SOME WORKMEN OUT AT BLACK'S HARBOR
Local sardine fishermen heard yesterday that there was a strike on at the sardine factory of Connors Brothers Black's Harbor, the men demanding \$2.50 a day. A member of the firm, however, informed The Telegraph last night that there were only a few men on strike and that this did not in any way interfere with the usual work of the factory. He said that the men in question went out after demanding a higher rate of wages, but that the usual buying of the factory was carried on yesterday.

Regarding the general sardine situation at the present time he said that the outlook was very bright and the catch was about the same as last year, when the sardine fishermen had a very good season. The war had not affected the general conditions of the market to any extent and the work was being carried on with the rapidity and dispatch which usually characterize this industry. Prices remain at from \$10 to \$12 a hoghead. The labor trouble, he believed, would not affect his firm in any serious degree and the dissatisfaction existed for the most part with a minority of the employees.—Telegraph, June 20.

A SCHOLAR'S LETTERS FROM THE FRONT

NOT once but many times in reading the letters of young men who have lost their lives for England's sake we have felt that such deaths as theirs have a splendor which really survives the form of death. Never before has the youth of the world been brought into such an intimate relation with Death and thoughts of Death; and it is wonderful to recognize how happily and calmly boys who in ordinary circumstances would have been only on the threshold of their careers, face the great Fear. They reason with themselves, but they would soon be parted with death. What does one imagine more harrowing in the abstract than the early death by violence of a youth endowed with great brains, who has acquired a taste of learning and scholarship and who shows taste, humor and enthusiasm in everything he says and does? The waste of such a death! And yet if one thinks again and further, it is seen that the record such men leave behind in their simple and memory is really more important than that of ordinary souls, and that it is for the extent of their death in the better world while. If the scholar-soldier has written letters in the time of great stress, and leaves something truly precious. He helps others to see that death is, after all, a white and impotent assailant of man's spirit. The ordinary man, but as yet he touches the hearts and nerves the bodies of the others who follow. A boy fresh from Oxford or Cambridge who has not thought of soldiering as a career, but who finds himself in the clash of arms in this war, has a better chance than the professional soldier of seeing with the eyes of enthusiasm. Not of course, that the professional soldier is not an enthusiastic and more conscientious than that of the Army. But the amateur, temporarily introduced into the profession, comes with a freshness of perception and interest to most men who are viewing familiar things.

THE BROKEN SOLDIER

THE broken soldier sings and whistles day to dark. He's but the remnant of a man, maimed and half blind; but the soul they could not harm going like the lark. Like the incarnate joy that will not be confined. The Lady at the Hall has given him a light task; He works in the garden as busy as a bee; One hand is but a stump, and his face a pitted mask; He runs through the garden singing like a bird set free. Whistling and singing like a linnet on a wing. The others stop to listen, leaning on a spade; Who men and comely, they fret at little things. The soul of his singing like a thrush in a grass. Hither and thither hopping like Robin on the green. The soul of the broken man is beautiful and brave; And while he weeds the garden and the bright hours pass. The bird caught in the cage whistles the joyous strain. —Katharine Tynan, in Westminster Gazette.

CROP REPORTS

Issued, June 13, 1916.—A press bulletin issued today by the Census and Statistics Office of the usual preliminary estimate of crop areas sown to grain crops in Canada, and the condition of these crops as reported by correspondents on May 31. The reports show that heavy spring rains in late May and early June throughout the Dominion have in many places made it difficult to work the land. In eastern Canada seeding at the end of May was considerably behindhand, especially in the west of the province, where wheat in Canada this year will be sown in part of the west of the province. According to the preliminary estimates of correspondents, made in many instances before the completion of seeding wheat in Canada this year will occupy a total area of 11,491,600 acres. This is 1,494,800 acres, or 11.5 per cent below the record of last year, when 12,986,400 acres were harvested, but 1,197,700 acres were sown to wheat for 1916 is placed at 2,904,400 acres, as compared with 3,342,900 acres last year, in Saskatchewan it is 5,889,100 acres, as against 6,838,100 acres, and in Alberta 1,677,700 acres, as against 1,663,700 acres.
