Mr. R. A. Pringle, K. C., the Paper Controller of Canada, "2. Discontinue sending paper within three months after date of expiration of subscription, unless the subscription is renewed and paid for."

The Ulster Unionist Council has recently replied to a few of Mr. de Valera assertions that he makes at every opportunity regarding the sitevery opportunity regarding the sit-uation in Ireland. Now it is the con-tention of Mr. de Valera and the Sinn Fein party that, in the phrase of a famous ballad, "the shamrock is by law forbid to grow on Irish ground." But then Mr. de Valera is a political Rip Van Winkle, and shares with Wather McMahon the innocent im-Rip Van Winkle, and shares with Father McMahon the innocent impression that these little eccentricities are wrought by statute. As a matter of fact, as the Unionist Council points out, two-thirds of the entire soil of Ireland has passed into the hands of peasant proprietors, so that at least two-thirds is still open to the growth of the shamrock, a fact which that desperately energetic agriculturist, the Irish peasant getic agriculturist, the Irish peasant, is not unmindful of. Now the purchase money for this land revolution was supplied by what Lord Rosebery calls the "predominant partner" and, Mr. de Valera, "the brutal Saxon," and supplied upon terms of the utmost liberality. No doubt Mr. de Valera could draw a moral from this. for Mr. de Valera, when it comes to finance, is about as practical as Mr. Micawber, only it is to be doubted

from care to Wilkins of that ilk. An example of what might be achieved by an Irish exchequer, presided over by Mr. de Valera, may be seen in his declaration that the present income of Ireland is sufficient to support itself unaided, and to maintain an army and a navy. The only thing that Mr. de Valera omits to point out is that this calculation is based on the income of Ireland during the present war, on a basis of taxation that would successfully bankrupt the country, if anyone were foolish enough to attempt to maintain it as a normal condition. As it is, the great mass of Ireland's income comes from Ulster, and this explains why it is that the south is so virtuously determined that the

Home Rule bill shall include Ulster. Well, the reasons are very simple and they may be stated in terms sterling. Ulster pays in customs and revenue rather more than twice as much as the whole of the rest of Ireland. Belfast itself is the third port in the whole United Kingdom, and trade of the United Kingdom. Ulster owns three and a half times more shipping than all the rest of Ireland combined. It produces forty-eight per cent. of Irish oats, forty-one per cent. of Irish potatoes, fifty-three per cent. of Irish fruit, ninety-nine per cent. of Irish dax, and this go on indefinitely. Therefore, when Mr. de Valera talks of the down-trodden and overtaxed Irish peasant, he is perhaps wise in omitting to mention that the bulk of the taxation is borne by Ulster, and that part of Ulster, in particular, which is adamantine in its adherence to the union. And then again, Ulster has another excellent reason for not being ambitious of entering the Home Rule parliament, and it is this, that Ulster does not particularly wish to pay the poor rates for the rest of Ireland, and that for the all-sufficient Ireland, and that for the all-sufficient reason that the rate of pauperism in Belfast is \$2 per 10,000, in Dublin 270 per 10,000, and, as the line inclines further south, 284 per 10,000 in Cork and Waterford. But perhaps the most delightful example of overtaxed Ireland may be found in the fact that in Belfast, which is the stronghold of Unionism and Protestantism, the Roman Catholic Nationalists contribute £18,000 a year in rates and receive £53,789 in salaries. rates and receive £53,789 in salaries. Is it any wonder then that Mr. de Valera should himself have announced, at Ballaghadereen, only a year ago, that "Ulster must be coerced if she stands in the way," and a little later, at Cootehill, that if she persisted in being a British garrison, she would have to be kicked out. It is not surprising, then, that

It is not surprising, then, that when the Ulster Council is told that the Orange bodies are intolerant, and that they have nothing to fear from the tolerant brothers of the south, they do not take the trouble to argue so much as to quote figures. The Roman Catholic population of Ulster is 690,134 and it has 112 represenkoman Catholic population of Ulster is 690,134 and it has 112 representatives on County Councils. The Profestant population is 886,363 and it has 123 representatives, which means that the percentage of Roman Catholic representatives is greater than that of Protestants, though the balance of population is heavily on the side of the Protestants. Now turn to Connaught: there are 228 County Councillors in Connaught, not one of whom is a Unionist. In Munster there are 228 County Councillors, only one of whom is a Unionist. Whilst in Leinster gut of 335 County County Councillors, 12 are Unionists, drawn from one particular quarter where Unionists predominate.

Is it any particular wonder, then, that the Ulsterites regard an Irish republic, presided over by a gentleman of Mr. de Valera's political foresight and financial acumen, as a trifle hazardous, as, indeed, something which might very easily mature into a glorified Donnybrook?

Washington, Nov 10.—William Hohenzollern has arrived in Holland and is proceeding to the town of Deisteeg, near Utrecht, according to a despatch received by the American staff to-day from The Hague.

"Press reports state that the Kaiser arrived this morning in Maastricht, Holland, and is proceeding to Middachten Castle in the town of Diesteeg, near Utrecht."

SIGNED FOR EMPIRE'S GOOD.

London, Nov. 10.—(2.04 p.m.)—Emperor William signed a letter of abdication on Saturday morning at the German grand headquarters in the presence of Crown Prince Frederick William and Field Marsh al Hindenburg, according to a despatch.





CAPETERIA SYNTEM FOR HOGS.
Much of the drudgery is taken out of hog feeding by the use of the salt-leeder. According to investigations carried on at the Experimental Farm at Ottawa, hogs, after they have reached a certain age, do better when fed in this way provided the proper mixtures are used. Strange to say, when properly bandled, dangerous and wasteful over-feeding is not so likely to occur with the self-feeder as when meals are given at stated hours. It has been shown that the hogs are the best judges of when they should take food. The feeder is fully described in special circular No 15 obtainable at the office of the Publication Branch of the Deparment of Agriculture at Ottawa. This bin-like receptacle is easily made at a cost of about \$10 even when new lumber is used in its construction.




