A private despatch from Chicago gives Thoman's crop report as follows:—Present condition of wheat indicates a prospective yield of 315,000,000 bushels, as contrasted with 320,000,000 bushels last April, and against 270,000,000 bushels last April, and against 270,000,000 bushels last year. With the exceptions of Indiana Illinois and Missouri the condition is good. The contemplated increase in the spring wheat area will approximate 20 per cent.

The Chicago Herald's Washington despatch says the world's wheat crop will officially be announced by the Secretary of Agriculture as 2,428,393.000 bushels, against 2,546,404,000 in 1895; decrease, 118,011,000; reserve in farmers' hands, 88,-118,011,000; reserve in farmers nands, 85,000,000; in mills, 41,000,000; visible, 44,000,000 aggregate reserve, 173,000,000. This supply will have to furnish 17 000,000 bushels for spring seeding, 104,000,000 bushels for four months' food. This leaves 52,000,000 bushels for export, carry over and visible supply.

The Minneapolis Market R-cord says that larger wheat receipts are expected at Minneapolis and Du'uth during the next three weeks. The reason for this is given that there are no carrying charges for country clevators; railroads blocked with snow are now open and wheat left in country elevators will soon be subject to country taxation. A year ago the roads were open, and shippers could send forward all they desired to. This season it has been different. The mills are now likely to grind more flour, and the receipts will be absorbed without necessarily increasing the supplies at Minneapolis.







Now that the days of the white pine forests of Michigan are drawing to a close the question of the imposition of an export duty upon the year. In the fiscal year of 1896 they took pine logs valued at \$1,424,000 out of this country, and when the figures for 1897 are to hand, it will be found that their depredations are on the increase rather than declining in any way, since saw logs that in the old days were thought to be beyond the possibility of economical reach are now hauled out easily by the steam logging roads which are every season extended to the furthest points in the forests, and can be constructed at very little more cost than the old horse roads, while they are far swifter and more efficient. These logging roads are superseding the water courses as means of transportation, and with their help the forests can be speedily and thoroughly destroyed.

The saw mills of Minneapolis and Duluth cut about 500 million feet per year running during summer and fall. The former cut the pine from the forests at the head of the Mississippi River, and at their present rate of consumption will soon convert the head waters of that stream into a mere periodical torrent from lack of forest shelter to retain the rainfall, The cut of the Duluth mills comes from the Cai. wan shore of Lake Superior, and is about half supplied from Wisconsin. The effect of the cut about the great lake is already seen in its constant lowering, in the conversion of its mountain streams to torrents during the wet season and mere fishways in the dry, and in the prevalence of fires for months in the State, west of the vast Red Lake reservation, and on the lower Mississannual cut. This cut is growing

wood will take its place. Yellow pine, fir, cedar, redwood, and spruce are merely inefficient substitutes used because white pine cannot be had. Canada stands ready to supply it, but it is to be hoped not without receiving some return for her sacrifice.

Estimates compiled by the Forest Warden of Minnesota, an office created by the last Legislature because of the opinion that the forests were being too rapidly depleted, show that there are in Minnesota 10,000,000 acres of forest land, and that on this there stand, in addition to other woods, 19,000,000,000 feet of live white and Norway pine and spruce, of which the white pine aggregates 14,500,000,000 feet. This is a vast total, but it is being cut down at the rate of about 1,200,000,-0.0 feet a year, besides fearful losses by fires, and the supply will hardly last more than a dozen years. It would not last so long as this were it not for the fact that the fire-swept pine can be saved by cutting when it is so located that it can be reached by railroads or water in time to save it from the attacks of worms. There is, too, a constant growth of the green timber, estimated at not far from 11/2 per cent. a year, which will have some effect in warding off the final axe cuts. But in from ten to fifteen years the last white pine forests in the United States will have disappeared, for pine does not succeed as second growth timber, or at least has not done so with all the experiments carried on in the old pineries of Michigan and other States.

Now, then, is Canada's opportunity. One, which if grasped firmly, will enable us to secure valuable concessions from the framers of the Dingley Bill. The prompt imposition of a duty on saw logs would range the Michigan mills on our side; one on pulp-wood would start our pulp factories once more, and a lime-burners of the Eastern States to The iron is hot now. THE GOVERNMENT REPORT.

The annual report of the Minister of Mines for British Columbia strikes the true key-note when it states that the progress of mining in that province, and the realization of the wealth now locked up in her mountains depends entirely upon the extension and facilitation of the means of communication and transport. From the nature of the ore it must be carried to the metallurgical centres for treatment, and if the ore deposits now known to exist, and those that may yet be discovered, are to be made available and to become a most valuable part of our resources, trails, roads and railroads must be constructed to make possible the concentration of ores, fuels and supplies at the most favorable points. In fact, if our mining industries are to be properly and intelligently fostered the government must lend financial aid to make easily accessible the coal fields and the mines from which the different classes of ore can be obtained—separately difficult to treat, but which, when brought together and intermixed, can be reduced at minimum smelter charges.

If this be done and done before American enterprise has diverted the stream of crude ores to United States smelters, the mining industry will be one of the most thriving and profitable that Canada possesses. with its present meagre transportation facilities it has made giant strides. Of course, placer mining is the principal source of the gold supply, and in Cariboo this was checked by the unusually dry season of 1896, which caused those claims which were able to secure sufficient water pressure for a few weeks run to be considered fortunate while many of the regular producers were unable to clean up at all. The prespective building of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway, and the demand for coal, and more especially coke, are attracting much attention to the large deposits of coal that will be made available by this railway. Analysis shows that an excellent coke, very low in ash, can be produced, not excelled by any other made in the West; and as large smelting works are now being constructed, this fuel supply will be a valuable factor in the smelting of the ores of the Province within its own borders. With the advent of the railway, the oil fields will also receive that exploration that their surface indications warrant.

The Boundary Creek district is essentially a gotd district, and the great bulk of the ores is a mixture of the various iron sulphides, with copper pyrites, all more or less auriferous. This class of ores has a wide range in value, but, excluding the extremes. may be said to carry about \$15 in gold, with two or three ounces in silver, per ton, and 5 per cent copper. The chief want is cheap transportation. Even the high-grade dry ores of the district can do little more than bear the burden of sixty or seventy miles of waggon haulage, when added to the other necessary expenses. So much the less, then, can the low grade sulphide ores be profitably exported. With a railway system in operation, it is doubtful if a well equipped smelting plant adapted to the treatment of these ores could not be profitably operated in the district: for with the certainty of abundant ores of varied character, as pure limestone as can be desired, and an apparently excellent metallurgical coal at hand, no other material is needed.





This large advance over lat year's receipts ie due almost altogether to the excessive amount of raw sugar, spirit, etc., being taken out of bond in anticipation of increased duties. The same also applies to the receipts of the Iuland Revenue Department, which shows an increase of \$156.039 over March, 1896. The amount collected last month was \$528,9% and a year ago \$172,007.

FINANCIAL.

The truth is that the principal reason for gloom and "bear" actions, is not anything to do with on own market, but the belief that a large syndicate, containing most of our leading speculators, is heavily loaded with May wheat at figures about 15 to 20 cents above present quotations. The Chicago papers claim that they hold 8,000,000 bushels, and although these figures are doubtless exaggerated, it is beyond question that they stand to be heavily stuck unless prices take a remarkable. bound upwards. This has caused them to take a narrow view of the local market. But the fact remains that good paying stocks are hard to get, and the moment one of them is hammered down ever so little there is an instant rush of buying orders.

Money continues cheap, all over the world, with every prospect of continuing so. In London the rate is 1 per cent. on call, and I to 13 per cent. for discount in the open market. In New York it is 1½ to 1¾ per cent. on all, and prime commercial paper distounts at 3½ to 33 per cent. BUTTER.—A quiet and easy market. Fresh creamery sells at 194c to 204c. The exports of produce last week were 4,355 boxes cheese to London and 345 to Liverpool, and 35 butter to Liverpool.

Marke Products - New maple syrup in fair demand at 50 to 55c per can and 5 to 51c per lb in wood; new sugar 7 to 71c per lb.

Fish.—The demand is about over for the season. Johbing prices are as follows: Labrador salmon, small, \$10 to \$10.50; B.C. salmon. \$10 to \$10.50; No. 1 green cod, large, \$475 to \$5; No. 1, \$4 to \$4.25; No. 2, \$2 to \$2.25; No. 1 green haddock, \$2.25 to \$2.75; No. 1. N.S. herrings, choice. \$3.50; ordinary, \$2.75 to \$3; No. 2, mackerel, \$10 to \$11. New haddock are selling at 3½c to 3½c, hass at 7½c, new B.C. salmon at 12½c to 13½c, pickerel at 6c, and pike at 4c per lb. Haddies are selling at 6c to 6½c per lb.; Yarmouth and Bay bloaters at 75c to \$1 per box; kippered herrings at 75c to \$1 per box, and smoked herrings at 12c Fish.—The demand is about over for the \$1 per box, and smoked herrings at 12c

Cop On.—The market is practically bare of stock, and the purchases in the Newfoundland market during the past four weeks have been 4,000 harrels.

A bill is to be introduced to compe! rail-ave to carry bleycles as baggage. This ways to carry bleveles as baggage. This bill has the support of the Canadian Wheelman's Association, which contends that it is unjust to allow the ordinary traveller to carry 150 pounds uaggage free and charge the bicyclist freight on his machine.

Hon. Geo ge A. Cox. the new Senator from Toronto, made his introductory speech in the Senate on noving the address in reply to the speech from the throne. He made a very favorable impression.

With the approval of many of the Boards of Trade, the Government will soon appoint commercial agents to South Africa, the Mediterranean countries, Mexico and other places to promote trade relations.

It is stated that one of the departmental stores purchased at the postoffice one day last week 75,000 3 cent stamps. The stamps were to be used in sending to the country catalogues descriptive of the firm's business. This transaction affords an insight into the great volume of trade that is being done by the big stores.


The Orange Judd Farmer's report made The Orange Juda Farmer's report made the condition of winter wheat 63.5, against 87 last year, and 75.3 in 1895. It says that the condition is on the area still left, and does not represent loss of acreage in Illinois. The Ohio condition is 86, or 14 above last year. Michigan 91, or 4 below; Indiana 70, or 13 below; Illinois 45, or 41 below; Missouri 75, or 10 below, and Kanasa 78 or 5 below. below; Missouri 75, Kansas 78, or S below.

An amendment is proposed to the On-tario Railways Drainage Act. It provides for the settlement of the questions in regard to drainage across railways, without reference to the Railway Committee of the Privy Council. All such cases are to be submitted to an arbitration board, combe submitted to an arbitration board, com-posed of an engineer, appointed by the municipality, and the land owner, and one named by the railway company, these to choose an umpire. If they are not able to agree upon this third arbitrator, the bill provides that they shall notify the Rail-way Committee of the Privy Council, which shall name an engineer, who is to go over the work and make an award.

According to a report presented the mileage of railways in operation in Canada at the end of the last fucal year was 16 270 miles, an increase of 1,707 miles. Although there was this increase in the mileage in operation there were only 291 miles built during the year. The Chief Engine's attributes this to general strin-Engine's attributes this to general stringency in the money market. Statistics of fatal accidents show that 161 persons were killed, of whom 11 were passengers, 46 were employes, and 104 were neither. No less than 75 persons lost their lives by walking on tracks, 23 were killed by faling from cars, 19 by getting off trans in motion, 14 while coupling cars, 2 by collisions and derailments, 1 by putting his head out of a window, and 27 from other causes.
