New York, Feb. 25.—Advises from Mexico state that the Mexican Government has recognized the English and Spanish debts, and that a sinking fund has been created for the redemption of converted bonds.

London, Feb. 25.—Rev. Mr. Speke, brother of the well known African explorer, whose mysterious disappearance caused much excitement and comment, has brought a verdict containing a charge of murder against McKay.

London, Feb. 25.—In the House of Lords, this afternoon, at the conclusion of the Earl of Malabar's announcement, Mr. D'Israeli tendered his resignation to the Queen on account of continued ill health, and that Her Majesty had been pleased to call upon the present Chancellor of the Exchequer, Benjamin Disraeli, to form a new Cabinet.

London, Feb. 25.—It is thought that Mr. D'Israeli will resign his position as Chancellor of the Exchequer, and that Sir Stafford Northcote will take his place. No one is yet named as the probable successor of the latter.

London, Feb. 25.—The London Times of this morning, commenting on a change in the Cabinet, says Lord Derby's resignation was a foregone conclusion, so that the announcement of his resignation was not a surprise.

London, March 1.—His Majesty, Louis, King of Bavaria, died yesterday. He was only 23 years old. In the case of Gen. Nagle, now on trial at Sligo, on the charge of Fenianism, the motion for delay of trial, made by Mr. Heron, counsel for the defence, was refused.
