BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

CHAPTER I.

Of the Corporation.

1. This Corporation is called "THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA."
2. Its object is to educate Ministers for the Congregational Churches of Canada, and the other Provinces of British North America.
3. All who contribute one dollar annually to the funds of the College are members of the Corporation, and entitled to a voice in the management of its affairs.
4. A Regular Meeting of the Corporation is held annually, for the reception of the report of the retiring Directors, the election of a new Board, and the transaction of other necessary business.
5. The Annual Meeting is held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada.
6. Special Meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business, on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, signed by, at least, twenty members of the Corporation. Provided always that no such Special Meeting be held without two months' public notice thereof, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Directors.

CHAPTER II.

Of the Board of Directors.

1. The Board of Directors is elected from members of the Corporation, and consists of a Chairman, Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and not less than ten, nor more than fifteen other members, who hold office for one year, but are eligible for re-election.
2. Five members of the Board form a Quorum.
3. The functions and the duties of the Board are :—The oversight and management of the affairs of the College during their year of office ; and on the expiration of the same, to present a Report of their proceedings, as well as of the general condition of the College, to the Corporation at its Annual Regular Meeting, or such other times as the Corporation may require.

4. The proceedings of the Board of Directors are subject to the sanction of the Corporation, and are regulated by By-laws, which may be enacted, amended, or repealed at any Annual Meeting.

5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation, may be filled by the Board, as soon after their occurrence as it may see fit. Provided always, that no such appointments be made without a vote of, at least, a majority of the members of the Board.

CHAPTER III.

Of the Professors.

1. The Professors receive their appointment from the Corporation ; or, in exceptional cases, from the Board of Directors, subject to the approval of the Corporation.

2. Their duties and their salaries are determined by such regulations as the Corporation may from time to time ordain in that behalf.

3. The Professors constitute a Faculty of Theology and, as such, are entrusted with the educational department of the College, subject to the sanction and control of the Board of Directors.

4. In cases of Discipline, the Faculty may admonish, or reprimand a Student, or prohibit his attendance on the classes, preliminary to reporting him to the Board to be further dealt with.

5. The Faculty are required to make regular reports of their proceedings to the Board.

CHAPTER IV.

Of Candidates for Admission.

1. Every Candidate for admission into the College must present to the Directors the testimony of the Church of which he is a member, respecting his piety and apparent suitableness to the work of the Ministry, together with a written statement of the grounds of his own conviction that he is called of God to that work, and of his views of Christian doctrine and Church government.

2. Candidates for admission to the Full Course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination in the McGill University.

3. Candidates who are graduates of any University, or who can satisfy the Board that they are otherwise possessed of sufficient acquirements, may be at once admitted to the Theological Course. Also, as exceptional cases, such candidates may be admitted to that course as it may be expedient, in the judgment of the Directors, to train as preachers, without the ordinary literary culture.

4. Approved Candidates are received on a probation of four months, at the close of which, if the result of their probation be satisfactory, they are admitted to the Full Course.

CHAPTER V.
Of the Students.

1. Students are, during their Literary Course, under the general supervision of the Theological Professors, and take such subjects in the Theological Department as the Board may direct.

2. The Students, both in the Literary and the Theological Department, are required to attend exclusively to the studies approved by the Board.

3. Every Student, on his admission into the College, is required to sign a declaration of obedience and consent to the By-laws and Regulations of the College.

4. Students are allowed to live with such families only as are approved by the Board of Directors. Changes of abode must be promptly notified to the Secretary of the College.

5. Attendance upon the classes in the College and the use of the Library is allowed without charge to the students. Aid may also be granted to them from its funds, to meet the expense of board:—the amount of such aid to be fixed at the beginning of each Session.

6. As a part of their preparation for their future work, the Students, under the sanction of the Directors, preach the Gospel, as they have opportunity.

7. Every Student, when admitted into the College, on the expiration of the term of his probation, is required to procure a formal dismissal from the Church to which he formerly belonged and, without delay, to obtain admission into a Congregational Church in the place in which the College may be. Such dismissal and admission must be reported by him to the Board. Furthermore, he is expected to be as regular as possible in his attendance upon the services, ordinances and Church meetings of the Church to which he belongs during his College course.

8. Students are not allowed, during their College course, to enter into the marriage relationship, without the knowledge and consent of the Board of Directors.

9. Students who leave the College without obtaining the official sanction and discharge of the Board, are required to refund to the College the amount expended by it for their education.

10. Churches who desire the services of Students with the view of permanent settlement in the Pastorate, or otherwise, are requested to communicate with the Board, through the Secretary.

CHAPTER VI.

Of the Course of Study and Examinations.

1. The Full Course of Study extends over five Sessions, and is divided into a Literary Course of two Sessions, and a Theological Course of three Sessions.

2. In the Theological Department, the course of study includes the Original Languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Systematic and Pastoral Theology, Church History, Homiletics, and Exegesis of the Greek Testament, with such other accessory subjects as the Board of Directors may from time to time appoint.

3. In the Theological Course, the Students are examined, at the close of each session, in all the subjects of the year. The examinations are conducted by Examiners (among whom the Theological Professors are included) chosen by the Board of Directors, and by means of printed questions and written answers to the same. Those who pass are arranged according to their Proficiency, as 1st Class, 2nd Class, and 3rd Class. If a student fail to pass in any subject, he is required to undergo a Supplemental Examination in the same. The results of these Sessional Examinations are recorded by the Board, and reported to the Corporation at the Annual Meeting.

4. The Session in the Theological Department begins on the second Wednesday in October, and ends on the second Wednesday in April.

5. The professors are at liberty to hold, during the Session, such Class Examinations as they may deem necessary, either in the manner aforesaid or orally.

6. In the Literary Course, Students are required to pass such examinations as may be appointed by the Faculty of Arts of the McGill University.* The Board of Directors are required to obtain from the said Faculty of Arts a Report of the Examinations of the Students in the several subjects thereof, and also of their attendance and conduct during the Session in the University, and to present the same to the Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

CHAPTER VII.

General Regulations.

1. In reference to matters not provided for in the foregoing By-laws, the Directors may act according to their discretion:—subject always to the approval of the Corporation at any Regular Meeting.

2. Alterations may be made in the By-Laws and Regulations, or new ones added, by any Annual Regular Meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such alterations or addition has been given at the meeting next preceding.

* The subjects of examination for entrance into the First Year of the Full Course are Classics, Mathematics and English.

In Classics.—Latin Grammar, Greek Grammar, and one easy Latin and one easy Greek author. The authors recommended are:—Caesar; Sallust; Virgil (*Aeneid*, B. I.); Xenophon (*Anabasis*, B. I.); Homer (*Iliad*, B. I.)

In Mathematics.—Arithmetic; Algebra, to Simple Equations inclusive; Euclid's Elements, Books I., II., III.

In English.—Writing from dictation.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

Congregational College of British North America,

1869.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA was held at Montreal, on Friday, June 11, 1869.

1. On motion, J. G. ROBERTSON, Esq., M. P. P., was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. J. A. R. DICKSON, Secretary of the Meeting. The Rev. A. J. PARKER, offered prayer.

2. The Secretary of the College read the Report of the Board of Directors, and in the absence of the Treasurer, the Report of the Finances for the past year.

3. Moved by the Secretary; seconded by the Rev. E. J. SHERRILL, and resolved:—

That the Report now read be adopted and printed for circulation, and that the following gentlemen be the Board of Directors for the ensuing year.

Chairman, Rev. Henry Wilkes, D.D.; *Treasurer*, Mr. James P. Clark; *Secretary*, Rev. George Cornish, M.A.; *Directors*, Revs. A. Lillie, D.D., F. H. Marling, K. M. Fenwick, A. Duff, Alex. Macdonald, Ed. Ebbs; Messrs. C. Alexander, Henry Lyman, W. S. Goodhugh, James Baylis, P. W. Wood, H. Vennor, Wm. J. Patterson, J. O. Beers, Theo. Lyman. And that Messrs. J. B. Learmont and Robt. Mills, be requested to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

4. Moved by the Rev. EDWARD EBBS; seconded by the Rev. ROBT. PARSONS; and resolved:—

That this meeting desires to give expression to the strong conviction it entertains of the necessity that exists, especially at the present period of the world's history, for a Ministry of sound religious belief, and thorough intellectual and literary culture; and it respectfully urges the churches to a constant and ever-growing interest in the efforts of the College to provide such a Ministry.

5. Moved by the Rev. JOHN WOOD; seconded by the Rev. A. MCGREGOR; and resolved:—

That this meeting, whilst recording its gratitude for the prosperity of the College during the past Session, humbly acknowledges that without the help and favour of Almighty God, the work of man is vain and, therefore, it requests the churches, as heretofore, to observe the second Sunday in October as a day of special prayer that the Divine blessing and guidance may attend all the operations of the College during the coming Session.

6. Moved by the Rev. ROBERT WILSON; seconded by the Rev. A. DUFF; and resolved:—

That the cordial thanks of this Corporation be given to the Colonial Missionary Society, for the large and valuable pecuniary assistance rendered by it to the College during the past year.

The Rev. Henry Wilkes, D. D., closed the meeting with prayer and the benediction.

REPORT FOR SESSION 1868-69.

The Session with whose history the Report now to be submitted to you deals, was the thirtieth in the life of this Institution. And it affords your Board great pleasure to be able to report that, in its general results, it compares favourably with the most successful and satisfactory of all its predecessors. The session was opened and finished by public services held in Zion Church which were of a practical and devotional character, and at which, by invitation, the Revs. E. Ebbs and K. M. Fenwick gave valuable addresses to the Students. Good health has been enjoyed by professors and students and the work of all the classes has been carried on without interruption.

At the opening of the Session seven candidates presented themselves for admission, of whom six were received on probation; the seventh, on the ground of his youth, was recommended to defer his application for another year. There have, therefore, been ten in regular attendance, whose standing is indicated by the following table:—

This list furnishes the gratifying fact of an increase of four as compared with the number of last year. Messrs. Hindley and W. M. Peacock have completed their course of study, and have

received the usual certificate to that fact. They leave the College with the best wishes of your Board for their future usefulness and success in the work to which they have devoted themselves.

In consequence of want of preparation on the part of certain of the students, Dr. Lillie kindly offered to form a class for instruction in Elementary Classics, and your Board gladly availed themselves of his help. This class met three times a week, and the students attending it made satisfactory progress in the subjects of study. The thanks of the Corporation are due to Dr. Lillie for the good service rendered to the College by this additional work voluntarily undertaken by him.

The Professors report on the work of the several classes as follows :—

(1) *In Theology and Church History.*—Dr. Lillie reports :—

The subjects of study in my department during the Session just ended have been :—the Evidences of Christianity ; the Church and its Ordinances ; Old Testament Introduction ; and the History of the Church from A. D. 1296 to the close of the Reformation. On the first, 13 Lectures were delivered ; on the second, 23 ; on the third, 16 ; and on the last, 41 ;—in all 93.

It affords me pleasure to report favourably of the application, the progress, and the conduct of the Students, whose future will, I trust, prove honourable to themselves, satisfactory to the friends of the College, and beneficial to the Churches.

(2) *In Homiletics and Pastoral Theology.*—Dr. Wilkes reports :—

The Class has been composed of three senior Students and four of the First Year. A gentleman not in the College took part in its exercises during half the Session. The intention was to make the work preliminary for the First Year Students, that they might have some aid in their summer work of preaching, but two of them elected to take the regular Examinations with the senior, and, as will be seen by the table of results, they have acquitted themselves well. The attendance, attention and conduct of all have been throughout exemplary, and they have exhibited a spirit in relation to their future work indicative of a willingness to make sacrifices when needful in their Master's service. The alternate days of meeting have been devoted to exercises in Sermons, Plans of Sermons and Homilies, and to criticism upon them. The result has inspired me with much hope as to their future standing and course.

It is due to Mr. W. M. Peacock to explain that no one has excelled him in class exercises, and that had he been admitted to examination, he must have ranked equal with any ; but because of the state of his health, I joined with the other members of the Faculty in a refusal so to admit him.

This report would be incomplete without a simple notice of the fact that owing to the special circumstances of two of the Students, and for the benefit of the gentleman above mentioned as not in the College, I formed a class early in the Session for the Study of the Elements of Intellectual Philosophy; to whom I gave twenty lectures, and who regularly furnished me with brief Essays on the points brought before them. This department is in the competent hands of Professor, the Venerable Archdeacon Leach, but these gentlemen from various causes could not avail themselves of his prelections.

(3) *In Greek Testament Exegesis.*—Professor Cornish reports:—

The Class has met regularly once a week throughout the Session. The first nine chapters of the Gospel by St. Matthew have been read in the original tongue, with critical and doctrinal exegesis. I gladly bear testimony to the diligence, careful preparation, successful attention, and regularity of attendance shown by the Students in this Department of their Studies.

In the Literary course, Messrs. McGregor, Claris and Allworth hold the rank of undergraduates in the University, and have regularly attended the classes and passed the examinations proper to their respective years in McGill College.

The Report of the Treasurer sets forth the state of the Finances. The receipts from all sources amount to \$2775.93; and the expenditure to \$2775.37. Thus there remains a surplus on the accounts of the past year of \$00.56, which deducted from \$234.77, the deficit on account of 1867-68, leaves a balance of \$234.21 now due the Treasurer. The Committee of the Colonial Missionary Society have, with their wonted liberality, granted the sum of £235, stg., or \$1138.45 towards the current expences of the College, and several of the Churches have made a material advance on their previous contributions; but there are a large number from which no contributions, at all are received. It is desirable that some means should be devised for exciting these churches to feel an interest in the work and prosperity of the College, but your Board confess that they have no new suggestions to offer on this point. Should you, their constituents, be able to adopt any plan, they will do their best to carry it into operation. In the absence of any endowment, it is of the greatest moment to the efficiency of the Institution that there should be an annual income at least sufficient to meet its expenditure. And in this expenditure the purchase of books for the enlargement and improvement of the Library ought to be provided for; a thing which has of necessity been kept in abeyance for some time past, so that works which are really necessary are not to be found on the shelves. This matter is here specially adverted to, because it is one that specially needs attention.

In the expenditure of the next Session there will be a reduction of at least \$250 in the items of rent, fitting up of class-room and library, and College-fees; but this reduction will be probably more than counterbalanced by the increased number of Students that will be in attendance. For your Board cannot as yet bring themselves to recommend the policy of declining applications for admission, now that these are becoming more numerous, because of the lack of funds: such an issue they would regard with unmingled pain as being in the highest degree detrimental to the best interests of both the Churches and the College. Without a ministry of education and culture combined, of course, with earnest piety, our Church-polity can hardly have its place or do its proper work
