EARTHQUAKE IN ENGLAND.

On Tuesday morning the shock of an earthquake—doubtless the lighter vibration from some serious but remote convulsion—was felt with more or less severity, throughout Liverpool and the whole of this district. The time—about which all parties are pretty nearly agreed—was half-past four o'clock; and the shock was accompanied, according to several of our informants, by a rambling roise. The sensations for the most part experienced were these :—the chaking or acciding of dourse, the raising and undulating of beds, the clasticing of moreoble articles, the banging of doors, and the rattling of window-frames. In general, there was a sort of opheaving, followed by a quick ribration, similar to the shock a ship experiences when strack by a beary sen; and then, as it were, staggering and trembling from the concussion. One gentleman, residing in Birtenhead, describes it as though a giant had entered his chamber, and suiging a post in either hand, given his bed a thorough shaking for a minute or so, and vanished. The impression of another, who lives in Claughton-park, and whose house has averbean affected by the heaviest gales, was that he had been awekered by some of the servants jumping with all their weight upon the floor above.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Reporters' Gallery was thrown open at half-past 1 o'clock, by which time a large cluster of members had already assembled on the, floor, chatting noisily together in knots, or warmly abaking hands and welcoming each other's return to the House. The Steamer Ellen Gisberne returned to this Pert, from Cape Traverse, at an early hour on Wednesday, the 24th instant, in the midst of a heavy snow storm, after having succeeded in laying down the sub-marine cable between Cape Tormentine, in the Frevince of New Branswick, and Carlton Head on this Island. Mr. Gisberne made several attempts to tay the cable down before he finally succeeded on Monday night last. The water being shallow on the opposite coast, the vessel containing the cable could not get within one mile of the shore, consequently, that length of eable had to be taken on shere, which was accomplished with considerable difficulty, by means of a kedge-anchor and the united strength of four horses and four ozen. One end of the cable being made fast round a post, the Steamer soon after get under weigh, at about fire e'cleck in the evening, and reached the shoreon this Island about five on the following morning, having been upwards of elevens hours engaged in laying the cable. Mr. Gisberne informs us he had a very arduous task to perform, the wind and tide sweeping the vessel fast down to the westward, in spite of all they could do, and that he was fearfully apprehensive his cable would ran short before he reached the opposite shore, but fortunately he had three quarters of a mile do spare when he reached the Island. In this difficult undertaking, at this inclement season of the year, Mr. Gisborne was ably assisted by Capt.
