

Dufferin School

DUFFERIN SCHOOL, on Berkeley Street, is one of the pioneer schools of Toronto. It was built in 1876 while the late

Marquis of Dufferin and Ava was Governor-General of Canada.

The first head-master was Mr. Richard Lewis, who for over thirty years rendered efficient service as an educator to the City of Toronto. Mr. Lewis was born in England in 1813, and was for some years a teacher in Liverpool. Shortly after coming to Canada in 1855, he was appointed Principal of George Street School, being later promoted to Victoria Street and then to Dufferin. On account of advancing years, Mr. Lewis retired in 1888. He died in August, 1895.

The next Principal was Mr. Robert Willson Doan who comes of good old United Empire Loyalist stock. His ancestor, John Doane, sailed from Plymouth, England, in 1639 to make his home with the Pilgrim Fathers in New England, where he was associated with the immortal Miles Standish and John Alden in the Councils of the Puritan colony at Plymouth, Mass. In Canada, too, his forefathers took an active part in the great reform movements of the early part of the nineteenth century that won for Canada the magnificent system of self-government that has been the pattern for our sister colonies and a bulwark to the Empire, to the astonishment of foreign nations.


Mr. Doan was born in East Gwillimbury, York County, in 1839, and received his early education at Queensville Public School. When quite young he graduated from the Toronto Normal School with a first-class certificate. He taught for a number of years in his native township and at Aurora. He was the first Principal of the Toronto Model School for the training of teachers. In 1871 he was elected a member and Secretary of the County Board of Examiners for York County and held that position until the abolition of the County Boards in 1907. He has also been Secretary of the Ontario Educational Association since 1880. In 1872 Mr. Doan was appointed Principal of Parliament Street School, being later promoted to Park School, George Street, Victoria Street, and in 1888 to Dufferin School. For twentysix years he labored untiringly to maintain this as one of the banner schools of this city and Dufferin was most fortunate in having for her Principal a man of keen intellect, broad sympathies, tact, and resourcefulness, and a provincial, if not a national, reputation as

an educator. Mr. Doan retired in June, 1914, after fifty-six years and ahalf of active service to his country as one of her foremost Public School teachers, and thousands of Canada's best citizens gratefully remember their school days under Mr. Doan.

The present headmaster, Mr. N. S. MacDonald, B.A., comes to Dufferin with a well-earned reputation and the

people of this district may look to the future with the assurance that the good name of Dufferin School will be strongly upheld. Mr. MacDonald was born and educated at Bowmanville, Durham County. He taught in the rural schools of Durham for a number of years, then attended the Ontario Normal College, Hamilton, in 1899, was Principal of Richmond Hill Public School for one year, and joined the teaching staff of Toronto in 1900. He was assistantmaster in Ryerson School for six years, Principal of Duke Street School for three years, of Cottingham Street for one year, and of Bolton Avenue for four years. He is a graduate of Queen's University, Kingston, His educational attainments. energy and enthusiasm mark him as a man well qualified to fill the highest position a School Board may offer.

Lord Dufferin took a personal interest in his namesake, and after his death in 1902, Lady Dufferin presented the Dufferin medal, the guardianship of which is awarded each year to a member of the graduating class. This medal was the last of a number Lord Dufferin had struck for the universities of India while he was Vice-Roy of that part of our Empire. Through the interest and generosity of the Dufferin Old Boys' Association, a medal, as nearly as possible a replica of the Dufferin medal, is presented as the personal property of the medalist. Lady Dufferin still continues to take a personal interest in the school that her late illustrious husband was pleased to honor.



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
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
