"I wonder if there's any truth in what they say; that he and Miss Veronica are going to make a match of it?"

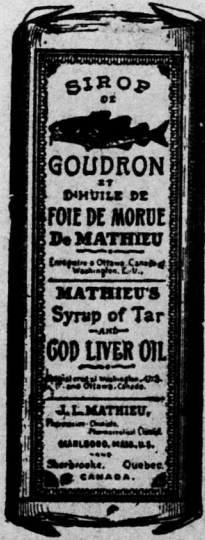
Ralph looked up quickly, then as suddenly became engrossed in stopping the tobacco in his pipe.

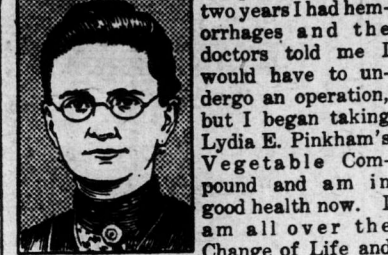



The First Raise.

Tell me what a man does with his first raise," a successful financier used to say to me, "and I will tell you if he has any chance of becoming a rich man."

The other day I happened to be present at the family council of a young couple when the husband announced that he had just received a raise of ten dollars a month.

The little wife, who is a enthusiastic young person, clapped her hands like a child and cried, "Oh Frederick then we can have that nice apartment we wanted. That was just ten dollars a month more. I'll go around to-morrow and see if it is still vacant. Oh, say we may."

At this prompt disposal of his hard-earned raise, Frederick, who is the common sense of the partnership, looked a trifle dubious, but the enthusiastic little person was ready for him with a dozen advantages such as that the kitchen was cooler and more convenient; that the view from the window was so near the river that they would be able to have a canoe and go out on the river hot summer evenings. This last bit of diplomacy was a telling stroke, and before I left Frederick was evidently considerably more than half persuaded.

Now I have sometimes heard these same young people bewail the fact that, although they realized the need of saving for a rainy day, they needed every cent of his salary to live on. Whether that was strictly true or not is an open question, but there is no question but that if they did live on that up to the time of the

raise, they could have continued to live on that or a very little more afterwards, and could have saved at least a part of that raise.

Now what does a raise mean to you young people who are receiving your first advance in salary?

Does it mean the possession of some hitherto unattainable luxury?

Does it mean that you won't have to look after the nickels and dimes so closely in the future?

Or does it mean at least some increase in saving power?

A young business woman who in the past six years has worked up from ten to twenty dollars a week told me she found it just as hard to save on twenty as she did on ten, and that although she had not saved over a hundred dollars. Undoubtedly that girl had regarded each raise as an enlargement of her spending power.

Another girl who has worked about the same time and never earned more than eighteen dollars a week has saved nearly a thousand dollars. "Each time I was advanced in salary," she said, "I saved half the raise. You see, I reckoned that if I could live on eight dollars a week I could certainly live on nine even if my salary had been raised to ten."

Now there are, to be sure, many people who can never enjoy the present because they are always saving and scrimping to an unnecessary degree for the future.

That, I think, is the very worst kind of extravagance, because it means wasting a perfectly good present for the sake of a future that may never come.

But between these two extremes, there is, as always, a mean. And this time it is a golden mean in more than one sense.

A Great Success! The Regatta of 1912 One of the Best on Record.

CROWDS WITNESS IT—EACH EVENT KEENLY CONTESTED.

In the annals of the Regatta has on historic Quidi Vidi none were so successful as that of yesterday. The weather though cool was fine and though it threatened rain in the early morning as the day advanced it became fine, and during the afternoon the sun shone out brightening up the landscape by its radiance and encouraging many who would not otherwise go there to come along and see the races.

Amongst the visitors to the Regatta were His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams and Lady, the Premier and Lady Morris, Mayor Ellis and the Commanders of H. M. S. Sirius and the French Warship Descartes. The fine band of the T. A. Society discoursed a choice programme of music during the day. Each race was well contested, and the first race to be rowed at 9.45 a.m. was the

AMATEURS.

In this very interesting race the Shamrock, Nellie R., and Blue Peter were the contestants. After the boats were away from the starting place the Peter forged ahead and opposite the committee tent was ahead by a clean length with the Shamrock second and Nellie R. behind by about 3 boat lengths. The Peter reached the buoys several boat lengths ahead of her two competitors, and she came home in capital style and well in advance of the other two boats. It was a pretty race between the Nellie R. and Shamrock, but just before the winning post was reached the Nellie R. shot ahead and the Shamrock was last in. The Blue Peter's time was: 10 mins. 23 sec.

PRESS.

In this contest the Nellie R. (Daily News), Guard (Herald), Blue Peter (Chronicle) and Red Lion (Advocate) rowed. The boats got away in splendid form and from the style in which the News crew rowed it was apparent that they would be hard to beat. The Peter led opposite the committee tent on the way to the buoys with the Nellie R. pushing her and the Guard next and the Red Lion last. Before the buoys were reached the Guard spurted and came up on the Nellie R., but just before turning the buoys by a fully a boat's length and came up the pond in fine style. The Nellie R. led at the finish by several boat lengths; the Herald were second, the Chronicle third and the Advocate last.

TRADES MEN.

The Nellie R., Blue Peter and Guard competed in this event and all three boats made a splendid start. The Guard had a clean lead to a point below the committee tent when the Nellie R. overhauled her, passed her further down the pond and was the first to turn the buoys. She held the

lead to the winning post by several lengths; Peter second, Guard third. Time: 10.08.

MERCANTILE.

Four boats ran in this race—the Nellie R. (Reid Mtd. Co.), Blue Peter (Harvey & Co.), Red Cross (Bowring Bros.), and Guard (Royal Stores). This from start to finish was a pretty race, but the lads in the Peter from the start showed their superior oarsmanship. They led from the start and turned the buoy fully two boat lengths ahead of their opponents. The Peter made a splendid race of it on the home stretch and was 3 boat lengths ahead at the winning post; Red Cross second; Guard third and Nellie R. last. Time 10.36 1-5.

SOCIETY.

In this race there was a diversity of opinion as to who might be the possible winner but those who had watched the practice of the boats favoured the L. O. A. in the Nellie R. She had a fine crew of oarsmen steered by Joe Boone of the South Side, himself a good oar and an experienced coxswain. The S. L. F. ran the Guard and the C. E. T. S. rowed the Peter. The Guard made a fine fight of it going down the pond and a nice run was made by the boats, but the fine swinging stroke of the Orangemen told on the home stretch and the Nellie R. was easily a winner with the Guard second and Peter third. Time the best for the day, 9.54.

BRIGADE.

At first it was thought that the Guards crew would lead in this race as they made good practice time, but lately C. L. B. stock went up and the outcome went to prove that this was deservedly so. The Guards were expected to be second, but the C. C. C. showed up to advantage in the old Red Cross. The C. L. B. rowed the Peter and led in neat style from the start with the C. C. C. second, Highlanders third and Guards last. The boats kept their respective positions until they turned the buoys when the Guard lost her position and fell back with the Highlanders going ahead of her. The Cadets made a plucky fight for first place but the C. L. B. kept well at work and shot in ahead by a good length or more with the Red Cross (C. C. C.) second, Nellie R. (Highlanders), 3rd, Guard (M. G. B.) last. Time 10.25.

SWIMMING.

In this race which started from the south side of the Lake, there were 17 contestants, the C. L. B. and C. C. C. entering boys in both contests open and brigade. After a plucky fight, A. Kelly won out in the open race and Jno. St. George for the C. C. C. in the swimming contest. Time 5.24.

FISHERMEN.

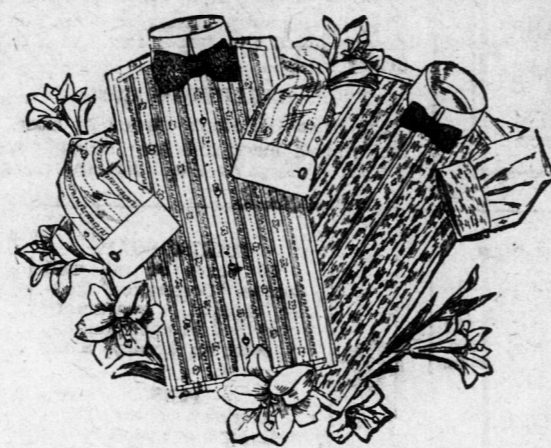
This, the oldest race on the programme and better known as the "set" race was looked forward to with much interest.

Heavy Work for Autumn.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

While the House has not passed any important bills at this session, it has cleared the decks for the Autumn session, which will, according to Government organizers continue until the Home Rule, the Welsh disestablishment, and the Franchise bill and the measure to allow trades unions to contribute to funds for the support of labor members in the House have passed the commons. All these Bills have received a second reading in the lower house and the Home Rule Bill has had few days in committee. Programme however is heavy one for Autumn session especially when importance of legislation is considered. Each bill has to be forced through against united opposition unionists. There are many who doubt the ability of the Government to get through with all this proposed legislation. Some disappointment has been expressed greater progress not made before adjournment with Home Rule and Welsh disestablishment, but it is no fault of the Government that the hopes of the supporters of these reforms were not gratified. Asquith in Dublin promised Home Rule in Commons by Christmas.

Roosevelt's Candidature.

Special Evening Telegram. CHICAGO, To-day.

Singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "Battle Hymn" of the Republic, the delegates of the first national convention of the new progressive party last night acclaimed Roosevelt, candidate for President and Gov. Johnson of California for Vice-President. Marking a new departure of proceedings in national conventions, the two candidates were immediately informally notified of their nomination and in the midst of cheers appeared before the delegates and voiced their acceptance and pledge of their best efforts in coming campaigns.

Agreement About Defence.

Special to Evening Telegram. BIRMINGHAM, To-day.

The Post says a letter has been received in this country from a responsible authority at Ottawa, expressing confident belief that negotiations between Canada and the States will take place after Borden's return for an agreement on frontier defence. Such agreement, the latter says, will require the assent of Imperial Government and would benefit the whole empire, while avoiding the opposition of foreign powers which a direct Anglo-American Treaty might provoke.

Elibank's Peerage.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

A peerage has been conferred on the Right Hon. Alexander Murray, Master of Elibank and chief Government whip, who has resigned his seat in Commons. Percy Holden Illingworth, representing the Shipley division of Yorkshire, has been appointed successor.

Krupp's Centenary.

Special to Evening Telegram. ESSEN, Germany, To-day.

In honor of centenary of the great Krupp works at Essen, the company donated \$3,500,000 to be distributed in gratuities to 65,000 workmen as a well-fare fund for the citizens of Essen, and for the Army and Navy.

Exemption From Panama Tolls.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day.

By a vote of 44 to 11, the senate refused to strike from the Panama Canal bill, the provision exempting American ships from American tolls for passage through Panama Canal.

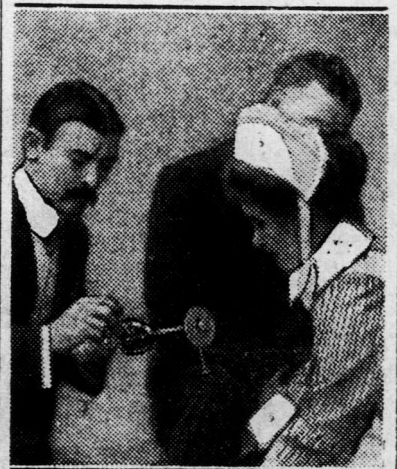

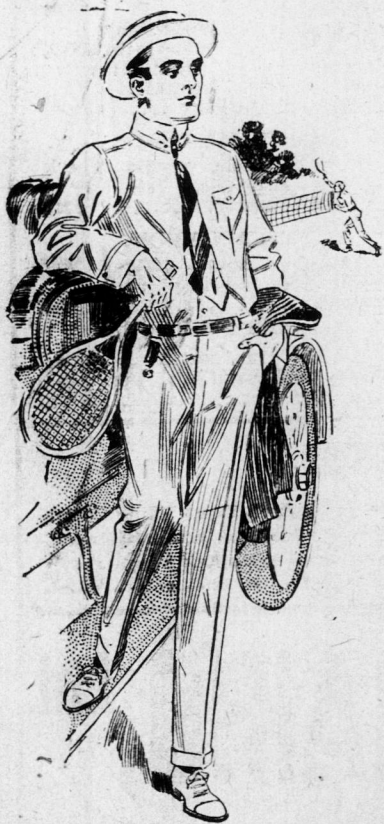
