WIRELESS TELE-GRAPHY.

The practicability of wireless tele sicrinence durig the Bish aval maningvers was I liowed by an order for its adeption by the admiralty. And now the U. S. navy department has re-opened negotiations with Marconi. A year ago the officers detailed to examine the system reported favorably upon it, but as ten thousand dollars was asked for the right to use the invention and ten thousand dollars more was demanded for each complete outfit, the effort to secure it was abandoned. It is now reported that the British Admiralty pays only one thousand dollars for this

electrical equipment. One of its latest uses, says the New York Heiald, was in connecion with the stranding of the Russian coast defense ship General Admiral Apraxine, This vessel struck last winter on the rocks off Hobland, in the Gulf of Finland To make her salvage possible communication was established with the mainland and with the ice breaking steamer Ermack. Wires, transmit ters and coherers were erected on the island of Hohland and on a small island near Kotka, the distance being thirty three miles between termini. The apparatus worked perfectly for a period of eighty-four days, and four hundred and forty fficial mestages were despatched and received. A curious feature is hat the system worked better in a heavy snowstorm than in fine weather. Our officers also reported that wind, fog, rain, darkness and speed did not affect the transmission through space. Marconi declares that the difficulty of concentrating the signals and of cutting out contiguous stations has been overcome. Last April aerial telegrams were sent from the French despatch boat Ibis direct to the South Foreland, despite the fact that the East Good win lightship had an installation within the radius for which the messages were intended. If further experiments confirm this possibility of concentration and show that signals can be sent for distances ex-
