the Opposition was inviting invasion by calking sturidly about the unguarded condition of our shores. Who were these scaremongers? They were the unemployable of commerce, the dullards in finance; the duffers of trade, who asked doles to make up for lack of brains, ability, and adaptability, and by taxing our best customers and the food of their fellow-citizens were trying to impose upon the country a fiscal disability which all ought to regret.

Lord Crewe said last night that he had been called to account for making the statement that the colonies were astounded at the action of the Lords. It was true that in certain dominions there were second chambers which could deal with finance, but there was no kind of analogy be-tween the second chamber of many of the colonies and the action of the House of Lords. If the electors agreed with that action they would become the serfs of the Lords.

TALE OF THE LAND AND THE BUDGET

Winston Churchill Tells Story of Manchester Ship Canal.

ENRICHED LANDOWNERS

Values Enhanced Continually Through Those Who Do Not Benefit By It.

Speaking at Manchester recently, Mr. winston Churchill made a powerful defence of the budget. His address, in part is an followed.

Now let the Manchester Ship Canal tell its tale about the land. (Cheers.) It has got a story to tell which is just as simple and just as pregnant as its story about free trade. When it was resolved to build the canal, the first thing that they had to do was to buy land. Before the resolution to build the canal was taken the land on which the canal flows-I don't know whether I ought to say flows-(laughter)-was in the main, agricultural land, paying rates on an assessment from 30s. to £2 an acre. I am told that 4,495 acres of land purcheased fell within that description out of something under 5,-000, I think. Immediately after the decision, the 4,495 acres were sold for £777,000 sterling-(Shame)-or an average of £172 an acre—that is to say, five, six seven times the agricultural value of the land and the value on which it had been rated for pub-

lic purposes, Now what had the landowner done for the community; what enterprise had he shown, what service had he rendered; what capital had he risked in order that he should gain this enormous multiplication of the value of his property? (Cheers.) I will tell you in one word what he had done. Can you guess it? ("Yes.") Nothing. Cheers.)

Where the Interest Extends.

But it was not only the land that was needed for making the canal, the owners of which were automatically enriched. All the surrounding land either having frontage on the canal or access to it rose and rose rapidly, splendidly, in value. By the stroke of a fairy wand, without toil, without risk, without even a half hour's thought, the landowners in Salford. Eccles, Stretford, Irlam, Warrington, Runcorn, etc., found themselves in possession of property which had trebled, quadrupled, quintupled value. (Cheers.)





American Federation of Labor Carries Fight to the White House.

Washington, Jan. 6.-The American Federation of Labor, through a committee headed by Samuel Gompers, James O'Connell and other union leaders, today earried its fight against the United States Steel Corporation to President Taft. The committee presented to the president a formal paper in which they set forth fourteen different charges of illegality against the steel corporation, and asked for an immediate investigation of the socalled trust, which, they claim, is operating in defiance of the United States tatutes.
