The final meeting in the interests of Mr. Beck was held in Collins' Hall, West London, last evening, when the old building, the scene of so many lively municipal and political gatherings in years gone by, was well filled That money was secured on bonds with the supporters of the Conservative candidate, and considerable enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. Beck, Mr. Gray, and ex-Ald. Judd were the principal speakers, and their remarks were largely a repetition of what they said at the East London meeting. Outside of provincial issues, Mr. Beck confined himself to two matters-the breakwater and the extension of the Port Stanley-avoiding the many charges made against him. He went so far as to take credit to himself for the present position of affairs as regards the breakwater, and attempted to throw cold water on the statement made that the Ontario Government, through Dr. Routledge, had offered to

pay a portion of the cost.

Liberals In Power Too Long.

Ald. Forristal followed Ald. Matthews, and he assured the gathering that this election was the most important since confederation. If the Province got four years more of the Ross Government it would be a calamity, for the Liberals had been in power far too long-fully fifteen years. There was no precedent in the British Empire for a Government remaining in power so many years, the longest Government ever known being that of Sir Robert Walpole, which, by the way was the most corrupt that England ever knew. Ald. Forristal went on to say that when the Ontario Governtimber lands.

"And what have we got now?" asked Ald. Forristal. "The Conservatives have not been able to get a look into the books at Toronto, but after Wednesday next, when they will have access to the books, it will be found that there is very little left." Ald. 

BIGGER BATTLESHIPS

Steel Leviathans Under Construction by World Powers.

London, Jan. 23.-As one of the most notable features in the progress of naval construction is the continued growth in the size of battle ships and armored cruisers, it is interesting to turn to the new edition just published of F. T. Jane's volume, "All the World's Fighting Ships," in which he has embodied the classification of the warships of the world.

To the big class of battleships he has assigned the classification Al. It is a significant fact that among the firstclass powers Italy, Germany and Austro-Hungary are not represented in this class, but the other chief powers have a number of these mailed leviathans in hand. The United States and France both lead Great Britain in the "A1" battleships building. Now, it is said, designs have been prepared by Phillip Watts for new battleships bigger and more powerful and most costly. Yet there is a considerable body of opinion against this policy of putting so many eggs in one

Among the opponents of more powerful ships may be mentioned Admiral Sir E. R. Fremantle, Admiral Sir John director of naval construction.

Until February, 1887, when Dr. Montague was first a candidate in Haldimand, the county was considered safely Liberal. By one of the most disgraceful carnivals of corruption and fraud ever known in Canada, he succeeded in reducing the Liberal majority to 13, which was converted into a majority of 1 for Montague on a recount. The Liberals protested the election, and not only exposed the wholesale corruption which had been practiced, but it was actually shown at the trial that Colter (Lib.) had a majority and should have been returned as the member. At the bye-election in November, 1887, one James Murray was ceputy returning officer at Hagersville, and it was afterwards proven that he had spoiled eight ballots cast for Colter by marking them for Montague as well. In face of this Murray was again appointed deputy returning officer, notwithstanding the protests of the Liberals and at the polling-place where he presided wholesale personation was carried on with his knowledge and assistance. Criminal proceedings were taken against him, he was committed for trial, released on bail and absconded to Buffalo, where he fully confessed his crime.

At the bye-election in February, 1890, the disgraceful franchise act was worked for all it was worth. In almost every polling subdivision in the riding a few Liberal names were left off the voters' lists and some Tories added on the printing of the lists. The revising barrister, Judge Upper, when questioned about it, said: "It must have been some mistake in copying." Dr. Montague, assisted by Col. Tisdale, M. P., George Moir, of . St. Marys, and R. W. Mutchmoor, worked at the poll in the Indian Reserve all day. Moir was stationed in a small log shop all day, of which the outside Tories carried the key, and the Indians were taken in one at a time where "business" was done. Mutchmoor held forth in a barn near the polling booth where "liquid joy" was dispensed. Of course, Dr. Montague was elected. In the general election of 1891, a deputy returning officer, Henry J. Ince, to whose appointment the Libera's had strenuously objected, went to the polling place on the Indian reserve the night before the election, and next morning, when the Liberal scrutineers arrived at the polling place, at 8:05 (55 minutes before the poll should have been opened), they found that voting had been going on for some time, and that a large number of bogus votes had already been polled. Some of those who had voted were dead, and others lived in the United States.

A number of Montague's agents were present, aiding and abetting in the fraud. Four of them were afterwards appointed to positions in the Customs; Ince was put on trial, but the jury disagreed, only one man holding out for acquittal. The poll clerk at this poll drove into the adjoining county of Brant and voted before 5 o'clock on the same day, after the Haldimand

poll had been closed and the ballots counted. A scheme which was successfully worked was the ballot exchange. This is acomplished by securing from the deputy returning officer a ballot marked for Montague with the deputy's initials thereon, and is given to the voter who has been "fixed." He deposits this in the box and returns with the one which has been given to him in the polling booth when he is "settled with." The ballot which he brings out is forthwith marked for Montague, and is ready for the next "subject." The above facts were all proven in court at Cayuga, in March, 1901. In the same election the following disgraceful circular was written by Dr. Montague and circulated among the Indians:

FOR INDIANS ONLY.

To the Indians-The Queen has always loved her dear loyal subjects, the Indians, She wants them to be good men and women, and she wants them to live on the land that they have and she expects in a little while, if her great chief, John A., gets into government again, to be very kind to the Indians and to make them very happy. She wants them to go and vote and all to vote for Dr. Montague, who is the Queen's agent. He is their friend, and by voting for him every one of the Indians will please

QUEEN VICTORIA. On the head of this circular is the British Coat-of-Arms, Dr. Landerkin brought this matter up in the House on July 17, 1891. Dr. Montague at once denied having anything to do with the circular. (See official "Debates," session of 1891, vol. 2, page 2,474).

On July 21 the matter was again brought up in the House by Mr. Hyman, who read from the sworn evidence at the trial as follows: "I wrote part of the circular; I do not think I wrote more than one-half of it. I was aware on election day that they were distributed. I gave a few away to show what nonsense they were."

R. W. Mutchmoor, one of Dr. Montague's righthand men, swore, on the contrary that the whole letter was written by Dr. Montague.

This politician, who forged the name of Queen Victoria, was a year ago in Australia of attempting to corruptly influence the ex-premier of Victoria, Sir Alexander Peacock. The latter has been driven from public life as a result. Less than two months ago the Conservative party in the city of London, begged Dr. Montague to accept the nomination against Hon. C. S. Hyman. So much for Conservative purity.



THE TRADES AND LABOR COUN-

To the Editor of The Advertiser: We the undersigned members of the Trades and Labor Council of London take this opportunity of denying the authorities apparently somewhat article published tonight in The Advertiser headed, "Trade Unionists Are duty to preserve order, scouting the Angry Because of Tory Conspiracy."


