THE HANGING OF BENNETT.

This morning Bennet expiated on the scaffold the fatal act which led to the death of Hon George Brown. He slept quietly last refreshment. He was closed with Fathers Egan and Sheehan from an early hour, and at 7. 45 the Governor of the gaol, Sheriff Jarvis and the hangs man came to his cell. The hangman at once pinioned the arms, and, doing so, drew the straps very tight. Bennet said, "You hurt me. Is it requisitr to draw the straps so tight?' 'Yes,' said the hangman, 'it will be better for you.' 'All right-go on, said the prisoner. The strapping was then completed, and the procession to the gallows was formed, headed by two priests, praying. Bennett preserved extraordinary courage, and mounted the gallows steps with hesitation, when upon the platform he came forward to the rails, and addressing said:
