

DOMINION OF CANADA WELL OFF THIS YEAR OVER THIRTY MILLIONS SURPLUS ON HAND

Revenue Shows a Gain
and Per Capita Debt a
Decrease.

ROD BOUNTIES TO BE CUT OFF

Government Makes No Loans
Except for Large Purposes,
Always Attaching Sink-
ing Fund.

Ottawa, April 4.—Hon. Mr. Fielding's fifteenth annual budget statement, as presented to the Commons this afternoon, was remarkable for two things. It was the shortest budget speech that has yet been presented to the House, taking only some 40 minutes in delivery. At the same time, in its statement of a record of a surplus of thirty and a half millions, of a revenue of one hundred and seventeen and a half millions, and of the payment of all but three million nine hundred thousand dollars of the total expenditure on both capital and current account out of the past year's income, despite twenty-seven millions spent on the National Transcontinental Railway construction, and eleven and a half millions spent on public works and other items of capital expenditure, it was the most eloquent and convincing testimony of the successful financial administration of the country that the Minister of Surplus has yet given to the House.

No Tariff Change.
Mr. Fielding confined his remarks practically to a succinct statement of income and expenditure for the fiscal year just closed, with a brief review of the figures for the preceding year. He made no reference to tariff matters, and his only allusion to the other pertinent subject of bounties was a brief statement to the effect that hereafter all bounties would be charged to income rather than to capital account, as in the past.

The figures he presented were in themselves the most eloquent tribute possible to the growth and prosperity of the country, and needed no amplification by the Finance Minister.

Mr. Foster's Criticism.
In the face of the story they told, Hon. George E. Foster had to confine his criticisms, as he himself expressed it, to "sticking a pin in here, and there." He harped on the old theme of increasing revenue, meaning increased taxation, while at the same time he ignored the fact that his party is now and always has been the exponent of high protective tariffs, and is now opposing the Government's proposals to lop off over two and a half millions per annum in customs taxation through the medium of the reciprocity proposals with the United States.

The fact that Parliament has not yet disposed of the reciprocal trade arrangements was responsible for the absence of any reference to the British preference, and possible changes contemplated, from the minister's address. The discussion of this subject, as indicated by the Prime Minister in the House some time ago, will be part of the final settlement of the reciprocity agreement.

A Mighty Surplus.

At the outset the finance minister gave a review of the revenue and expenditure for 1909-10, the public accounts for which had been before Parliament. The estimated revenue for the year ended March 31, 1910, had been \$79,411,747 or \$1,588,252 less than the estimates, and \$1,652,485 less than the expenditure chargeable to income during the previous year. The estimated surplus for 1909-10 had been \$16,500,000, but with the increase in the revenue and diminution of expenditure, the actual surplus realized was \$22,000,000, "which was a record surplus for this Dominion," said Mr. Fielding amid Liberal applause.

Analysing the expenditures for 1909-10, the minister of finance said that \$35,971,911 had been spent upon capital or special account, nearly two-thirds of which was provided out of revenue for the year.

The balance added to the national debt was \$12,248,367.

Out of that income were also paid the ordinary expenses of what is called consolidated fund, all the charges for railways and canals on capital account, all the charges for public works on capital account, railway subsidies charges on Dominion lands, charges for militia on capital account, all bounties and \$1,600,000 towards the cost of the National Transcontinental.

A MIGHTY REVENUE

Some of the more striking exhibits of his successful financial stewardship which Mr. Fielding presented to the House were as follows:

For the financial year 1909-10 the surplus was a little over \$22,000,000, which paid all the charges on capital account for railways and canals, for public works, for railway subsidies, for militia and for bounties.

The actual revenue for that year was \$101,503,710, which was \$16,000,000 in excess of that of the previous year, and \$5,500,000 in excess of the record year of 1907-08.

For the year just closed the total revenue, when all accounts were in, would be one hundred and seventeen and a half millions, an increase of sixteen millions over last year's high record. The expenditure on consolidated fund account would be about eighty-seven millions, an increase of about seven and a half millions. And in this increase there was included the expenditures for Dominion lands surveys and for militia, totalling two and a half millions, which would have formerly been charged to capital account, and also one and a quarter millions spent for the naval service, all of which were this year paid out of revenue.

A COMMITTEE OF CITIZENS TO HEAR MRS. THORNLEY

The Information on Which She Based Statements as to School
Morals Will Be Investigated by Responsible Body.

Mrs. May R. Thornley stated to "The Advertiser" this afternoon that arrangements are being made by which she will shortly place all the information she has secured and upon which she based the statements she made before a committee of responsible persons, who will investigate it thoroughly. Who the members of the committee will be Mrs. Thornley declined to say. Asked if she had been

given any chance at all to produce any of her evidence before the board of education when they made their investigation, Mrs. Thornley said no. "I was not given any chance whatever to make any statement to the board," she said. "I am not criticising the course they took at all, or their method of inquiry, but all the information I have will shortly be given to a committee of responsible citizens."

HEAD OF THUNDERER TAKEN BY DEATH

Charles Frederic Moberly Bell
Dies Suddenly in His
Office.

London, April 5.—Charles Frederic Moberly Bell, managing director of the London Times since 1908, died suddenly at his office today of heart disease. He was born in April, 1847, the son of the late Thomas Bell, of Egypt, and in 1875 married the daughter of the late Charles Bell, of London. He was the correspondent of the Times in Egypt from 1865 to 1890, when he became assistant manager. He has written much of Egyptian affairs.

LEAVES A MILLION TO FOUND A CLUB

For Military and Naval Men Who Are
on Small Salary.

London, April 5.—The late Honorable Henry L. Bourke, a wealthy stock broker, and brother of Lord Mayo, who was assassinated while governor-general of India, left \$1,000,000 on the death of his wife to found a residential club for naval and military officers on a small salary.

BELL MADE OFFER TO THE FARMERS

Willing to Connect With Aldborough
for \$250 Per Phone.

St. Thomas, April 4.—The Bell Telephone Company has offered to connect the Aldborough Farmers' Company with the Bell central, giving the farmers free exchanges with West Lorne, Rodney, and New Glasgow, for the payment of \$250 per phone, and \$1 for circuit. This would give continuous night and day service, and the Farmers' Company may accept the terms offered.

ACCEPTS THEOLOGY CHAIR

Montreal, April 5.—Rev. C. E. Bland, of Montreal Wesleyan College, has accepted the chair in theology offered him at the Alberta Methodist College at Edmonton, but it is not probable that he will leave for the west until the autumn.

Turning to the statement for the year 1910-11, which has just closed, the minister of finance said that he would be able to estimate even more closely than in previous years, although it would be necessary to allow time to pass for the collection of accounts.

"We estimate," he said, "that when the accounts are closed the revenue for the year 1910-11 will reach \$117,500,000, and the expenditure chargeable to consolidated fund to March 31, at \$75,500,195.74. He estimated that the total expenditure chargeable to that fund when the books were closed would be about \$87,000,000. This would give a surplus of revenue over ordinary expenditure of \$30,500,000. Referring to that increase, Mr. Fielding pointed out that during the year the Government made a change and that such items as militia, chargeable to capital account and Dominion lands, and the amounts for the naval service, which had hitherto been chargeable against capital account, would be transferred to income.

MANY LEAVING HERE FOR POINTS IN WEST

Great Is the Trek From City and
Country, While Thousands
Come From Europe.

Refrigerators state that few citizens are in touch with the situation have any idea of the number of persons leaving for the west.

"Every week there is a great number going," said a C. E. R. man to "The Advertiser" this afternoon. "It is the greatest season we have ever had. Many of those who go are farmers, of course, but a great many city people are going, too. All the sleeping accommodation on the trains is taken up for days ahead."

Mr. E. W. Weaver, a local auctioneer, stated that while there are many leaving London, there are just as many coming in from outside places. "I am doing a lot of work in the last few days," he said. "And everything that was offered found a ready sale. The surprising part to me was the number of people who are just coming in who bought things. There are fully as many coming in as there are going out."

At the present time the railways are handling an immense amount of through traffic. One agent stated that between the coronation and the rush of immigrants it is impossible to secure any accommodation on the ocean liners for months ahead.

"The steamship companies," he said, "are booked away ahead for months and coming, and many people who put off ordering their staterooms now find it impossible to get them until late in the year."

VOTE IN N. B. HOUSE ON PREFERENCE

Proposal to Increase It by Fifty Per
Cent. Defeated.

Fredericton, N. B., April 5.—At two o'clock this morning the amendment of Hon. C. W. Robinson, leader of the Opposition in the Legislature, increasing reciprocity, and favoring an increase of the British preference to 50 per cent, was defeated on a straight party vote, 29 to 15, there being only three abstentions.

HOUSES TO BE WIRED ON INSTALLMENT BASIS

Business Is Turned Over to Bank as
City Cannot Handle It.

The water commissioners cannot undertake to wire customers' houses, install fixtures, and then charge them a monthly rate for the same.

It will be remembered this plan was suggested by Mr. Glauzitz at the last meeting of the water commissioners. Tuesday night City Solicitor Meredith gave his opinion that the city had no power to go into that kind of business, and recommended that no action be taken.

However, the water commissioners have overcome that difficulty, and they will continue to wire any customer's house on the monthly installment basis.

The Bank of Toronto will finance the proposition. A form of lien note will be used in order that all parties will be protected.

Superintendent Glauzitz already has several applications, and the work will be undertaken at once.

PRINCIPALS SAY SCHOOLS MORAL

Education Board Also Declares
Suspensions Are Unfounded.

PUBLICITY IS DEPLORED

Mrs. Thornley Has Defenders—Will Be
No Investigation.

As a result of the recent letter of Mrs. May R. Thornley, charging immorality amongst pupils of the public schools, the following communication was presented to the board of education last night:

London, April 5, 1911.

We, the principals of the public schools of the city of London, in view of the charges so ruthlessly laid against the morality of the children under our charge, and so widely scattered throughout the province through the columns of the public press, emphatically deny the charges so made, and declare that the morals of the pupils are with an occasional or exceptional case of bad language, or similar charges, far in advance of what the schools were some years ago, and that neither obscenity nor immorality are indulged in by 99 per cent. of the children in our schools.

We also deplore the publicity that has been given to the rumors current in a few minds, and believe that the tendency of this publicity is to do far greater harm to our pupils' morals, than the odd case or two that may have occurred among thousands of children coming from so varied a home environment.

A FINE OF \$400 IN FARMERS' BANK CASE

Fred Crompton Pleads Guilty
to Illegal Hypothecation
of Notes.

Toronto, April 5.—Fred Crompton, a well known corset manufacturer, who was committed to trial some time ago on the charge of being a party to the illegal hypothecation of Farmers' Bank notes, appeared before Judge Denton this morning and pleaded guilty to the charge. He pleaded ignorance of the law and denied any wrong intent. His lawyer, E. W. J. Owens, made a strong plea for leniency and the judge imposed the minimum penalty, a fine of \$400 with the option of 30 days in jail. He paid the fine.

TWENTY-TWO AND HALF LIKELY TO BE RATE

And the Chairman of Finance
Committee Thinks It May
Be Lower.

The finance committee will discuss the estimates on Friday night next. The board of education and the water commissioners will have their ready by that time, and then the finance minister will get to work to strike the rate.

There will be no difficulty in preparing the estimates for the waterworks and the hydro-electric power commission, and it is thought that the revenue will amount to practically the same. "No effort has been made to prepare figures, but from a casual glance at the probable expenditure and receipts the commissioners are convinced that they can so handle the department that there will be no overdraft of any consequence. One official stated that \$5,000 either would probably be the outcome.

"That being the case, it will not be difficult for the finance committee to strike the rate."

"We will get to work on Friday," said Ald. Eckert, the chairman. "We want to get the work completed, and we will hasten as much as possible. The rate will be no more than 22½ mills, which is one mill less than last year, and we are hoping to bring it down still further."

CHARGED WITH THEFT

James Henry Gilmore, of the third concession of London Township, was arrested yesterday afternoon charged with stealing a lumber wagon valued at \$45 from his father, William Gilmore. He was remanded by Squire Chittick and will probably appear on Monday.

ALL NIGHT CONCERT BY THE HYDRO

The firemen are not a happy lot today.

Last night the hydro-electric wires in some way came in contact with the fire alarm system, with the result that the bells rang all night, keeping the members of the brigade awake. "We had no fires, but plenty of music," said Assistant Chief Scott. "The bells rang practically all night, keeping everybody awake, and as a consequence this morning everybody is peevish."

PRESIDENT URGES EARLY ACTION ON RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT

In Message to the Extraordinary Session of Sixty-Second Congress Says Pact Is of Great Importance to Both
Canada and United States.

Washington, April 5.—President Taft today transmitted to Congress a message urging early action on the reciprocity agreement with Canada. He stated that he based this message upon deference to popular sentiment and duty to the great masses of the American people. The message follows:

To the Senate and House of Representatives:
I transmitted to the 61st Congress, on Jan. 26 last, the text of the reciprocal trade agreement, which was negotiated under my direction by the Secretary of State with the representatives of the Dominion of Canada.

LONDON MAY BE THE CENTRE OF A BIG ELECTRICAL BATTLE

MR. J. H. MARSHALL MADE
MIDDLESEX REGISTRAR

Ex-M. P. for Riding Appointed
to Succeed Late John
Waters.

Mr. Joseph H. Marshall, ex-M. P. for East and North Middlesex to succeed the late Mr. John Waters. For some time it has been rumored that he would be selected. Yesterday he was called to Toronto, and offered the position. He accepted, and today a wire was received confirming his appointment. As soon as he is officially gazetted, Mr. Marshall will assume the duties of the office.

This ends a rather interesting contest for the place. There were a large number of applicants among the prominent Conservatives of both the north and west ridings for the position.

While the appointment was made altogether because of party services, it will be popular. Mr. Marshall is well known throughout the riding, and wherever known is well liked.

For some years Mr. Marshall represented the east riding in the House of Commons. He retired about ten years ago, and since that time he has lived on his farm just outside the city limits on Richmond street. For some years a very extensive dairy business has been conducted by Mr. Marshall.

SELL THEIR RESERVE FOR QUARTER MILLION

British Columbia Secures Removal of
Indians from Victoria's Water-
front.

Victoria, B.C., April 5.—The British Columbia Government today assembled the Songhees band of Indians on the reserve on the waterfront opposite the city of Victoria and put them to the heads of the tribes sums ranging from \$5,000 to \$11,000 each, a total of \$425,000 for the surrender of the reserve. The Government also supplies a new reserve on Esquimalt Harbor, whither the Indians will move at once. The city has been endeavoring to secure the removal of the Indians for nearly thirty years.

OLD BOYS' EXECUTIVE WILL MEET TONIGHT

Committee To Handle Coming Re-
union Will Be Struck.

The executive of the Old Boys' Association will meet tonight in the city hall to strike committees and transact other business.

Already there are about 20 members of the association who have paid their fees, and it is expected that a large number of others will join tonight. After the meeting active preparations will be commenced for entertaining the visitors when they come this summer.

STORM AT PARIS.

Paris, April 5.—Parisians were astonished today by a brisk snowstorm which gave a rather ghastly effect to the green of the newly-leaved trees. Cold and snow are general throughout the country, where much damage is being done to vegetables, fruits and flowers.

Insistent Rumors Afloat
of \$30,000,000 Merger
to Oppose the Hydro.

EXPERTS HERE TO INVESTIGATE

Edison Company Believed Be-
hind Move to Fight the
Government Project.

The announcement that the Commonwealth Edison Company, of Chicago, the \$36,000,000 electrical merger of the United States, was about to invade Canada and enter competition with the hydro-electric commission, is given some credence in this city. It is furthermore stated that London will be one of the strategic points in the contest for the supremacy.

It was stated that the Edison Company was behind the London Electric and that the big company would materially assist them in the struggle for control of the power market here. The Americans would also back the scheme now in process of formation for the amalgamation of a number of radicals having London as their objective point.

The Reason.

The announcement following so closely upon the statement that the hydro-electric commission would continue the transmission line to Windsor reveals the reason for the activity of the merger, it is said.

A prominent electrical engineer, who has been engaged both in Canada and the United States, informed The Advertiser that undoubtedly the Edison Company intended entering the Canadian field.

May Be a Bluff.

"I just heard the announcement," he stated. "Of course, it is not authentic as yet, and it may be somewhat of a bluff at this present moment, but if the hydro-electric commission extend their line to Windsor in order to sell power in Detroit, the Edison Company will 'carry the war into Africa.' According to the plans of the hydro-electric, it will be necessary to sell a considerable block of power in Detroit. If my memory serves me right, the Edison Company is proposing to sell 15,000-horse power in the City of the Straits. The chief customer is the New York Central Company, or the Michigan Central here. Now the Edison Company control the electrical situation in Detroit, as they do largely throughout the States. They furnish the power to the D. T. R., and sell, much as does the hydro-electric, to a large number of smaller places and manufacturing concerns. It will be very evident that they do not regard with feelings of unmitigated pleasure the advent of any competitor to their field. It is quite likely that they will bestir themselves to make as much opposition as possible to the Canadian proposition.

"However, I do not know the details of the matter as yet. There are many sides to the whole proposition, and much must be learned, but along general lines that is the reason I have for looking for a fight."

"If they unite with the Canadian interests, a formidable combination would be effected. London, I fancy, would be one of the strategic points. Toronto would be the other. If the Toronto General Electric disposes of their holdings to the city of Toronto that city will be eliminated from the possibility of competition, and it is more than probable that London would be the centre of an interesting conflict. The companies would be prepared to expend a considerable sum of money to gain their ends. It begins to look as if the city made somewhat of a mistake when they refused to purchase the London Electric."

It was stated on absolute authority that the hydro-electric commission are expecting a battle here. The hydro-electric commission and their agents have been preparing for it, and have everything ready to meet any opposition, they claim, that may be brought against the scheme.

If London is to be the buffer, the commission will back the city, it is said, in that undertaking.

So far as the London Electric is concerned, the directors say that so far as their knowledge here is concerned, nothing whatever has been done towards making that company the storm centre of a great fight for the power market.

"I have heard nothing of it," said Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., solicitor for the company. "So far as I know, it is all news."

The other officials of the company expressed themselves along the same lines. However, it was hinted that something might be going on of which they had no cognizance in the city of London.

The Edison Company manufactures all sorts of electrical machinery. It is claimed that they have the most perfect apparatus for generating power by steam. Some of the experts have been looking over their machinery, and it is rumored, although this could not be confirmed, that the London Electric Company will probably install some of their machinery in their plant. It will be necessary to have more modern machinery if they are going to continue in the field against the hydro-electric.

American Experts Here.
It is also known that several American experts have been in the city of London lately looking over several propositions, among them the London (Continued on Page Eleven.)

SAYS INTENDED TO KILL POPE

St. Peter's at Rome.
A HATER OF RELIGION
Declares That His Parents Disinherited Him in Favor of the Church.

Rome, April 4.—During mass at St. Peter's this morning, an Austrian madman entered the church and shot at a priest, who pushed to disarm him. "The congregation, which included many Americans and English, became panic-stricken and rushed out of the building. The man was finally disarmed. The policeman was slightly wounded.

It was learned later by the police that the man who did the shooting was a bricklayer by the name of Pietro Desanti, and that he was 42 years of age. He said that he is neither a Socialist nor an anarchist, but an anti-clerical, who hated all religions and priests.

Continuing his narrative to the police, he said that he came to Rome last August with the fixed intention of killing the pope. At first it was his intention to secure a place as gardener in the Vatican grounds and wait an opportunity to shoot his holiness as he was taking a walk in the gardens. After thinking it over, he realized the impossibility of this plan or of the alternative of reaching the pope's apartment, owing to the strict surveillance maintained by the Vatican guards. In view of all this he decided to kill a priest, and for that purpose he purchased a revolver and filled the miss with bullets. Then he drew his weapon and aimed at the celebrant as he later passed him on his way to the sacristy.

KING TRAINS FOR THE CORONATION

London Looks for the Monarch Each Morning, His Route Being Changed Every Day.

London, April 4.—The ride in Rotten Row in which King George is now indulging every morning is not the only indication, according to what is said in court circles of the royal resolve to do all that lies in his power to be thoroughly "fit" for the fatigues of the coronation period. The King is taking a series of physical exercises which he believes will be very beneficial, and he is constant in his activities in various directions.

Orange Custard.

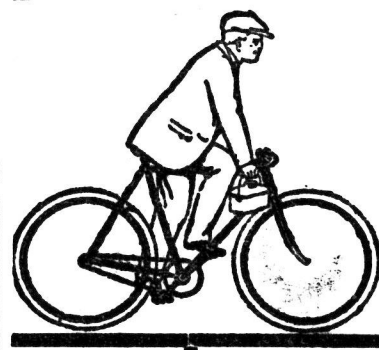

Mr. Guthrie pointed out that it was not necessary to have a mandate from the people. This was a familiar Conservative cry. Had the Liberal party listened to it during the past few years there would have been one continual general election. The people at the next general election will be in a position to judge of the quality of the government. Mr. Wilson asked the price of the land.

His speech was concluded with a magnificent peroration on the glories of Canada. On its completion, he was crowded and cheered him for some minutes. legislation enacted by the Liberal party when they were in power. Every source of revenue was due to legislation passed by a former Liberal Government. The corporation tax had increased the revenue \$274,864 in four years, the succession duties, \$675,000, the tax on brewers and distillers, \$14,000; mining licenses and fees, \$156,000; Dominion subsidies, \$814,000; T. and N. O. returns, \$350,000; the balance of capital funds paid by the Dominion, \$172,654. A total of \$2,437,744, all due to the wise administration of the Liberal party.

The School Policy. Mr. Elliott criticized the school policy of the Government. The abolition of the model school had caused a dearth of teachers, and had made it almost impossible for the poor man's child to secure an education to fit them for that profession.

The Government had failed to rise to the opportunity to reforest the north lands. When the Conservative failed to realize the importance of this, and had done absolutely nothing towards preserving the heritage of the people.

"Sir James Whitney introduced a bill to put the control of all electrical companies in the hands of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board," said Mr. Elliott. "So great was the opposition to this action from the party, that he had to withdraw the bill, and later at the control of the whole electrical business under the hydro-electric commission. There is no question that the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board is the proper body to handle this, but no person, not even the Government, had confidence enough in them to trust them with so important a task. They created the board, and if it is not right, why does not the Government make it right? The hydro-electric should not be given power over their opposition in business."

"I am for reciprocity," said Mr. Elliott. "I was amused by the resolution introduced by Sir James Whitney in the House against the pact. In the world, they made this country great and prosperous, and in this new endeavor, reciprocity, they will make Canada still greater."

Loyal Leaders. A resolution, originating in Hon. A. G. MacKay, the loyal support of the West Middlesex Liberals, was introduced by Mr. Charles McFie and J. M. Kaiser, Strathroy, and carried unanimously. Mr. J. W. Waterworth, Moss, and Mr. W. H. Roycraft, Glenora, read resolutions of loyalty to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party, and congratulating him on the trade agreement with the United States, which was destined to have so great an influence on the prosperity of the Dominion. There was a scene of great enthusiasm when this resolution was put, the whole convention standing up and cheering for some time.

A letter was read from Hon. A. G. MacKay regretting his inability to be present at the convention. He congratulated West Middlesex Liberals on having so fine a representative as Mr. Elliott.

Mr. Ross. At the afternoon session Mr. George Ross presided. Mr. Duncan C. Ross, M. P., was the first speaker. The present was a critical time in the history of the country. A great question, that of reciprocity, was being considered. It should not be looked at through party spectacles, but should be considered free from party bias or prejudice. It should be looked upon as a business transaction, and if it were good for the country, it should be supported.

"I firmly believe that if this legislation were introduced by the Conservative party, even if it were passed by the House, with the possible exception of the members for Toronto and Montreal, would have voted for it," declared Mr. Ross. "The party is badly disgraced now over this question, and believe me, there will be some recanting among the Conservative members before it is finally settled."

Mr. Ross traced the growth of the reciprocity movement. The years 1854-1855 were very dark years for Canada, as during that period a trade agreement was in force. It was abrogated in 1866. From that time until 1894 the Conservatives had repeatedly sent envoys to Washington in attempts to secure a trade agreement. In all they had been unsuccessful.

In 1892 the Conservative party went to the country on that very issue, and in 1894 Hon. George E. Foster went to Washington, not once, but twice, to secure a trade agreement. Because they failed, they could see no light in the agreement. They thought that by some manufacture, enthusiasm on the part of the interests they would gain the treasury benches on a snap vote, and so they opposed the agreement, but the farmer was too wise a bird to be caught with such chaff.

The United States is a consuming nation, or would shortly be so. Over 60 per cent of their population live in cities and towns. In Canada the situation is reversed. About 82 per cent of the population live in the country and are producing. Canada would be a producing nation for many years to come, and as the west filled up it would be necessary to secure wider markets. That was the reason they welcomed this pact, as it will give them markets of 50 millions of people, and still retain to them the markets at home and abroad. The farmer can trade in the best.

The British Preference. In carrying out the agreement, Sir Wilfrid, true to his promise, has not touched British preference. He has preserved that intact, and the Imperialists strongly opposed by the Conservatives.

"We had a hay buyer from New York in Strathroy," said Mr. Elliott. "He was buying hay, and he paid a \$4 a ton duty, and still make a profit. If the duty were removed, I fancy the farmers would have a much better market for their hay."

"I am for the reciprocity agreement first, last and always," he said, in conclusion, amid great cheers. "It will give the farmer a larger and better market and will bring him and peace between the great Anglo-Saxon races. It will have my support at all times."

Wellington's Member. In his opening remarks Mr. Guthrie paid a tribute to the excellent service done the party in the House of Commons by Mr. Duncan C. Ross. He had acted as Liberal whip on various occasions and had done well.

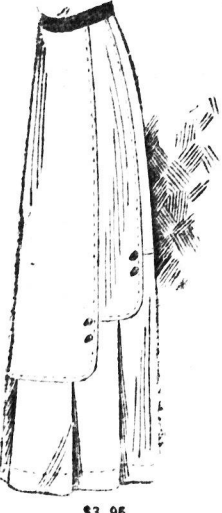

States was such that they would come a measure which would result in the increase of trade on both sides of the boundary line, would open up the reserve productive resources of Canada to the great mass of our own consumers on advantageous conditions, and at the same time offer a broader outlet for the excess products of our farms and many of our industries. Details regarding a negotiation of this kind necessarily could not be made public while the conferences were pending. When, however, the full text of the agreement, accompanying correspondence and data explaining both its purpose and its scope became known to the people through its immediate application to the ripened fruits of the careful labors of the commissioners met with widespread approval. This approval has been strengthened by further consideration of the terms of the agreement in all their particulars. The volume of support which has developed shows that its broadly national scope is fully appreciated and is responsive to the popular will.

The House of Representatives of the United States, after the full text of the arrangement, with all the details in regard to the different provisions had been before it, as they were before the American people, passed a bill confirming the agreement as negotiated, and as transmitted to Congress. This measure failed of action in the Senate.

In my transmitting message of the 26th of January, I fully set forth the character of the agreement, and emphasized its appropriateness and necessity as a response to the mutual needs of the people of the two countries, as well as its common advantages. I now lay that message and the reciprocal trade agreement, as part of the present message, before the 62nd Congress, and again invite earnest attention to the considerations therein contained.

NEW NUMBER SYSTEM FOR CANADIAN PACIFIC

Does Away With Duplication on Different Divisions.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, April 3.—Mr. J. C. Murphy, general superintendent of transportation on the C. P. R., says that a new system of train numbering, to do away with the duplication of numbers of different divisions, will be adopted shortly. Beginning June 4 next, special numbers will be assigned to each class of trains. Through passenger trains over eastern and western lines from coast to coast will be numbered from No. 1 to No. 14, the old families No. 97 becoming No. 1, Nos. 15 to 50 will be used for passenger trains running through more than one division on eastern lines, and Nos. 51 to 90 for the same class on western lines. Dead or slow freight east are allotted 11 to 99; local passenger and freight, east, 100 to 199; eastern division locals, 200 to 299; Ontario division locals, 300 to 399; Lake Superior locals, 400 to 499; inter-divisional fast freight, east, 501 to 599, and the same class west, 601 to 699.

BANDIT TREASURER

Financier of the Camorristi in the Box at Viterbo.

Professor Rapi is a high-class gambler, and has experienced the usual ups and downs of a follower of chance. The surveillance of the Italian police becoming oppressive he went to Paris and when expelled from the French capital he set up business in London, subsequently returning to Italy with a fat purse, there to go broke again.

He founded the Union Del Mezzogiorno of Naples to the success of which many of the aristocracy are said to have contributed their fortunes in a single night's play. He conducted gambling places also at Rome and Ostia. In his Neapolitan resort, Genaro Cuccollos, the murdered Camorrist, is asserted to have gathered information of its patrons that made the latter victims of crime. Rapi had many bankers, politicians and journalists among his acquaintances.
