FRENCH SENATOR DOES GOOD WORK IN ATHENS

Solution of Greek Problem is Being Rapidly Approached by M. Tonnart, Representative of the Entente

Paris June 13.-The vigor with which the French Senator, M. Jonnart, on special mission to Athens as the representative of France, Great Britain, and Russia, has begun the difficult task of settling the Greek problem, has caused the liveliest satisfaction here. Before he sailed, ten days ago, Senator Jonnart obtained absolute authority to act as he considered best. The action in granting such authority was endorsed by the Russian Government. Senator Jonnarts' high character and abilities, his fine record as a diplomat and administrator, and the free hand given him led French opinion to expect effective action, but that he should have so rapidly and easily eliminated the chief stumbling block of the entente allies in the Levant, came as a most agreeable surprise. That he will succeed in helping Greece to get on her feet again in the shortest possible time, notwithstanding many difficulties which still remain, is the unanimous opinion. The Saloniki expedition has been attacked by many in France as useless, but every one is agreed that the force once there ought to be given every opportunity to accomplish its purpose. It was admitted that with the perpetual menace of a stab in the back from the Greek Royalist army that the expeditionary force was doomed to partial inaction. Encouraged by the moderation of the entente allies whose overpatient policy was attributed largely here to the opposition of the later Russian regime, to strong measures, Constantine eluded most of the guarantees extracted from his during June and December of last year, and continued his intrigue with Germany. The blockade alone kept him from active hostility. If he could get the Thessaly corps into his hands not only the Entente allies lost a weapon, but he turned the tables by adding considerably to the difficulties of the Venizelist forces, who counted on gaining a part of the corp.

M. Jonnart after a series of rapid consultations with the Entente allied ministers and with the Greek Premier Alexander Zaimist, decided upon quick and drastic action and proceeded to Saloniki where he arranged with General Sarrail for military assistance.

The following official statement was issued: "Lord French, (Commander of the home defences) reports that about fifteen hostile airplanes were heard crossing the Essex coast, passing in the vicinity of The Nore (part of the estuary of the Thames,) at about 11 a.m. They proceeded in the direction of London, separating when they had covered about half the distance.

"The east end of London has been attacked and bombed, but no reports have yet been received of casualties or damage done. Anti-aircraft guns of the London defenses have been in action. A large number of airplanes are still up in pursuit."

(Editorial in N. Y. World): What is said to be going on in Russia is what the Prussian war machine planned also for the United States. It filled the country with spies, bribe givers and conspirators; denied our right to neutrality; beguiled an element of our citizenship from its true allegiance; carried on a seditious political agitation against our government; levied war upon our in-dustry and commerce; sought to em-

broil us with Mexico and Japan and, because these undertakings failed. impudently warned us off the seas on pain of death. Conditions in Russia have been more favorable to German propaganda of this kind, and we see the results in open defiance of authority, military disaffection and industrial and agrarian revolt. A Russian democracy reduced to anarchy and even-tually self-slain would be a greater

triumph for Prussian autocracy than any of which it boasts upon the bat-tlefield. America stood the test, but any of which it boasts upon the battlefield. America stood the test, but we shall not know for some time yet what the fate of the newest republic is to be.

Mili-tarism's broken pledges, its disre-gard of every humane consideration that stood in its way, its avowed purpose to reduce the earth to sub-jection, enforcing its hideous concep-tions of Kultur especially upon weak democracies—all these have been forgotten by every man foolish

GIVES AMERICA PLAN Engineer Chemist, Home on Visit, Tells of War Time Research Work

Woodstock, June 12 .- The discovery of a new element in the air, analogous in many respects to elecanalogous in many respects to electricity, and like electricity, having a universal field of application, has resulted in the development of a method dealing with the submarine menace which has proved very effective, according to Dan Murphy, a Woodstock boy, who is visiting his father and sister in the city, en route from Washington, where as the discoverer of this new force, he has been consulting with government officials in

sulting with government officials in Washington, to his home in Idaho. Mr. Murphy left Woodstock about scientific

research and regular ranching.

He states that the nature of his research in connection with the new power has for obvious reasons been kept a secret, but that, while it has been developed so far only in an elementary degree, even such progress is sufficient to indicate tremendous possibilities.
