## Provide Shelter for all Farm Tools.

Tool protection especially requires considerable room, more than some farmers can easily provide. The farmer who is able to own a large tool shed can run his implements in it at the end of the season and leave them there until he wants them again next season. But the farmer who feels that he is not able to own a shed for his implements must do a little planning in order to get all of them out of the weather. He can and should utilize all the space he has by planning to store his implements in as little space as possible.

Some of the machines may be taken apart and thus stored in a very small space. Those that cannot be taken apart easily must be run together as closely as possible. The hay rake may be condensed by removing the wheels and tongue; the mower can be placed in close quarters by taking off the tongue and sickle bar. The spike tooth harrow can be taken apart and hung upon a wall with railroad spikes.

The corn planter and the cultivator will require much room if disassembled. It is often quite a job to fit room for the binder, but by taking off the reel and bundle carrier the space needed for this machine may be much lessened. An effort should be made to get the binder under shelter by all means as the elements will quickly play havoc with this complicated implement.

Often there is considerable room in the barn lot that may be utilized for the storing of plows and those tools which have been taken apart. When implements are oiled or greased, taken apart and packed away, try to place the parts together so that you can get them out without having to move the pieces you will not need till late in the season.

In the wagon-shed or driveway, or in any shed for storing tools, a system of ropes and self locking pulleys can be used to good advantage to lift some of the tools out of the way. The wagon boxes, hay racks or hog racks may thus be removed out of the way and they can be raised or lowered easily directly on the wagon.

Sometimes a farmer will permit good tools to go unused because he does not realize that he has the shelter.

We know several farms on which there are one or more old sheds filled with nothing but old worthless rubbish, while the farming implements stand in the fields. By clearing the rubbish out, and then repairing the leaking roofs and replacing loose boards so as to make the sheds dry, these old buildings would become valuable, considering the use to which they could be put. A tool house does not need to be so well constructed as stock buildings, as the question of warmth need not be considered. A tool shed needs to be very dry, of course. A good dry floor can be made by hauling a few loads of cinders.

## Workers or Shirkers?

Those dairy farmers who are carefully noting the total production of each of their cows for the season are finding some curious differences. For instance, in one Ontario herd the yield of a year old grade that freshened March 5th was 4,083 pounds of milk up to the end of July; her stable mate, also a year old, freshened March 18th, receiving the same feed and care, gave only 2,970 pounds of milk. Over half a ton of milk in that short period indicates a considerable difference in income between the two cows.

In another herd at the same factory between two six-year-olds that calved April 9th and 4th, there is a difference of 1,400 pounds of milk and 60 pounds of fat up to the end of July. This means between fourteen and fifteen dollars that one cow earned more than the other. Are your cows workers or shirkers? The finest fresh fruit and vegetables (in February) were so cheap that they were not sold in quantity. You got all you wanted for so much per week. All I required for my house hold cost me one shilling weekly. An American resident of Antioch told me that he and his family lived comfortably on thirty-five pounds a year."

## New Immigration Regulations.

It is understood that the government has decided to discourage the immigration from the Old Country of skilled workmen, excepting in cases where these immigrants come to fill places vacant from lack of such workers, and to bend special efforts toward bringing out of farm laborers. This policy is timely and should prove beneficial.

At the same time, a danger might be pointed out. Unless only those of experience and training in agriculture work are secured, the result may be to work on a farm is encouraged to come to Canada, and care is not taken to see that these immigrants are placed on farms, this country may be flooded with a more undesirable class of people, who will tend to flock to the cities and become something of a burden. The qualifications for work on the farm are not particularly specialized.

By this time, it is well established that Canadians are not prejudiced against immigrants from the Old Country, and equally well established that undesirable immigrants who single with the crowd coming from the Old Country need look for no special consideration because of that fact. The work of securing farm laborers would appear to call for special care so that no increase may be noted in the arrival of the least useful class of immigrant.

## Short Slumbers are the Best.

French physicians are claiming wonders for the benefits which result from sleeping in doses. Too long continued sleep has a tendency to stupify rather than to strengthen while a shorter sleep, repeated at intervals through the twenty-four hours, has a much more stimulating effect.

Experiments have been made on patients in the free hospitals and clinics who were suffering from mental depression and physical exhaustion. They were allowed to sleep for three hours and then stay awake for four, eight and ten hours, and then awake for four, and so on through the twenty-four hours, and their recovery was found to be far more rapid and satisfactory than that of those who slept for long periods and then were awake for correspondingly greater lengths of time.

If this fact becomes universally recognized and established as a truth there is no prophesying what strange results may occur for all people decide to sleep in such spasmodic snatches there will have to be considerable change in all business arrangements.—Chicago Tribune.

## Life Indications on Mars.

Investigations recently conducted upon an elaborate scale at the great observatory of Flagstaff, Ariz., proved to the satisfaction of many astronomers that the network of canals on the planet Mars is evidence of mighty effort on the part of the Martians to preserve the fast diminishing supply of water. It is welcome news that the post office officials who are preparing the details of the extended parcel post system which we hope to see in vogue next January, are considering providing facilities for selling eggs, butter and poultry through the mails.

There should be no insurmountable difficulty in the way of arranging this and it would be well worth arranging providing many difficulties to accomplish it. It would enable the townspeople to get these necessary commodities straight from the farmer's house at a price which is now beyond his dreams. It would in this way not only reduce the cost of living but improve the quality. The farmer would benefit also, as with some enterprise he could easily obtain a steady clientele which would put him beyond the necessity of worrying about the fluctuations and idiosyncrasies of the market.

### Trade With England.

Canadian manufacturers should be embarrassed by the suggestion that they should advocate free trade with Great Britain. It is true that the Old Country keeps its ports open to Canada. But it also gives free admission to the products and manufactures of the United States and of every other country.

Fiscally Great Britain does us no wrong while we give exceptional advantages to British manufacturers in Canada. According to the Laurier Government we have maintained the British preference in the expectation that Great Britain would give Canadian products a preference in British markets. Indeed, the Laurier Government told British Ministers that failing such preference, Canada would feel free to act as conditions seemed to require.

We cannot afford to assist the Mother Country to maintain the ruinous policy of free trade while other nations have high tariffs. Great Britain has no basis on which to demand freer trade with Canada until she gives Canadian products preferential treatment over the products of foreign countries. Canada first within the Empire is a sound policy for Canadians and no one should be deluded by the pretence that some consideration of loyalty requires us to accept a fiscal policy in which the mass of Canadians do not believe.

### Donning Male Costume.

Several cases have occurred recently of women donning male dress for the sake of greater freedom of action and being paid at a man's rate for their work. This is precisely such a development as might be expected of the movement for what is termed 'the emancipation of woman.' The feminine mind possesses a fearful courage in pushing logical deductions to their ultimate end. No material consequences or ugly facts seem to daunt her. Hence if woman is to abandon her sheltered nest and risk the loss of her peculiar privileges in an effort to make a place for herself in the work-a-day world beside man, she will be very certain to ask eventually why she should be hampered by distinctive or inconvenient forms of dress, and why she should not get equal pay for equal work, even if she must disguise herself in male costume to receive an unjust employer.

We have still a law against this of masquerading in the dress of the opposite sex; but presently that law will become one of the brutal injustices which arrogant man inflicts upon, on helpless women—and we shall probably be ashamed of it. It was a very menacing Pandora's box which was upset when the hand that rocked the cradle reached out for the plough handle. ### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.  
Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.  
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.  
A homesteader who has exhausted his pre-emption right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased unoccupied in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

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
